We at [Fair Shake Environmental Legal Services](#) do not support the proposed revisions to the pollution control standards. We believe ORSANCO's [proposal](#) to eliminate the mandate for all states in the compact to adopt its PCS is a clear departure from ORSANCO's purpose as stated in its founding compact and the intentions of the founding states in entering into the compact and forming the Commission. The original 1948 compact's preamble states:

"[T]he growth in industrial activity within [the Ohio River basin], [has] resulted in recent years in an increasingly serious pollution of the waters and streams within the said drainage basin, constituting a grave menace to the health, welfare and recreational facilities of the people living in such basin, and occasioning great economic loss..."

The control of future pollution and the abatement of existing pollution in the waters of [the Ohio River] basin are of prime importance to the people thereof, and can best be accomplished through the cooperation of the States situated therein, by and through a joint or common agency"

While admittedly preferable to eliminating the PCS altogether, as was proposed in the first round of self-revisions, the Ohio River continues to face pollution from industry, including a proposed petrochemical build-out and increased oil and gas development, both of which come with their own set of known and emergent pollutants. The Clean Water Act and the existence of the U.S. EPA has not eliminated the extreme difficulty of abating pollution and maintaining and improving water quality in large water bodies subject to multi-state jurisdiction. The states' intent in signing ORSANCO's compact is just as relevant now as it was at the time of signing, which precedes the EPA. ORSANCO needs to be stepping into the authority it holds, not relinquishing it.

Below is a list of the changes being proposed and our submitted public comment:

1) ORSANCO's new proposal maintains the Pollution Control Standards, but eliminates the mandate that states adopt and implement those standards in their water permitting. In short, it maintains the PCS, but turns them into guidance as

opposed to mandates.

This will result in inconsistent standards between states, increasing the states vulnerability to political pressure. A facilitates a race to the bottom as states seek to become more attractive to industrial development.

By removing the mandate that states adopt the PCS in their respective permitting regimes, ORSANCO is creating a duplication of efforts among states and ORSANCO. Instead of one entity setting standards for the Ohio River, states can perform the same task without any coordination, resulting in an immense waste of resources in addressing the immediate and very real needs of the Ohio River and the people who rely on it. Removing the mandate also leads to confusion about the standards applicable to the River, making it difficult for citizens to understand an already complicated framework. Having states set their own standards for the Ohio River also complicates assessing attainment of the river's uses and presents significant hurdles for completing the Clean Water Act's 305(b) and 303(d) reports.

2) ORSANCO states that it will still conduct a permit-by-permit review of discharge permits issued for polluters discharging directly into the main stem of the Ohio River, and that permits in states who have not adopted the standards will have to demonstrate equivalency to ORSANCO standards during this permit-by-permit review.

This proposal lacks detail regarding ORSANCO's permit review process, and until that detail is provided to the public for its input and review, it should not be approved. ORSANCO's permit review process should be publicly noticed. That public notice should alert the public when the review is of a permit that is not implementing the PCS. ORSANCO's review should include the drafting and submission of comments by ORSANCO to the state agency and made publicly available. These comments should explain whether the permit has met the PCS, and, if it has met PCS equivalency, the scientific basis for that decision. The public should have the opportunity to review and consider these comments before the end of the public comment period, so they can incorporate that information in their own review. ORSANCO should also give states clear direction on what must be supplied by the state permitting agency or the polluter in order to prove that PCS equivalency has been achieved by the permit. The current proposal contains none of these requirements, and any permit-by-permit review could be rendered entirely superficial as a result. Until detailed requirements are set forth regarding the ORSANCO permit review process, this proposal is unacceptable and must be rejected as a weakening of water quality standards in the Ohio River.

On behalf of the City of Evansville, it is my pleasure to present this letter of opinion regarding ORSANCO's proposed revisions to Pollution Control Standards for discharges into the Ohio River.

The City of Evansville believes that ORSANCO should abandon the thought of revising the standards currently in place, and improve the current criteria. Modifying existing standards has the potential to place downstream communities in peril if all states along the Ohio River are not adhering to consistent pollution control standards.

Weakening the objectives of current pollution control standards will not ensure the highest possible water quality possible along the entire length of the Ohio River. In fact, for my constituents, who deserve the best water quality available, the overall standards could actually be strengthened and more protective, especially for nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrates.

Pollution control standards along the magnificent Ohio River should be more than mere guidelines open to multiple interpretations from state to state. The standards should not be voluntary. Ideally, all states along the river would modify their quality and permitting controls in order that the ORSANCO standards can be employed.

As I referenced in my previous communication to this body last August, ORSANCO has provided invaluable support to the Evansville Water and Sewer Utility relating to water quality for several decades. That assistance is appreciated by both the professional staff of our utility, and by our greater community.

I am grateful for the opportunity to represent the feelings of the City of Evansville in this matter. Thank you for your thoughtful consideration.

Re: Comments on PCS Proposed Changes

I have lived most of my life in the Ohio River Basin and have spent considerable effort over the decades working to protect and improve the Ohio River. I have participated in the Pollution Control Standards (PCS) triennial review consistently since 2005. Under ORSANCO's protection and management efforts over the past 70 years the water quality and aquatic life in the Ohio River has made incredible improvement. I sincerely hope the present Commissioners want to continue that legacy of improvement. It is with the idea of continued progress in restoring the Ohio that I make these comments on the proposed 2019 changes to the PSC.

The proposal retains the standards but recognizes that states may adopt different water quality standards in regulation and in permits as long as the Ohio River uses are protected by explicitly making ORSANCO standards voluntary for the states. It also retains the Commissions ability to review discharge permits to the mainstem of the Ohio. It is my understanding that this is the way things are implemented now and have been for some time, even though the current standards give ORSANCO authority to compel states adopt their standards for the Ohio River.

I continue to believe that working with the states to harmonize standards and assure there are not gaps in protections is much better alternative for the protection of the Ohio River and the millions of residents who rely upon the river for drinking water and recreation. In addition, I believe that harmonizing standards is more effective and will ultimately require less work on everyone's part. I urge the Commission to reconsider once again and work toward harmonizing water quality standards.

However, I acknowledge that the current proposal is much less objectionable than the previous proposal, which completely removed the pollution control standards from ORSANCO's purview.

I have had the opportunity to work with other multi-state commissions on large interstate rivers in my 20 years as a water quality advocate and professional. These commissions had difficulty cleaning up large interstate waterways precisely because they lacked the authority granted to ORSANCO in the Compact to ensure that "pollution by sewage or industrial wastes originating within a signatory State shall not injuriously affect the various uses of the interstate waters." ORSANCO purports that their standards are not needed because the individual states now have NPDES programs and water quality standards that must be approved by EPA under the CWA when a number of ORSANCO standards are more stringent than state standards.

Several states in the Compact, including Kentucky, have prohibitions against standards that are more stringent than the EPA and so for a number of states, permits will likely be less stringent if the Commission votes to approve these changes and explicitly authorizes states to adopt water quality standards rather than adopt ORSANCO's standards. I continue to believe that the current proposal will not result in improved water quality in the Ohio River. It will likely not even result in the status quo for water quality. Rather citizens will be left with a hodge-podge of varying uses and standards protecting those uses along the 981 miles of the river.

US EPA addressed the very issue at the crux of ORSANCO's assumption in a study, titled *A Study of Prospective Water Pollution Control Activities For The Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission*, was released in March 1975, and with respect to "stream standards,"

recommended that:

Since the Ohio is a boundary river, and because there are many other relationships as among the several state segments of the river system, the interstate agency should provide the overall view and the comparative analyses needed for coordination, consistency and equity.

Whereas the current PCS state: "Sections 301(b)(1)(C) and 510 of the Federal Act require that permits issued under that system incorporate applicable standards promulgated by an interstate agency wherever they are more stringent than comparable state or federal standards. And that these standards set forth the uses to be protected in the Ohio River (Chapter 2) as established in the Compact, establish water quality criteria to assure that those uses will be achieved (Chapter 3), and set wastewater discharge requirements (Chapter 5) needed to attain the water quality criteria. The standards also recognize the rights of individual states to adopt and apply more stringent regulations.

Specific wastewater discharge requirements are established in these regulations and must be incorporated into discharge permits issued under the authority of the NPDES or state discharge permitting programs when they are more stringent than:

- 1) applicable U.S. EPA technology-based effluent guidelines required under Sections 301, 304, 306, and 307 of the Federal Clean Water Act, or
- 2) any state treatment requirements, effluent standards, or water quality-based effluent limits.

In the absence of promulgated Federal effluent guidelines pursuant to Sections 301, 304, 306, and 307 of the Clean Water Act, the Compact signatory states have the responsibility to establish effluent limitations to be included in any discharge permit, consistent with the standards contained herein using best professional judgment on a case-by-case basis."

This is in no way comparable to the Commission simply stating that because state standards are approved by EPA that the river as a whole will be protected. Standards vary state by state.

Currently, the PCS regulations require that states use ORSANCO standards or a state standard if it is more stringent. Therefore, the protections will not be consistent or as stringent if these changes are approved and the PCS regulations are optional for each state.

I believe that ORSANCO's legacy of providing valuable leadership to the Ohio River states will be diminished if the current proposal is approved. What the Ohio River needs is coordination, consistency and equity. Proposing a cost effective way to selectively modify the PCS after review as warranted and increased focus on harmonization of standards and their implementation among Compact states and the EPA would preserve ORSANCO's leadership role in the basin and more importantly continue to improve water quality in the Ohio River.

I cannot state that I support the proposed changes, but they are not nearly as objectionable as the previous proposal and for that small step, I commend the Commissioners. Finally, I commend the Commissioners in establishing a new 45 day public comment period and in conducting 3 additional Public Hearings on the current proposal. This entire exercise has proven how many citizens truly care about the Ohio River, I urge the Commission to continue to listen to the citizens and find a way to work with the states to harmonize standards and fully implement the EPA's recommendations from the 1974/75 study.

The Ohio Chapter of the Sierra Club strongly opposes making ORSANCO's pollution control standards voluntary. The existing standards must be maintained and strengthened.

State by state regulation to different standards is not scientifically valid or sound management for environmental sustainability. Years of study shows that these standards are needed and are scientific. Neither ORSANCO nor any other organization has shown that pollution control standards should be eliminated. We all know that if standards are voluntary, they will not be followed. Those affected by pollution will lose fundamental tools which allow the public to address and prevent damage to public health and the environment.

Southern Ohio communities depend on the Ohio River for their drinking water. They spend millions of dollars to clean up Ohio River water to make their water safe to drink and use. More pollution adds to this expense and increases the threat of having to shut off drinking water intakes due to contamination in the Ohio. Economically, voluntary standards are unjustifiable.

We need stronger standards for nutrients. The Ohio River's nutrient levels contribute to high downstream levels of nutrients.

The Ohio River has the potential to be cleaner, to be fishable and swimmable. We need to continue progress toward this goal, not step backwards.

We urge you to say no to the proposed changes that allow pollution control standards to be enforced. We know that the federal government and many states are unwilling at this time to maintain federal and state standards and ORSANCO's role is extremely important.

Dear ORSANCO,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on the latest proposed revisions to the Pollution Control Standards. We appreciate the public outreach the Commission and ORSANCO staff have conducted on these and earlier proposed changes.

The importance of the role of the Ohio River to the Greater Cincinnati Water Works and the Cincinnati area cannot be understated. The river serves as the backbone to the city providing jobs, commerce, recreation, and generally is the focal point of our region. In addition, Greater Cincinnati is the home to over 1 million people who rely on the river as the primary source of drinking water. Any challenges or threats to the quality of this major resource is taken very seriously by the people of the region.

The latest proposal by the ORSANCO Commission to retain the standards and clarify they are voluntary is a significant improvement to the previous "Alternative 2" proposal which would have essentially eliminated the standards. While an improvement over the previous proposal, these current proposed changes weaken the standards and increase the ability of individual states to succumb to increasing pressure to weaken their environmental standards.

The Pollution Control Standards (PCS) are central to the overall mission of ORSANCO. The PCS must be the yardstick by which states may be measured when implementing their individual standards applicable to the Ohio River. This ensures minimum, appropriate, and consistent standards are set to protect the entire river. We also believe continued review of NPDES permits by ORSANCO to ensure the uses of the river are being protected falls within the scope of ORSANCO's mission and we support that continued effort.

While this is the intent of the standards, significant variation still exists between ORSANCO, USEPA recommendations, and the individual states' water quality standards. The goal of providing a level of uniformity to the standards for the river seemingly has not been achieved. Some states' standards appear to adhere closely or are more stringent than ORSANCO's while others are less stringent.

We understand the PCS have some redundancy with USEPA water quality standards, but we do not view this as a reason to render the standards as voluntary. Rather, ORSANCO should use the USEPA standards as a starting point to ensure that standards are appropriate for the Ohio River, and then modify those standards as necessary. ORSANCO's PCS serve to uniformly address issues which may slip through the cracks of EPA Water Quality Standards or the States' standards. In addition, ORSANCO is in a much better position to address emerging contaminants and move quickly to ensure the intended uses of the river are protected.

ORSANCO is uniquely positioned to have a positive impact on basin-wide river quality by virtue of an existing regulatory framework extending beyond the state boundaries. Reducing the effectiveness of this regulatory framework removes one of the key benefits ORSANCO can provide by protecting river quality on a basin-wide basis.

ORSANCO standards should serve as guidance to the states as they address facilities impacting the Ohio River. The standards should reflect the unique needs of the river as a whole. The standards can also serve to address contaminants of emerging concern where individual states may not have the ability to do so directly. The individual states cannot be relied upon to provide equivalent levels of protection without the PCS.

We understand implementation and enforcement of the pollution control standards are imperfect. However, we recommend maintaining the standards and working toward consistency across all compact states. We view this as not just the responsibility of ORSANCO, but also of the individual states as part of their responsibility as members of the compact. Rather than reducing the effectiveness of the standards the Commission should work toward eliminating the weaknesses which have hampered the PCS effectiveness.

We ask that you retain the standards in their current form to protect the quality of our valuable water resource.

Thank you again for your public outreach efforts. We look forward to working with you to protect the Ohio River regardless of the Commission's decision on this issue.

Since my previous email had a logo attached, I thought I had better send this which only has text as well.

Please accept these comments of Valley Watch, Inc., an Evansville, IN based non-government organization whose purpose is "to protect the public health and environment of the lower Ohio River Valley."

First, we support the comments of the City of Evansville, the Sierra Club and its chapters and those of Jason Flickner.

Valley Watch is grateful that ORSANCO chose to abandon its original proposal to eliminate the Pollution Control Standards (PCS) as proposed in 2018. As people who are forced to drink water that comes from the Ohio River it is vitally important that the raw water coming into our treatment plant be as pure as possible to facilitate the ease of treating the water to drinking water standards. While Evansville enjoys a fairly sophisticated treatment system, others, like Mt. Vernon do not and since our communities are close to the end of the River, it is required that the raw water be of highest quality. The current proposal does not accomplish that goal.

We also demand that water on this end of the river be safe for body contact for people of all ages since the River is a great source of recreation for thousands of lower Ohio Valley residents. We believe that while the existing standards are clearly more protective for contact than no standards, they can and should be improved upon.

ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards also help protect the quality of the water in which aquatic species live. In our experience the rebound of numerous sport fish species can be traced directly to the strengthening of the PCS over the last several decades as prompted by the Clean Water Act et al. Of course, we continue to be concerned about the required Fish Consumption Advisories carried by the various states on species that are further up the food chain, especially for substances like mercury, and therefore feel some standards should be improved.

We fail to understand why some states that are part of the compact are not required to adopt the PCS established by the Commission. There is no logical explanation for

such a stance except that they hope that their municipal and industrial dischargers can achieve some kind of competitive advantage over their neighbors. That is completely unfair to those of us who live downstream as well as an assault on the very capital system of economics we practice in the USA today.

It is clear from the two hearings I have attended and the bulk of the 6000 comments filed on the 2018 proposal that real people do not want substantive changes in the PCS and in fact, would like to see them strengthened and improved upon. Those who wish to use our River as a dump for their various poisons should NEVER be allowed to create hazards for those who deserve reasonably pure water down stream in any River, let alone one that is used by so many people to sustain life itself.

Further, Valley Watch has great concerns that nutrients like nitrates and phosphorus be kept from the River as part of the overall PCS. Sure, we understand that this would require a major undertaking by the Commission since these chemicals have so many pathways to the River. Agricultural runoff industrial discharges and municipalities all contribute to the problem that is becoming global in scale. Increasingly, toxic algae blooms threaten life in and around the water of the Ohio River and almost nothing is being done about it by anyone. The resulting “dead zone” in the Gulf of Mexico is driven by this lack of concern, let alone regulation. More and more confined feeding operations for livestock, unregulated application of nitrogen based fertilizers and septic systems run afoul will ultimately destroy the entire length of the Ohio River if we do not begin to address this looming disaster. ORSANCO is really the only functioning entity beside USEPA that could actually do something about that.

Valley Watch supports ORSANCO maintaining the 2015 Standards until such time as they are strengthened. We also support enforcing all the compact States to adopt the ORSANCO 2015 standards and any future improvements to those standards.

One of the reasons offered by proponents of the 2018 proposal to eliminate the standards was the utilization of limited resources. While we feel it makes zero sense to eliminate the standards at any level, it is Valley Watch’s belief that a triennial review could be extended to five or even ten years, depending on new issues that may arise that may require new chemical regulation. In that scenario we feel that updates or entirely new regulation could be done on an emergency basis, after sufficient public input.

We applaud the significant progress that has resulted from the enforcement of the Clean Water Act and the actions of ORSANCO to improve water quality of the Ohio River over its entire length. But we also recognize that those improvements are fragile and could be severely altered due to either accident or intentional dumps of hazardous chemicals anywhere along the River’s path. That is why it continues to

be important that we monitor the River closely for a broad array of chemical compounds on a schedule that is assured to protect those downstream when such pollution is placed in the River.

To help that effort, it would be fairly easy to create a near realtime database showing the levels of, say, 100 different compounds, that would be accessible to the public on the internet, similar to the real time data collected on various chemicals in the air by the Indiana Department of Environmental Management. I am confident that such a database would have followers who would be able to detect trends that would require remedial actions to maintain the safety and purity of drinking and recreational water. That sort of democratization of monitoring water quality could serve to save lives of people and livestock who would be able to avoid swimming or drinking toxic water.

Thanks for this opportunity to offer these comments and we look forward to the official response to them.

To Whom It May Concern,

First, I want to congratulate ORSANCO for the excellent work done for the past 70+ years to protect the drinking water of the 5 million residents along the Ohio River. I also want to express my appreciation for maintaining the spirit and focus of the PCS in the most recent 2019 revision. That said, I want to make the following points:

- In general, at a minimum ORSANCO needs to maintain its capabilities to be able to execute its important mission. ORSANCO is a unique and critical organization for the maintenance of the health and safety of citizens living along the Ohio River watershed. My real preference would be for ORSANCO secure additional funding for additional resources.
- While I've gone through the 2019 revisions of the PCS, it is not completely clear to me if the changes to Section 1.1 – "Authority and Purpose" are proposed for clarity or if these changes weaken ORSANCO's mission. I hope the changes are made for the former.
- Regarding the changes to Chapter 5 – "Waste Water Discharge Requirements", I don't completely understand the elimination Sections 5.6 through 5.8. My sense is discharge of cooling water and its associated heat can be critically important to the welfare of life in and around the river. Also, Section 5.8 provides a nice "bucket" to catch miscellaneous waste not identified elsewhere within Chapter 5. I support maintaining the spirit of these Sections somewhere within Chapter 5.
- From what I've read, ORSANCO is under pressure from Industry to reduce water pollution standards. This includes the companies operating coal-fired electrical generation plants along the Ohio. One concern is the ground water contamination from Coal Ash emanating from these plants. The comprehensive, national study of Coal Ash Pollution published earlier this year identifies New Castle Generating Station in western Pennsylvania and the Ghent Generating Station in northern Kentucky as two plants within the top 10 ground water polluters. Both these plants, along with 20 other coal-fired plants, are along the Ohio River. This fact alone indicates to me a critical need here for ORSANCO to continue to monitor, oversee and enforce clean water standards.

Thank you for considering my comments in support of maintaining and strengthening ORSANCO in its mission to ensure the quality of Ohio River water.

I want to thank all of you who have come to this meeting. Your presence and support are appreciated. Those who have and will speak, are to be commended for sharing information and support.

There are lots of people I don't see here. No mayors, no health departments, nor any city water districts are represented here tonight. Why aren't they here?

Did they NOT get the memo?

ORSANCO has a responsibility to monitor the health of our drinking water, but they also have the duty to inform and recruit more people to meetings so they can be informed of the water status and/or rule changes. These invited attendees need to be decision-makers from the city and communities who draw drinking water from the Ohio River. Other interested citizens are welcome and needed to attend too.

The cities/communities that draw water from the Ohio River should be notified and informed of meetings like this at least two-full months prior to the event. These rule changes will directly impact the quality of their drinking water and their voices need to be heard.

ORSANCO should have at least one decision-making representative (city mayor, director of the city water works, city councilman etc.) from each community/city. Not 50 people from one city, but at least one qualified representative from no less than 50% of the cities/communities drawing water from the Ohio River. This should be a mandated quorum.

The quorum should be part of the ORSANCO's responsibility and in their bylaws as a governmental agency.

The attendees should also have a reciprocal commitment to help the ORSCANCO with their mission to improve water quality, river safety, and improve wildlife health. Attendees should also agree to help notify ORSCANCO of violations so that ORSCANCO can enforce the rules.

There should be a cooperative effort among those citizens living along the waterways, ORSCANCO, health department, water works and EPA to all work to improve our drinking water and health of the river as a whole.

The membership of the ORSCANCO board needs to be re-evaluated.

The Ohio River Valley Sanitation Commission should be balanced with active members who are qualified scientists, medical professionals, environmentalists, engineers, wildlife conservationists, city water departments and community leaders. Those who are representing corporations that pollute the waterways should be cautiously monitored so that their numbers and influence is a small fraction of the decision-making core.

The qualifications and "balance" of council membership should also be part of the ORSCANCO bylaws so that it is diverse and consistent.

My name is Joe Gallenstein, and I have lived near the Ohio River for my entire life. My family has lived near the river for generations, depending on it for our basic necessities. Since the late 1940s ORSANCO has been a big part of making sure that people throughout the Ohio River valley have access to clean water, and consistently have stronger and more exhaustive standards than either the states or federal governments that also regulate our water.

It is important to me that you continue to do more than monitor this land, it's important that you hold the line in setting standards that local and state governments work to meet. At a time when one Congressman in the area is pushing to end the EPA, where state governments and regulatory agencies are filled with employees, current and former, of the industries that they are charged with regulations, and where we have seen increased issues of access to clean water within and beyond the Ohio River valley, it is imperative that you not let states use the guidelines at their discretion. They should remain a standard, and not a suggestion.

I understand that the states are doing the enforcement, but your mission can and should cover that. It is time for ORSANCO to instead be asking the 8 states and federal government to fund more of the work ORSANCO can do. Your monitoring doesn't merely cover the problems in the spot you test, but it can let us know where new pollutants are being entered. We can know if just west of Newport, KY, it could mean that pollutants from the Licking River are showing up. It's a sign of where other problems are, that states can look further into.

I am writing this on behalf of myself, but the over 12,000 members of Kentuckians For The Commonwealth also supports ORSANCO standards remaining requirements throughout the Ohio River standards.

Finally, I hope you will look at this map of Kentucky water systems that is attached as a PDF. Primary and secondary public water utilities that utilize the Ohio River are marked. You'll see that 24 counties use the Ohio River directly, and many others utilize other rivers within the Ohio River valley. This includes 4 of the 6 counties that service over 100,000 residents, including our most populous county (Jefferson) and our 3rd and 4th most populous (Kenton and Boone). This map illustrates how important your work is for just one of the 8 states.

Please, continue to do this needed work, and make sure clean waters standards are required and not suggestions!

Comments of the Ohio Environmental Council and Environmental Law & Policy Center Regarding ORSANCO's New Proposal for its Pollution Control Standards

Introduction

The Ohio Environmental Council, a 501(c)(3) statewide non-profit located in Columbus, Ohio, and the Environmental Law & Policy Center, the Midwest's leading regional public interest environmental organization working to improve environmental quality and protect our natural resources respectfully submit these comments to the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission. Our mission is to protect Ohio and the Midwest's land, water, and public lands for all who call them home, and we appreciate the opportunity to engage with the Commission on its new proposed language for the Pollution Control Standards.

First, we want to thank the Commissioners for listening to the hundreds of public comments, both from organizations and citizens, regarding their opposition to the previous proposal completely eliminating certain substantive sections of the Pollution Control Standards. The Commissioners have shown they are willing to listen to the public without a predetermined outcome.

After the October Commission meeting, when the Commission decided to postpone consideration of the pollution control standards rewrite, the OEC and ELPC were thankful for the multiple opportunities to talk with Ohio's commissioners about possible modifications. When the February Commission meeting arrived, and the new language revealed, it became apparent that the Commissioners listened, though they've not pushed far enough.

The new proposal is a compromise. It has its strengths and it has its weaknesses. However, OEC and ELPC still believe the most powerful use of ORSANCO's pollution control standards is a uniformly applied rule covering all states. The voluntary approach is better than no standards at all, but we must push for the strongest possible protections for the Ohio River. We still favor a retention of the Pollution Control Standards with a requirement that states implement them into their own state regulations. In addition to emphasizing the need for clear and consistent, mandatory standards, we offer a few suggestions that could further improve the Pollution Control Standards.

The New Proposal

The OEC and ELPC understand ORSANCO's new proposal to make the following significant changes when compared to the current Pollution Control Standards:

- 1.

The Commission “advises” the states to comply with the Pollution Control Standards as a means to comply with the Compact.

2. States may adopt alternative standards under the Clean Water Act that will similarly satisfy the Compact.
3. The Commission will have the opportunity to comment on any proposed discharge permit for the main stem of the Ohio River.
4. Under Chapter 5, the Pollution Control Standards still prohibit discharges that would “preclude the attainment of any designated use of the main stem waters of the Ohio River.”

These four factors represent the legal weight of the Pollution Control Standards. In order to fully effectuate these goals, the OEC proposes the following additions to the compromise, bringing the PCS more in line with a standard that provides consistent and reliable protection along the entire River. However, we emphasize that we still believe the best option is to retain the Pollution Control Standards in force as required for adoption by all of the states.

Require States That Do Not Adopt the PCS to Explain Their Decision

The Pollution Control Standards, developed over the course of many decades, in theory enshrine an agreement between the states of the Commission to promote uniform water quality criteria and provide for consistent regulation of discharges into the main stem of the Ohio River.

Therefore, if the Commission chooses to adopt “voluntary” sections of the Pollution Control Standards, it should require states that do not adopt those sections to provide an affirmative reason for why they have chosen not to do so. That reason should be grounded in a scientific explanation exploring the unique properties of their section of the Ohio River that requires alternative standards. Or, the state can show how its regulations actually provide more stringent protection than the Pollution Control Standards.

Through this process, the members of the Commission could learn from one another and potentially provide an opportunity for an improvement to the Pollution Control Standards. If Ohio, for instance, has a particular numeric criteria for a pollutant that Kentucky does not have, in sharing its justification for not adopting the PCS, it would provide that pollutant as an example. Other states could then observe these distinctions and adopt them into their own Ohio River standards. Or, the states as a collective could implement that more stringent standard into the Pollution Control Standards.

Allow for Public Engagement with ORSANCO’s Permit Review Process

The proposed revisions to the Pollution Control Standards also emphasize the Commission’s notice and comment role for any permit proposed to discharge into the Ohio River’s main stem. The Commission should consider providing a more transparent mechanism through which the public can observe the Commission’s engagement in the permit process.

This idea could take a variety of forms. However, it could be as simple as a mailing list concerned citizens can sign up for on ORSANCO’s website that allows them to receive a notice any time a

permit is proposed for the main stem of the Ohio River. It could also provide an opportunity to receive the comments provided by the Commission to the permitting authority. Similarly, the Commission could state clearly on its website a list of permits reviewed in a given month, and whether they recommended the permit as satisfying the Pollution Control Standards.

The OEC understands this process already occurs in some form, but making it more transparent and up-front would allow for better public understanding of ORSANCO's already existing engagement with each proposed permit.

Consider Process to Implement Emerging Contaminants into PCS Numeric Criteria

The Commission should also consider developing a more formalized procedure through which the public can participate in the development of the Pollution Control Standards, with an emphasis on citizen engagement on emerging contaminants.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency has shown that it will take way too long to regulate pollutants we know are dangerous today, like PFAS or microcystin. While the federal agency spends years determining the correct value for its safe drinking water standards, ORSANCO could collaboratively provide recommendations to its member states for interim water quality criteria for these emerging contaminants.

Importantly, we aren't proposing an additional task on the part of ORSANCO staff; we're proposing a robust opportunity during public commenting periods for the Pollution Control Standards where states, scientists, communities, and environmental advocacy organizations can share their work on emerging contaminants. ORSANCO staff could review the proposals, and alongside a subcommittee of commissioners, recommend particular contaminants for inclusion in the numeric criteria of the Pollution Control Standards, whether they are mandatory or voluntary.

Instead of waiting for the U.S. EPA to act, ORSANCO could act as a more formal clearinghouse for the good work on emerging contaminants, like PFAS, occurring throughout the Ohio River watershed.

Conclusion

The OEC and ELPC re-emphasize the need for a robust, mandatory set of numeric criteria under which the Ohio River receives ample protections throughout the entire river system. However, the compromise proposed by the Commissioners is a step in the right direction away from elimination of the standards. We urge the Commissioners to do the right thing and ensure consistent and uniform protection for the Ohio River amongst all of the states along its banks.

We look forward to working with ORSANCO over the coming years as members of the Watershed Organization Advisory Committee to revitalize and protect the Ohio River.

Dear ORSANCO,

I am writing to strongly discourage the proposed ORSANCO revision that would make water quality restrictions voluntary by ORSCANCO member states. As a professor of watershed biogeochemistry and expert in nutrient dynamics, I resolutely disagree with an effort to weaken ORSCANCO's existing authority to set and regulation water quality in the Ohio River basin. Across the U.S., surface waters have continued to be degraded from excess nutrients (phosphorous and nitrogen), despite extensive investments in best management practices designed to stem non-point source pollutants (e.g., agricultural runoff). Moreover, the harmful algal blooms that have profound ecological and economic impacts are generally becoming more frequent and more intense in surface waters across the U.S. As the 2015 harmful algal bloom on the Ohio River demonstrated, these blooms incur great economic costs for drinking water utilities and residents using riverine water for drinking water and recreation. In light of these considerations, ORSANCO should be considering increasingly stringent water quality regulations, rather than the proposed change to voluntary "restrictions".

Given the importance of the Ohio River as a drinking water resource for five million people, the proposed changes in restriction of industrial discharges will severely undermine ORSCANCO's capacity to restrict pollutant discharges at a time of rapid change in the Ohio River basin. Industrial discharges from coal fired power plants, oil and gas companies, and petrochemical companies should be held to the highest standards possible to protect the Ohio River for its use a drinking water, recreational, economic and ecological resource.

Voluntary restrictions doled out or enforced on a state-by-state basis goes against our most basic understanding of how to effectively manage large river basins (i.e., holistic, integrated, and ecosystem-focused management). The residents of the Ohio River region are fortunate to have had the strong vision and leadership of ORSANCO since its establishment in 1948, well before the Clean Water Act. I strongly urge ORSCANCO to take the high road, resist industrial interests, and continue its visionary leadership.

Re: Sierra Club Call to Action: Protect the Ohio River and Drinking Water for 5 Million People

The Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission's (ORSANCO) latest proposed Pollution Control Standard (PCS) recommendations are an improvement over the proposed action under consideration last year – referred to as Alternative 2 – but the recommendations are not adequate and should be withdrawn.

ORSANCO should maintain the PCS standards and maintain the requirement that all states revise their state water quality standards and permitting programs to utilize the ORSANCO standards when issuing discharge permits into the Ohio River.

Rationale: Setting Ohio River Pollution Control Standards (PCS) is the most important work that ORSANCO performs.

The majority of the mainstem states for which the utilization of the ORSANCO PCS Standards is an issue, already utilize these standards in their permitting decisions. Indiana and Pennsylvania do so as a matter of regulation, West Virginia does so as a matter of policy, and Kentucky incorporated the ORSANCO standards into its water quality standards for the Ohio until 2009, when it determined that except for 3 parameters, the state standards were equivalent to the ORSANCO standards. Ohio has a separate set of water quality standards for discharges into the Ohio River, which incorporate some, but not all, of the ORSANCO standards. Illinois does not utilize the ORSANCO standards at all in the permitting decisions.

The Pollution Control Standards are the product of decades of deliberation by the Technical Committee and other committees of ORSANCO, and of the Commission itself, based on a determination that these standards were necessary and appropriate for improving the health of

the river and maintaining water quality necessary to fully support all designated uses outlined in the Compact. That a compact state's Commissioners would have voted without objection to approve these standards for discharges into the mainstem, and then determine to ignore the standards when setting permitting monitoring requirements and discharge limitations, is deeply cynical. The Commission should not alter the applicability PCS standards by making them "advisable" to accommodate two mainstem states who do not currently utilize the standards or their equivalent.

These standards are necessary to protect the Ohio River, which 5 million people rely on for drinking water. ORSANCO's proposal would make subtle changes to the language that would have serious impacts and leave key pollution control standards on the cutting room floor.

The draft PCS would eliminate the current mandate for states to adopt the PCS, making these protections optional. Currently, citizens are able to use the Compact to pressure state Governors and the water quality agencies to do more to protect the Ohio River and the drinking water of 5 million people. If the Compact PCS become voluntary, our elected officials will be able to point to the voluntary nature of the Compact to avoid discussions and actions to improve the health of the Ohio River.

A patchwork of standards will lead to confusion for businesses and be less cost-effective. Standards maintained by one agency provide cost-effective management for the Ohio River States as well as providing clarity for businesses applying for permits to build along the river.

With our criticism of the current proposal, the Sierra Club also wants to express appreciation to the ORSANCO Commissioners for hearing and acting on the public criticism of Alternative 2 expressed throughout 2018, and for the decision in October 2018 to take no action on Alternative 2 at the Fall ORSANCO Commission meeting. During 2018, Sierra Club Chapters and the vast majority of the public expressed strong opposition to any action that would end the ORSANCO responsibility to set Pollution Control Standards for the Ohio River as was proposed in Alternative 2. We thank you for hearing the public and rejecting this proposed action.

In The Alternative: If the Commission determines to move forward with the proposal that it has presented for public comment, it should defer adoption until an appendix to the PCS is developed that addresses the issues relating to implementation in order to make the process robust and to hold those states *not* utilizing the ORSANCO standards accountable to the public and the other Compact states.

These matters should be incorporated into an Appendix, released for public review, and final approval of the proposed revision to the PCS should be accompanied by revisions addressing each of these points:

- a. The notice and opportunity for Commission staff to review must be on a permit-by-permit basis. For those states not utilizing ORSANCO standards or their equivalent state counterpart, the review should focus on whether the discharge permit limitations and other requirements of the draft permit provide comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals as if the ORSANCO standards were being utilized to set permit limits.
- b. The notice and opportunity for staff review should occur *prior* to the commencement of the public notice and comment process under the state's NPDES program, and the staff

determination regarding whether the draft permit provides comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals, should be placed into record at the time that the draft permit is public-noticed and the public comment period begins.

c. Any discharge permit proposed by a state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS standards or their equivalent, should include in the public notice a notation of this fact, whether the ORSANCO review found the draft permit provided comparable protection, and that the ORSANCO determination is available for public review.

d. In addition to the permit-by-permit review, ORSANCO staff should review and comment on the differences between the PCS standards and the water quality standards of each state during their triennial review process, and each state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS or the equivalent standard should be obligated justify the decision not to adopt each of the PCS into the state water quality regulations.

ORSANCO Must Set Numeric Nutrient Standards for the Ohio River:

The river and watershed need nutrient criteria and standards. By revising the PCS to only apply to “entity discharging sewage or industrial waste” ORSANCO may seek to avoid this responsibility. ORSANCO should be working with watershed states to create such parameters, similar to efforts on the Great Lakes and Chesapeake Bay.

ORSANCO should take the lead in setting numeric nutrient standards for the Ohio River. This need is longstanding and ORSANCO is in the best position to lead. In fact, this is exactly what ORSANCO reported that it was working on in the most recent 2018 ORSANCO Annual Report, at page15:

Nutrient Criteria Development

Excessive nutrients have long been an issue in our nation’s waterways, and the Ohio River is no exception. To resolve this issue, ORSANCO staff have been working towards defensible nutrient criteria for the Ohio River for over a decade using nutrient, planktonic algae, and chlorophyll-a....

In 2014, ORSANCO purchased 60 continuous dissolved oxygen loggers to obtain this information that was previously unavailable. Since then, these loggers have been placed alongside the macroinvertebrate samplers in the Belleville, Markland, McAlpine, Olmstead/Open Water, Montgomery, Racine, JT Myers, Willow Island, Greenup, and Cannelton pools in the Ohio River. Additionally, water samples were obtained for nutrient and chlorophyll-a analysis at each of these sites.

ORSANCO staff are currently analyzing the data from this paired study, and early indications are promising that defensible nutrient criteria can be developed from this approach. This study is scheduled to continue during the 2018 field season.

The need is compelling. The 2018 Annual Report discusses current eutrophication problems in the Ohio River at page 15 and 16:

Harmful Algal Blooms

Algae are present in the Ohio River throughout the year.....


Cyanobacteria can produce toxins which can be harmful if ingested. For this reason, an algal bloom which consists primarily of cyanobacteria is considered a Harmful

Algal Bloom (HAB).....

On August 19, 2015, ORSANCO received an NRC report of a paint-like green material on the Ohio River at Pike Island Locks and Dam (ORM 84.2), which covered 100 X 200 feet. This was quickly identified as the blue-green algae Microcystis aeruginosa. Over the next month, this bloom expanded to cover the Ohio River from Pike Island L&D to Cannelton L&D (ORM 84.2 to 720.7).....

The Sierra Club stands ready to work with ORSANCO to improve and protect the water quality in the Ohio River. We stand ready to help the public better understand what ORSANCO does and to build public support for your work. We reaffirm our opinion that ORSANCO's role of setting Ohio River Pollution Control Standards is the most important role for ORSANCO.

ORSANCO Commissioners:

The Ohio River Valley Watershed is very fortunate to have had a multi-state compact in place since 1948 which protects many uses of the river including its use as the drinking water source for five million residents.

While I applaud the new revisions in that they will keep the Pollution Control Standards in place and are far superior to the proposed option 2 of the PCS released in 2018, I would urge these standards not be made discretionary but instead be mandatory.

Permit by permit review by states fails to hold the states accountable as it does not address equivalent levels of protection under ORSANCO. I realize ORSANCO has no authority to mandate or enforce standards and to date has not addressed the monumental build-out of the petrochemical industry in the Ohio River Valley.

However, the current uses of the Ohio River by both historical industries as well as the impact of petrochemical development will certainly have far reaching effects on water quality. Under the Energy and Policy Act of 2005, oil and gas facilities are exempt from most major environmental laws; however, this does not mean that they do not release toxic compounds that affect human health and the environment. This build-up will undoubtedly affect the drinking water of millions of residents and the aquatic ecosystems.

It is my understanding that except for ORSANCO's monitoring of organic contaminants, there are no other agencies or facilities that have any programs in place to protect citizens from contaminants that will enter the river from watersheds that are currently being fracked. Additionally, the construction of Shell's ethane cracker in Monaca, Pa. and the possible siting of another ethane cracker in Belmont County will significantly increase the amount of pollution coming from well pads using high pressure hydraulic fracking in the watershed.

Peer reviewed studies show that many of the chemicals released through the process of fracking and plastics production are carcinogenic, endocrine disrupting, obesogenic and become persistent in the environment. Without ORSANCO's Organic Detection System, there is no way to ensure that spills or non-point pollutants will be detected.

In light of this, I have recommended my extended family consider purchasing a water filtration system to use for their residential drinking water.

I urge that ORSANCO seek secure avenues of permanent, long-term funding for the Organic Detection System. Additionally, in light of the petrochemical development, the ODS system, along with other testing programs, should be expanded. These additions might include:

- More GC/MS systems along the river
- More sampling sites, closer to regions affected by fracking and petrochemical facilities
- Keep triennial review in place
- Conduct a non-point source study (last one was 2003)
- Add VOC compounds that are found in fracking industry to ODS analysis

Update Tier II chemical storage data

People along the Ohio River Valley are counting on their water being safe for drinking. I am sure water consumers would be willing to pay a modest fee such as ten dollars a household to support additional testing financially, or ORSANCO might consider adding a fee per point source outfall for all industrial users of the river.

Please accept the following comments from the Sierra Club Hoosier Chapter.

The Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission's (ORSANCO) latest proposed Pollution Control Standards (PCS) recommendations are an improvement over the proposed action under consideration last year—referred to as Alternative 2—but the recommendations are not adequate and should be withdrawn.

ORSANCO should maintain the PCS standards and maintain the requirement that all states revise their state water quality standards and permitting programs to use the ORSANCO standards when issuing discharge permits into the Ohio River.

Setting pollution control standards is the most important work that ORSANCO performs. The majority of the mainstem states for which the standards is an issue already use these standards in their permitting decisions. Indiana and Pennsylvania do so as a matter of regulation, West Virginia does so as a matter of policy, and Kentucky incorporated the ORSANCO standards into its water quality standards for the Ohio until 2009, when it determined that except for three parameters, the state standards were equivalent to the ORSANCO standards. Ohio has a separate set of water quality standards for discharges into the Ohio River, which incorporate some, but not all, of the standards. Illinois does not use the ORSANCO standards at all in its permitting decisions.

The standards are the product of decades of deliberation by the ORSANCO technical committee and other committees, and by the commission itself, based on a determination that these standards are necessary and appropriate for improving the health of the river and maintaining water quality necessary to fully support all designated uses outlined in the Compact. The commission should not alter the applicability of the standards by making them “advisable” to accommodate the two mainstem states that do not currently use the standards or their equivalent. These standards are necessary to protect the Ohio River, which five million people rely on for drinking water. ORSANCO's proposal would make subtle changes to the language that would have serious impacts and leave key pollution control standards on the cutting room floor.

The draft PCS would eliminate the current mandate for states to adopt the PCS, making these protections optional. Currently, citizens can use the Compact to pressure state governors and the water quality agencies to do more to protect the Ohio River and the drinking water of five million people. If the standards become voluntary, our elected officials will be able to use that fact to avoid discussions and actions to improve the health of the Ohio River. A patchwork of standards will lead to confusion for businesses and be less cost-effective. Uniform standards provide cost-effective management for the Ohio River states as well as providing clarity for businesses applying for permits.

With our criticism of the current proposal, the Hoosier Chapter also wants to express its appreciation to the ORSANCO commissioners for hearing and acting on the public criticism of Alternative 2 expressed throughout 2018, and for the decision in October 2018 to take no action on Alternative 2 at the fall commission meeting. During 2018, Sierra Club chapters and the vast majority of the public expressed strong opposition to any action that would end ORSANCO's responsibility to set pollution control standards for the Ohio River as was proposed in Alternative 2. We thank you for hearing the public and rejecting this proposed action.

If the commission determines to move forward with the proposal that it has presented for public comment, it should defer adoption until an appendix to the PCS is developed that addresses the issues relating to implementation in order to make the process robust and to hold those states not using the standards accountable to the public and the other Compact states. These matters should be incorporated into an appendix, released for public review.

Final approval of the proposed revision to the PCS should be accompanied by revisions addressing each of these points:

- a. The notice and opportunity for Commission staff to review must be on a permit-by-permit basis. For those states not using ORSANCO standards or their state equivalent, the review should focus on whether the discharge permit limitations and other requirements of the draft permit provide comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals as if the ORSANCO standards were being used to set permit limits.
- b. The notice and opportunity for staff review should occur prior to the commencement of the public notice and comment process under a state's NPDES program. The staff determination regarding whether the draft permit provides comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals, should be placed into the record at the time that the draft permit is public-noticed and the public comment period begins.
- c. Any discharge permit proposed by a state not using the ORSANCO standards or their equivalent should include this fact in the public notice, state whether the ORSANCO review found the draft permit provided comparable protection, and mention that the ORSANCO determination is available for public review.
- d. In addition to the permit-by-permit review, ORSANCO staff should review and comment on the differences between the PCS standards and the water quality standards of each state during their triennial review processes, and each state not using the ORSANCO standards or equivalent standards should have to justify its decision not to adopt each of the standards into the state water quality regulations.

Finally, the river and watershed need nutrient criteria and standards. By revising the PCS to only apply to an "entity discharging sewage or industrial waste" ORSANCO may seek to avoid this responsibility. ORSANCO should work with the states to create such parameters, as has been done for the Great Lakes and the Chesapeake Bay. ORSANCO should take the lead

in setting numeric nutrient standards for the Ohio River. This need is longstanding and ORSANCO is in the best position to lead. In fact, ORSANCO reported that it was working on this in the most recent 2018 ORSANCO Annual Report.

The Sierra Club stands ready to work with ORSANCO to improve and protect the water quality in the Ohio River. We can help the public better understand what ORSANCO does and to build public support for your work. We reaffirm our opinion that ORSANCO's role of setting Ohio River Pollution Control Standards is the most important role for ORSANCO.

Dear Commissioners:

Pursuant to ORSANCO's Notice of Public Hearings and comment instructions dated March 1, 2019, The Ohio Manufacturers' Association (OMA) is hereby providing the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission (ORSANCO) with written comments in response to potential revisions to its Pollution Control Standards (PCS).

The OMA is dedicated to protecting and growing manufacturing in Ohio. The OMA represents more than 1,400 members in every manufacturing industry throughout Ohio. For more than 100 years, the OMA has supported reasonable, necessary and transparent environmental regulations that protect Ohio's citizens and resources.

The OMA would like to thank ORSANCO for the opportunity to provide additional comments and react to the Commission's most recent announcement concerning the PCS. The OMA appreciates the role ORSANCO plays in helping protect and preserve water quality in the Ohio River, as well as the Commission's role in collecting and providing data and information for the river's many stakeholders. This additional comment period offers an important opportunity to review the role of ORSANCO in light of both regulatory developments and improvements in water quality in the Ohio River since ORSANCO's inception more than 70 years ago.

When ORSANCO was created in 1948, the need for water quality improvements in the Ohio River was clear. Since the creation of ORSANCO, there have been numerous changes to the regulatory system, most notably the passage and enactment of the Clean Water Act and a comprehensive system of federal and state water quality programs and standards developed and implemented in all of the ORSANCO Compact states. As a result of these changes, there has been a dramatic improvement in the quality of the Ohio River, as well as its tributaries and other feeder streams.

Today, all the Compact States implement a federally-enforceable water quality program approved by the U.S. EPA. These programs have been effective in addressing each state's streams as aquatic habitats, as well as supporting their uses for recreation and drinking water.

The water quality goals of the Compact are being effectively addressed by the Clean Water

Act and the PCS no longer provide the value and impact they once did. Today, the differences between the PCS and Clean Water Act standards can and do lead to confusion for the manufacturing community. Moreover, these differences can create complications in the permitting process, where there is often no effective way to question or challenge the appropriateness or applicability of the underlying PCS in specific permitting situations.

The more valuable role for ORSANCO today is to concentrate on its scientific and technical information gathering and research. This would allow ORSANCO to provide valuable information to the states when carrying out their obligations to preserve and protect water quality under the Clean Water Act.

The OMA's response to the proposed modification is that the PCS should be removed from the ORSANCO program. The language, as proposed, is confusing and will only serve to cause misunderstanding and uncertainty, while failing to accomplish any additional environmental benefit.

If the Commission must keep the PCS in some form, we respectfully ask that clarification be added to address the litany of concerns expressed by interested parties about ORSANCO's advisory role and the obligations of member states in regards to the PCS. We also ask that language be added to clarify that member states set applicable water quality standards, and that any existing PCS are simply recommendations and guidance set for member states. It should be a priority of the Commissioners to provide clarity so that regulators and the public interacting with ORSANCO understand and can be supportive of the ongoing mission.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments. We look forward to working with the Commission throughout this process, and appreciate the opportunity to convey our most recent thoughts. We look forward in participating in any future meetings or comment periods regarding the PCS as the Commission further evaluates the program.

To Whom It May Concern:

The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce (the Kentucky Chamber) and Greater Louisville Inc. (GLI), (collectively, the "Chambers"), appreciate the opportunity to submit comments for the public review on the Commission's 2019 proposed revisions to the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards – 2015 Revision (the PCS).

The Chambers originally commented in August of 2018 in support of the 2015 previously proposed revisions to the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards, and the underlying conditions supporting the Chambers' position then still exist today. Specifically, since ORSANCO was created in 1948, the federal Clean Water Act has been enacted and a comprehensive system of federal and state water quality programs and standards has been developed and implemented in all the ORSANCO Compact States. As a result, the PCS are duplicative of the Compact States' efforts leading to costly and inefficient means of regulating water quality. Further, the separate conditions for the Ohio River relative to other waterways creates confusion and uncertainties, and there is often no effective way to question or challenge the appropriateness or applicability of the PCS in specific permitting situations.

The Chambers appreciate the role played by ORSANCO since 1948 in protecting and preserving water quality in the Ohio River and in collecting and disseminating water quality data and information on the river. The previous revision would have afforded ORSANCO a greater ability to concentrate on its scientific and technical information gathering and research. Resources currently devoted to the PCS program could have been more effectively used to support other ORSANCO programs that did not overlap with state and federal water quality programs, and that provided real added value to the States.

We welcome the opportunity to provide input on this new proposal but ultimately believe the previously proposed revision was most appropriate to address the inefficiencies and cost of the duplicative efforts between ORSANCO and the Compact States.

Comments

If the Commission feels compelled to follow the approach embodied by its current proposal and to maintain the PCS largely unaltered, it should revise the proposal to clarify that:

- (i) The water quality standards and permitting provisions of each State's USEPA-approved NPDES permitting program are presumptively comparable to the water quality protections afforded by the PCS;
- (ii) Any NPDES permit issued pursuant to one of those USEPA-approved programs will be presumed to meet the goals and requirements of the ORSANCO Compact; and
- (iii) The burden of proof is on the Commission, after due notice, investigation and hearing, to demonstrate that any such NPDES does *not* provide "comparable" use protection and achievement of the Compact's goals as provided by the PCS, and that a permit applicant may challenge any such determination in a court of proper jurisdiction.

As currently drafted, the Commission's proposal will only create more confusion and uncertainty about both the role of ORSANCO in water quality regulation and when and how States and permittees must address and incorporate the PCS in permits for discharges to the Ohio River. Without the clarifications identified above, the proposal will merely increase the significant costs and inefficiencies associated with the PCS program, putting businesses along the Ohio River at a competitive disadvantage and creating a disincentive for further business investment within the Compact States.

- Basis for Comments on ORSANCO's Current PCS Proposal

Although this new formulation suggests that the PCS would become advisory in nature, the overall structure and content of the PCS seem to undercut this conclusion. Rather than providing the desired flexibility, the proposed revisions threaten to maintain the existing rigid burdens and unnecessary duplication of the current PCS, while creating considerable new

ambiguity and uncertainty concerning how ORSANCO will use its commenting and enforcement authorities under the Compact and the revised PCS to ensure that State-issued permits provide “comparable” use protections.

- The Commission’s current proposal would maintain the existing, comprehensive provisions of the PCS regarding water quality criteria (Chapter 3), mixing zone designations (Chapter 4), and wastewater discharge requirements (Chapter 5). Those provisions contain extensive, detailed, and prescriptive requirements that ORSANCO presumably deems necessary to protect and preserve the designated uses of the Ohio River. The continued existence of those detailed standards will likely have an inordinately presumptive effect on each State’s determination of what permit terms are required to provide “comparable” use protections, as required by the revised PCS. Thus, while purportedly only requiring that States “consider” the detailed PCS, the effect is likely to be much more prescriptive.
- The revised PCS retain numerous requirements that are inconsistent with, and in some cases unnecessarily more stringent than, the water quality standards adopted by the States and approved by USEPA. The possibility that ORSANCO will continue the implementation and enforcement of these provisions through its enforcement authority raises the specter that States will be forced to incorporate unnecessary and burdensome requirements in their NPDES permits that provide no demonstrable additional environmental benefit for the Ohio River.
- The current PCS proposal retains provisions for the issuance of variances from the mixing zone and wastewater discharge requirements of the PCS (Section 1.6) and for approval of alternative site-specific water quality criteria for specific constituents (Section 1.7). It is unclear why these variance and site-specific water quality criteria provisions are still included in the PCS if their use is voluntary in nature, suggesting that ORSANCO will continue to view the PCS as mandatory.
- The Commission’s proposal contains conflicting signals regarding the continued role and applicability of the detailed water quality criteria set out in Chapter 3. The highly detailed and prescriptive water quality criteria have been retained without alteration in the current proposal. Moreover, portions of those water quality criteria are incorporated by reference in the wastewater discharge requirements for chemical constituents set forth in Section 5.3 of the revised PCS.
- The process for adoption and revision of the PCS, including individual water quality criteria and discharge requirements, continues to provide no opportunity for affected parties to challenge the appropriateness or applicability of the PCS.
- The Commission’s authority under Article IX of the Compact to issue orders to *compel compliance* with the requirements of the Compact reinforces the concern that the unaltered PCS will be used to override State NPDES permitting decisions.

The clear result of this change will be greater uncertainty and inefficiency in the permitting process and increased costs for the regulated community who must decipher what the final terms of a proposed NPDES permit may be. Without substantial additional revisions as suggested herein, the proposed retention of the PCS in their current form will serve, in essence, as a mandatory baseline for all permits authorizing discharges into the Ohio River.

It is also noteworthy that ORSANCO’s By-Laws require the review of the PCS on a triennial basis. By maintaining the extensive, complex provisions of Chapters 3, 4, and 5 of the PCS, ORSANCO will be required to expend extensive time and staff resources every three years to review and update the PCS – despite the fact that they are purportedly advisory in nature and

are not needed to protect the quality of the Ohio River. In a time of limited public budgets and numerous pressing demands, ORSANCO should not be expending precious resources on a task that duplicates the States' own exhaustive triennial reviews under the Clean Water Act.

In sum, the Chambers believe removing the PCS is the best strategy moving forward. However, if the Commission chooses to retain the detailed provisions of the PCS in their current form, it should explicitly state that the States' USEPA-approved NPDES programs and the permits issued thereunder provide comparable protection of the designated uses of the Ohio River and achievement of the goals of the Compact as provided under the PCS.

The Chambers appreciate the role played by ORSANCO since 1948 in protecting and preserving water quality in the Ohio River and in collecting and disseminating water quality data and information on the river. ORSANCO's unique, multi-state role makes it especially important in collecting and analyzing scientific and technical information about the Ohio River system. The Chambers encourage ORSANCO to concentrate on those activities. Resources currently devoted to the PCS program could be more effectively used to support other ORSANCO programs that are not duplicated by the States.

As Kentucky continues to compete with other states, especially those in the Southeast not impacted by the ORSANCO PCS, many factors will impact whether industry locates in the Commonwealth. Energy costs, infrastructure investment, tax code, and readiness of the workforce are certainly considerations but so are the perceived and real challenges associated with permitting. As Kentucky continues to set investment records, we must be careful to address regulatory inefficiencies and irregularities that limit our competitiveness relative to other states.

Thank you again for the opportunity to comment on the Commission's proposed revisions to the ORSANCO PCS.

I was present at the Pittsburgh public hearing and delivered these comments. My verbal comments departed somewhat from the text of our official comments, however, so I am sending these today to be sure that the full text of our comments gets entered into the record of public comment on the current PCS proposal.

Here are our (Ohio Valley Environmental Coalition) comments:

OVEC Comments: ORSANCO pollution control standards proposed revisions 2019

1. The new ORSANCO proposed revision to the PCS are welcome improvements to the 2018 proposal as it keeps the PCS intact.
2. We are concerned, however, that the current proposal makes standards discretionary, weakening their intent to protect the integrity of the Ohio River's valuable natural resources. While standards in existing permits may not be able to be removed due to anti-backsliding provisions, new permits however might not take the PCS into consideration.
3. The current proposal provides a permit by permit review of standards by the states that preserve the uses of the River, but there needs to be accountability of equivalent levels of protection. ORSANCO alleges "no single standard...is applicable...due to variable factors..." but, it is important that ORSANCO establish baseline uniform reference discharge standards and mechanisms for holding states accountable.
4. Although ORSANCO's role will not change in developing standards, all member states should be strongly advised that these standards represent the best means of maintaining the designated "uses" of the River.
5. The river and watershed need nutrient criteria and standards. By revising the PCS to only apply to "entity discharging sewage or industrial waste" ORSANCO avoids this responsibility. If this is the intent, ORSANCO should be working with watershed states to create such parameters, similar to efforts on the Great Lakes and Chesapeake Bay.
6. Pre-dating the Clean Water Act, the states in the Compact took it into their own hands to protect the integrity of the Ohio River and made a commitment to protecting to special uses of the River. We believe that all states should adopt and implement ORSANCO's PCS, but we accept this option as an **interim** measure. This current PCS is acceptable under the condition that:
 - a. ORSANCO works towards requiring all states to adopt and implement the PCS or

equivalent.

- b. States are only allowed to deviate from PCS for good scientific reasons [or based on sound and verifiable social and economic justification].
- c. Policies and procedures are developed to respond if a state proposes to deviate from PCS; i.e. that state needs to inform the other states, provide public notice of its intention to deviate from PCS and why, and allow for the public and other states to comment on the proposal. The notice and opportunity for staff review should occur *prior* to the commencement of the public notice and comment process under the state's NPDES program, and the staff determination regarding whether the draft permit provides comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals, should be placed into record at the time that the draft permit is public-noticed and the public comment period begins.
- d. Official policies and procedures are developed to continue to monitor for deviations from ORSANCO standards and are ready for public distribution and implementation by the October commission meeting.
- e. ORSANCO should maintain the triennial review process; developing a report available to the public every 3 years to compare USEPA criteria and ORSANCO PCS with each state standards for all parameters is a very valuable process and should not be extended to longer intervals between reports. In addition to the permit-by-permit review, ORSANCO staff should review and comment on the differences between the PCS standards and the water quality standards of each state during their triennial review process, and each state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS or the equivalent standard should be obligated justify the decision not to adopt each of the PCS into the state water quality regulations.
- f. ORSANCO should continue to perform all essential functions, find stable financing for current staff levels, and seek funding for additional staffing in order to make sure all permit reviews, research, and regular water monitoring can be done in the same timeframes as currently are happening.

Our **additional concerns** arise from the probable buildup of oil and gas industrial facilities along the Ohio River, and the fact that these facilities do not have to abide by the same environmental regulations as many other industrial facilities do. Also, there is a possibility of increased cumulative pollutants entering the River due to the current ORSANCO PCS proposal, if/when some states disregard ORSANCO standards and put in place lesser standards. We fear the possibility of a "race to the bottom" in terms of diminishing state pollution control standards. This could result in increased spills and pollutant releases.

Therefore, we would strongly advocate for additional water sampling sites being added to the current Organic Detection System, to allow for a better coverage, and earlier detection of spills and harmful pollution level increases. In essence, we need an effective early warning system far enough upstream of each source water intake to allow for notification of residents, and the possibility of these systems being shut down if/when necessary. Per our experience during the 2014 MCHM pollutant plume event, this was not possible (and might not still be possible) for the Huntington intakes – which is where I and my entire immediate family live, and where OVEC's office is based.

Please, protect our water!

I submit these comments on behalf of the West Virginia Rivers Coalition and our members relating to the 2019 proposed revisions to the Pollution Control Standards (PCS).

We are pleased the Commission revised its 2018 proposal in a way that does not completely eliminate the PCS. This move affirms that the PCS plays an important role in helping improve and maintain water quality along the entire length of the river. We applaud the Commission's effort to reach consensus to keep the PCS intact.

However, the 2019 proposal still undermines the effectiveness and consistency of application of the by making PCS implementation voluntary. West Virginia is an example of a state that utilizes the PCS as a matter of policy. It would be unfair and detrimental to allow other states off the hook for PCS adoption. We believe all states should adopt and implement ORSANCO's PCS or equivalent ones, and view the 2019 proposal as an interim measure that requires improvements in terms of directing its implementation. We recommend the following be incorporated into an Appendix to the PCS and released for public review/comment:

1. The notice and opportunity for Commission staff review must be on a permit-by-permit basis. For those states not utilizing ORSANCO standards or their equivalent state counterpart, the review should focus on whether the discharge permit limitations and other requirements of the draft permit provide comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals as if the ORSANCO standards were being utilized to set permit limits.
2. The notice and opportunity for staff review should occur *prior* to the commencement of the public notice and comment process under the state's NPDES program, and the staff determination regarding whether the draft permit provides comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals, should be placed into record at the time that the draft permit is public-noticed and the public comment period begins.
3. Any discharge permit proposed by a state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS standards or their equivalent, should include in the public notice a notation of this fact, whether the ORSANCO review found the draft permit provided comparable protection, and that the ORSANCO determination is available for public review.
4. In addition to the permit-by-permit review, ORSANCO staff should review and comment on the differences between the PCS standards and the water quality standards of each state during their triennial review process, and each state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS or the equivalent standard should be obligated to justify the decision not to adopt each of the PCS into the state water quality regulations.

Additionally, we would support ORSANCO leading the development of nutrient criteria and standards. We are concerned that revising the PCS to only apply to "entity discharging sewage or industrial waste", ORSANCO avoids this responsibility.

The Pollution Control Standards are the product of decades of deliberation by the Technical Committee and other committees of ORSANCO, and of the Commission itself, based on a determination that these standards were necessary and appropriate for improving the health of the river and maintaining water quality necessary to fully support all designated uses outlined in the

Compact. To be fair to West Virginia, a state that has followed the PCS, there should be accountability mechanisms in place to see that all states are doing their part and that there is a “level playing field” when it comes to dischargers up and down the river. It makes no sense to have discharge limits on one side of the river vary from limits on the other side. Otherwise, we are setting up a “race to the bottom” in which states with more lenient standards than the PCS (and those downstream from those states) stand to shoulder more pollution and its effects.

In the past 14 months, ORSANCO has solicited stakeholder and public input on several different proposals and has received overwhelming support for continuation of the PCS in its current form. We maintain our position that all member states should be required to adopt the ORSANCO PCS standards into their state water quality standards. These standards represent the best available science that take into account the entire river system. Moreover, Article VI of the Compact authorizes the Commission "to adopt, prescribe and promulgate rules, regulations and standards for administering and enforcing the provisions of this article". We expect the Commission to uphold its role in maintaining the health of the Ohio River and prescribe as rule the PCS to enforce the standards or requirements of the Compact throughout the river system.

The current proposal makes the PCS discretionary, weakening their ability to protect the integrity of the river system and allows for a state by state approach to managing the River. However, ORSANCO has not provided any rationale for allowing a state by state approach for Ohio River standards. The lack of adoption/implementation by the states of the PCS into state standards appears to be the driving force behind the proposal but no information or analysis has been provided. Eliminating the expectation and requirement for the PCS to address states out of compliance with adoption of the PCS is misguided and short sighted. A state by state by state approach results in a river segment by river segment approach defined by state boundaries, thereby precluding management of the river as a system. 1. Page 2, Paragraph 4: this paragraph lacks information about different scenarios other than the one presented and provides no information about the ramifications of any such scenario. The

paragraph includes language for a scenario that a “...discharge permit issued pursuant to the Clean Water Act or other federal or state law may not contain requirements addressing one or more of the Pollution Control Standards.” This is a singular situation and does not identify the potential scenario that a discharge permit may include requirements that conflict with the PCS.

2. The proposal neglects to describe or make any reference to any process or procedures should either of these scenarios occur. This language leaves open many questions about implementation including:
 - o What benchmarks will ORSANCO use to ensure compliance with the beneficial uses?
 - o What is the obligation of the state to respond to ORSANCO’s review?
3. The proposal calls for the states to provide notice and an opportunity *to the Commission* of any draft or proposed permit. We have grave concern the proposal does not include any obligation by the states to inform the public of any variation in a discharge permit from the PCS. For the PCS to have value, there must be transparency in any variation from its application. This is a role for the states to implement as they bear the responsibility for any proposed variation.
4. No justification has been provided as to why a state by state approach is preferred. We have yet to see any analysis that describes how this approach benefits the river that member states to the Compact have agreed to manage collectively. Once again we ask the question, what is the problem we are trying to solve? Without any justification, one presumes the rationale is that it is easier for the states “to go their own way” without the challenges of complying with the PCS. It is easy to understand why a state might prefer an easier course of action but we maintain that is acting solely in their own interests and not in the interests of the basics tenets of the Compact all states have signed on to.
5. The proposal does not make any reference to how ORSANCO will develop the 305(b) report nor the triennial review, a critical process to ensure the standards are kept up to date.
6. We oppose the provision in the proposal for ORSANCO to utilize the NPDES review to determine states adherence with the standards and designated uses. ORSANCO should review the states' proposed standards for alignment with the PCS and make a determination about the appropriateness of the proposal.

In summary, this proposal does not include any protocol for proposed variances from the PCS to include a science-based justification, opportunity for public review and comment and an ORSANCO review. There is no inclusion of any process for resolution should a state’s proposed variance conflict with ORSANCO or public review. We are opposed to the 2019 proposed revision and maintain that the PCS should continue with the expectation for full adoption by the member states that border the river.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am submitting these comments as Chair of ORSANCO's Watershed Organizations Advisory Subcommittee ("WOAC") and Executive Director of Ohio River Foundation ("ORF"), in response to the current proposal of ORSANCO to make changes to the PCS.

Briefly, we are encouraged by the improved proposal that the current incarnation represents from that proposed in 2018. However, while ORSANCO now proposes to retain many of its activities relative to the PCS it makes adoption of ORSANCO's work by the states optional and provides too much regulatory flexibility. Therefore, we cannot support the proposal in its current form, but encourage ORSANCO to continue to work on the current proposal to achieve a more acceptable and agreeable one. Our objections to, and concerns about, the current proposal are more fully discussed below.

ORSANCO's History and Authority

The Ohio River flows almost a thousand miles through six states, with more states included in its drainage basin. In 1948, eight of those states – Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia – signed the interstate compact that created ORSANCO and established the commitment of those states to "enact any necessary legislation to enable each such State to place and maintain the waters of said basin in a satisfactory sanitary condition, available for safe and satisfactory use as public and industrial water supplies after reasonable treatment, suitable for recreational usage, capable of maintaining fish and other aquatic life, free from unsightly or malodorous nuisances due to floating solids or sludge deposits, and adaptable to such other uses as may be legitimate." The Compact provides ORSANCO with authority to promulgate rules and issue orders to ensure that "[a]ll industrial wastes discharged or permitted to flow into the aforesaid waters shall be modified or treated, within a time reasonable for the construction of the necessary works, in order to protect the public health or to preserve the waters for [these uses] . . . to such degree as may be determined to be necessary by the Commission after investigation, due notice and hearing."

As early as 1949, ORSANCO began putting in place water treatment standards to carry out this obligation. In 1972, Congress enacted the "Clean Water Act" ("CWA") as we know it today, and in 1984 ORSANCO revised its standards to mirror the Clean Water Act structure of designated uses, water quality criteria to protect those uses, and effluent limitations (including mixing zone requirements and a variance procedure). ORSANCO has since reviewed and updated these Pollution Control Standards every three years.

ORSANCO's stated purpose is to control pollution of the Ohio River. That's a vital role: the Clean

Water Act and other federal water laws do not do a good job of regulating multi-state waters, like the Ohio River.

Several WOAC member organizations will submit in their written comments that ORSANCO's Compact requires certain behavior by ORSANCO in mandating state regulatory action and adoption of standards. Furthermore, they will point out that ORSANCO's current position that the actions of states, vis-à-vis ORSANCO's standards can be voluntary contradicts the mandate dictated under the Compact. We will leave it to those commenters for a further discussion, notwithstanding that any enforcement of the Compact may rely solely on ORSANCO and not be available for citizens to enforce as it may do so under the Clean Water Act. Thus, citizens rely on ORSANCO to "police" the states for compliance with the Compact, even though it has rarely (or never) issued orders or employed use of its Compact police powers.

For decades, the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission (ORSANCO) has issued water quality standards for the river that have been adopted, in whole or part, by several Ohio River states. The states along the river (Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, Illinois and Pennsylvania) either develop their own water quality standards or adopt ORSANCO standards. There is disparity as to how different states arrive at their standards, and the permits they issue businesses to pollute the river reflect that difference. Furthermore, for more than 100 pollutants, ORSANCO issues standards where no state guidelines exist. In keeping with its bylaws and mission, ORSANCO should be the driving force for uniformity in pollution control for this multi-state river. If different conditions exist along the 981-mile river, then ORSANCO should work with the states to develop standards that are appropriate and fair and do not abridge downriver states' rights or conditions.

In some cases, ORSANCO's standards may be different than state standards. This should motivate ORSANCO and the states to reconcile differences. Instead, some states are exerting enormous pressure on ORSANCO to relinquish its standards setting role or make the adoption of any standard optional, with the expectation that all the states will agree to appropriate standards protective of each state's water quality. This is a risky bet where interstate cooperation is susceptible to state political interests. Setting standards is hard work on behalf of the public interest that should be embraced and vigorously pursued. ORSANCO should not make adoption of any of its standards optional, unless bona fide exceptions exist as allowed under the Clean Water Act.

Abdicating its role and responsibility is an affront to millions of people who depend on the river as their sole source of drinking water. Citizens at a public hearing voiced their concerns and news outlets in Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, West Virginia and Pennsylvania have published articles questioning the merit of this proposal. The public and some states have valid concerns, and ORSANCO should not turn a deaf ear or blind eye.

The Value of River-Wide Water Quality Criteria

As discussed above, there are clearly significant inconsistencies among state standards for the Ohio River that require further investigation before ORSANCO can draw any conclusions. Meanwhile, the affirmative value of river-wide criteria is clear. There have already been a number of instances where ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards have and will continue to play an important role in protecting water quality in the Ohio River.

For example, over the last decade ORSANCO has acted to address a growing concern with levels of

Total Dissolved Solids (“TDS”) in the Ohio River, by using an expedited PCS process in 2012 to reinstate a (previously eliminated) limit of 500 mg/L at drinking water intakes in order to protect drinking water quality. ORSANCO staff have subsequently conducted valuable research regarding background levels of TDS in order to support translation of that standard into appropriate permit limits. See ORSANCO, Characterization of Dissolved Solids in the Ohio River and Selected Tributaries (Feb. 2014), *available at* <http://www.orsanco.org/wp-content/uploads/2016/12/Characterization-of-Dissolved-Solids-in-the-Ohio-River-and-Selected-Tribuatries.pdf>. This is an instance where ORSANCO, because of its triennial PCS review process, was well-positioned to react swiftly to a unique Ohio River problem and provide drinking water protection along the entire river, backed up by sound science and expertise. Without the PCS process, it is not clear when affected states – themselves facing budget constraints – might have dealt with this problem and what resources they might have to use to do so. The Water Users Advisory Committee comments similarly identify pollutants such as ammonia, E. coli, temperature, and others as ones where ORSANCO’s standards provide important, uniform water quality protection across the entire Ohio River to the benefit of states as well as their citizens.

Even where addressing a given pollutant is simply a matter of adopting water quality criteria issued by U.S. EPA, ORSANCO can do so efficiently in order to bring the PCS up-to-date for the entire Ohio River at one time. As one example, ORSANCO has repeatedly indicated its readiness to adopt an updated U.S. EPA aquatic life criterion for selenium. Now that the federal criteria have been issued (in summer 2016), ORSANCO can do so. Notably, some states will not be conducting triennial reviews in which they would address this development for some time – for instance, West Virginia adopted fish tissue limits based on the draft criteria in 2016, but apparently will not address the water column limits in the final criterion until its next triennial review in 2020. By addressing this issue in its 2018 PCS review, ORSANCO will ensure those additional protections are in place significantly earlier. Moreover, in addressing this and other federal criteria, ORSANCO can determine on a river-wide basis whether those criteria are appropriate for the Ohio River rather than leaving individual member states to do so, with potentially disparate results.

Water Quality Assessment for the Ohio River

Sections 305(b) and 303(d) of the federal Clean Water Act require each state to conduct an assessment of the status of its waters every two years and make a determination as to whether those waters are “impaired” by any pollutant. 33 U.S.C. § 1315(b); 33 U.S.C. § 1313(d); 40 C.F.R. §§ 130.7, 130.8. ORSANCO has prepared a biennial section 305(b) assessment for the Ohio River ever since 2002, offering an expert view “of the degree to which the river supports each of its four designated uses: warm water aquatic life; public water supply; contact recreation; and fish consumption.” Although ORSANCO’s section 305(b) report does not substitute for each state’s duty to assess and determine the impairment status of the portions of the Ohio River within its jurisdiction, the Ohio River states have traditionally relied heavily on ORSANCO’s work in carrying out these Clean Water Act obligations. Often, states simply adopt ORSANCO’s evaluation and conclusions wholesale in determining the impairment status of the Ohio River.

State Adoption of ORSANCO Standards

Importantly, it has recently come to our attention that ORSANCO may be placing undue importance on a recent Ohio ERAC decision involving Dayton Power & Light (DPL). The major holding in that administrative court case was that Ohio EPA did not follow state law (Ohio Revised Code) in adopting an ORSANCO standard or criteria. The court never ruled on whether or not Ohio could adopt the ORSANCO standard, only that it did not properly follow state law in doing so. Note, that this case was not reviewed by other state courts and did not get beyond an administrative proceeding. Consequently, ORSANCO and its member states placing any importance on this ruling should limit it to the fact that any state seeking to adopt an ORSANCO standard should follow all applicable state laws relative to rulemaking and administrative procedure.

Conclusion

Any proposal for ORSANCO to enable states to avoid adopting its standards is obviously a significant policy change. Fundamentally, we believe that the current PCS process is in fact efficient and focused on the areas where ORSANCO is needed most and adoption of the PCS should be mandated, unless a state has a justifiable reason, as mentioned below.

Nevertheless, if ORSANCO does decide to refine its approach to the PCS, we urge the Commission to ensure it avoids throwing the baby out with the bathwater and preserves the PCS as a valuable tool for providing efficient and effective water quality standards across the whole Ohio River.

Before the Commission determines the wisest course of action, it must conduct further analysis of these key assumptions:

1. Pre-dating the Clean Water Act, the states in the Compact took it into their own hands to protect the integrity of the Ohio River and made a commitment to protecting to special uses of the River. We believe that all states should adopt and implement ORSANCO's PCS, but [with amendments] we view this option as an interim measure.
2. The current proposal makes standards adoption discretionary, weakening their intent to protect the integrity of River's valuable natural resources. While standards in existing permits may not be able to be removed due to anti-backsliding provisions, new permits however might not take the PCS into consideration, but instead may rely on a weaker state standard
3. The current proposal provides a permit by permit review of standards by the states that preserve the uses of the River, but there needs to be accountability of equivalent levels of protection. ORSANCO alleges "no single standard...is applicable...due to variable factors..."; but, it is important that ORSANCO establish baseline uniform reference discharge standards and mechanisms for holding states accountable.
4. Although ORSANCO's role will not change in developing standards, states should be advised that these standards represent the best means of maintaining the uses of the River.
5. The river and watershed need nutrient criteria and standards. By revising the PCS to

only apply to “entity discharging sewage or industrial waste” ORSANCO avoids this responsibility. If this is the intent, ORSANCO should be working with watershed states to create such nutrient parameters, similar to efforts on the Great Lakes and Chesapeake Bay.

Furthermore, the following conditions need to be added/addressed in the 2019 PCS proposal:

1. ORSANCO must work towards requiring all states to adopt and implement the PCS or equivalent ones;
2. states are only allowed to deviate from PCS for reasons justified under the Clean Water Act;
3. policies and procedures are developed to respond if a state proposes to deviate from PCS, such as a state needs to inform the other states, provide public notice of its intention to deviate from PCS and why, and allow for the public and other states to comment on the proposal;
4. policies and procedures are developed to continue to monitor for state deviations from ORSANCO standards and are ready for implementation by the October 2019 commission meeting;
5. ORSANCO should develop a report available to the public every 3 years to compare USEPA criteria, the PCS, and each state standards for all parameters;
6. ORSANCO should continue to perform permit reviews and outline this process in its policies and procedures.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide these comments and look forward to working with the Commission to make any improvements to the PCS that will have the end result of protecting and improving the condition of the Ohio River and avoid any risk of jeopardizing gains made in the last 70 years.

Dear Commissioners:

These comments are submitted on behalf of FreshWater Accountability Project ("FreshWater"), an Ohio-based non-profit organization dedicated to protecting our freshwater resources, with members throughout the Ohio River Valley. FreshWater asks the Commission to maintain the Pollution Control Standards ("PCS") as mandates to the states. Further, ORSANCO needs to work with the states to ensure they are going through the necessary administrative processes to adopt, implement, and enforce the PCS in their respective permitting processes. ORSANCO is charged with this sort of coordinating role and the Ohio River and the people who rely on it would be well-served by ORSANCO stepping into this much needed coordinating role. The Clean Water Act and the existence of the U.S. EPA has not eliminated the extreme difficulty of abating pollution and maintaining and improving water quality in large water bodies subject to multi-state jurisdiction. Indeed, the Ohio River continues to urgently need the sort of coordinating role that only ORSANCO can provide.

While admittedly preferable to eliminating the PCS altogether, the current proposal will result in inconsistent standards between states and will not reliably account for downstream impacts to the Ohio River for releases in a given state. It increases state vulnerability to political pressure to relax water quality standards in the Ohio River and facilitates a race to the bottom as states seek to become more attractive to industrial development.

By removing the mandate that states adopt the PCS in their respective permitting regimes, ORSANCO is creating a duplication of efforts among states and ORSANCO. Instead of one entity setting standards for the Ohio River, states can perform the same task without any coordination, resulting in an immense waste of resources in addressing the immediate and very real needs of the Ohio River and the people who rely on it. Removing the mandate also leads to confusion about the standards applicable to the River, making it difficult for citizens to understand an already complicated framework. Having states set their own standards for the Ohio River also complicates assessing attainment of the river's uses and presents

significant hurdles for completing the Clean Water Act's 305(b) and 303(d) reports.

This proposal lacks detail regarding ORSANCO's permit review process, and until that detail is provided to the public for its input and review, it should not be approved. ORSANCO's permit review process should be publicly noticed. That public notice should alert the public when the review is of a permit that is not implementing the PCS. ORSANCO's review should include the drafting and submission of comments by ORSANCO to the state agency and made publicly available. These comments should explain whether the permit has met the PCS, and, if it has met PCS equivalency, the scientific basis for that decision. The public should have the opportunity to review and consider these comments before the end of the public comment period, so they can incorporate that information in their own review. ORSANCO should also give states clear direction on what must be supplied by the state permitting agency or the polluter in order to prove that PCS equivalency has been achieved by the permit. The current proposal contains none of these requirements, and any permit-by-permit review could be rendered entirely superficial as a result. Until detailed requirements are set forth regarding the ORSANCO permit review process, this proposal is unacceptable and must be rejected as a weakening of water quality standards in the Ohio River.

Lastly, the proposal is a clear departure from ORSANCO's purpose as stated in its founding compact and the intentions of the founding states in entering into the compact and forming the Commission. The Compact's preamble states:

[T]he growth in industrial activity within [the Ohio River basin], [has] resulted in recent years in an increasingly serious pollution of the waters and streams within the said drainage basin, constituting a grave menace to the health, welfare and recreational facilities of the people living in such basin, and occasioning great economic loss...

The control of future pollution and the abatement of existing pollution in the waters of [the Ohio River] basin are of prime importance to the people thereof, and can best be accomplished through the cooperation of the States situated therein, by and through a joint or common agency

The Ohio River continues to face pollution from industry, including a proposed petrochemical build-out and increased oil and gas development, both of which come with their own set of known and emergent pollutants. The states' intent in signing ORSANCO's compact is just as relevant now as it was at the time of signing. FreshWater implores ORSANCO to step into the authority it holds and use its unique role for the betterment of the Ohio River by ensuring the PCS are adopted, implemented, and enforced by the states.

RE: 2019 Review of the Pollution Control Standards for the Ohio River

Dear ORSANCO Staff and Commissioners,

Please accept the following comments from the Lower Ohio River Waterkeeper into the record of the 2019 Review of Pollution Control Standards (PCS) for the Ohio River.

1. The proposed 2019 PCS revisions do not represent the message sent by nearly 6000 members of the public that use and/or appreciate the health of the Ohio River that ORSANCO should not eliminate or weaken the 2015 PCS. The receipt of nearly 6000 comments to retain the 2015 PCS demonstrates immense trust in ORSANCO to develop standards the states adopt and implement that maintain and improve the health of the Ohio River. ORSANCO should not diminish or relinquish the critical role the public has entrusted in the Compact and ORSANCO's commissioners and staff.
2. The proposed 2019 PCS revisions should be withdrawn or voted down and the Commission and ORSANCO staff should move on with its activities operating with the 2015 PCS.
3. Language should be adopted into the by-laws and the PCS that a Compact state discharging to the Ohio River **SHALL** adopt and implement ORSANCO's PCS.
4. Every state, including those that have not fully adopted ORSANCO standards but participated in developing the standards with no intention of full implementation, should fully adopt ORSANCO's 2015 PCS as part of its next triennial review and specifically cite ORSANCO's 2015 PCS in their water quality standards as the primacy requirement for every NPDES discharge to the Ohio River.
5. Any approval and adoption of the proposed 2019 PCS should be suspended until ORSANCO produces an appendix to the PCS that is provided to the public as part of another public comment period displaying how the new standards and agreements will be implemented to achieve equivalency with the PCS and goals each state has




committed to as a member of the Compact for decades. If the proposed 2019 PCS is adopted:

- ORSANCO staff should review every NPDES prior to state public notice and issuance on a permit-by-permit basis.
- ORSANCO staff's review of a NPDES from any state not fully implementing the PCS should analyze the entirety of the permit and all other requirements present or absent in the proposed NPDES to guarantee the permit achieves equivalent designated use protection, effluent limit calculations, and comparable attainment of the Compact's purpose and protections as application of the PCS would have required.
- ORSANCO staff's determination should be included in the draft NPDES prior to the state's public notice.
- Every NPDES public notice from state's not fully adopting ORSANCO's standards should note the specific variance from the PCS and provide ORSANCO's determination of equivalency for public review.
- In addition to ORSANCO staff's permit-by-permit review of every NPDES, ORSANCO staff should review every triennial review of states not fully adopting and implementing the PCS for variation between the PCS and state water quality standards. ORSANCO's analysis of the state's water quality standards should be provided as part of the state's public notice of the triennial review.
- Every state not fully adopting and implementing the PCS should be required to provide justification for each variation from the PCS in the triennial review.

Thank you for addressing the Lower Ohio River Waterkeeper's concerns with the proposed 2019 Review of the Pollution Control Standards for the Ohio River. Please mail ORSANCO's Response to Comments on the proposed PCS revisions to the address provided at the top of this correspondence.

On behalf of the City of Evansville, it is my pleasure to present this letter of opinion regard ORSANCO's proposed revisions to Pollution Control Standards for discharges into the Ohio River.

The City of Evansville believes that ORSANCO should abandon the thought of revising the standards currently in place, and improve the current criteria. Modifying existing standards has the potential to place downstream communities in peril if all states along the Ohio River are not adhering to consistent pollution control standards.

Weakening the objectives of current pollution control standards will not ensure the highest possible water quality possible along the entire length of the Ohio River. In fact, for my constituents, who deserve the best water quality available, the overall standards could actually be strengthened and more protective, especially for nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrates.

Pollution control standards along the magnificent Ohio River should be more than mere guidelines open to multiple interpretations from state to state. The standards should not be voluntary. Ideally, all states along the river would modify their quality and permitting controls in order that the ORSANCO standards can be employed.

As I referenced in my previous communication to this body last August, ORSANCO has provided invaluable support to the Evansville Water and Sewer Utility relating to water quality for several decades. That assistance is appreciated by both the professional staff of our utility, and by our greater community.

I am grateful for the opportunity to represent the feelings of the City of Evansville in this matter. Thank you for your thoughtful consideration.

The League of Women Voters believes that environmental protection and pollution control are responsibilities shared by all levels of government. Standards must be enforced in a timely, consistent and equitable manner. The League of Women Voters of Louisville, residing on and taking our drinking water from the Ohio River, is therefore concerned with the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission proposal to revise the Pollution Control Standards.

1. We ask that ORSANCO reject the proposed 2019 Revised Pollution Control Standards.

Maintain the current PCS standards, and require all states to revise their state water quality standards and discharge-permitting programs to utilize the ORSANCO standards when issuing discharge permits.

The Pollution Control Standards are the product of decades of deliberation by the Commission and its committees, based on a determination that these standards are necessary and appropriate for improving the health of the river and maintaining water quality necessary to fully support all uses outlined in the Compact. The Commission *should not alter the applicability of PCS standards by making them "advisable" to accommodate two mainstream states who apparently do not currently utilize the standards.*

2. We recommend that *should the Commission determine to adopt the proposed revisions* it should defer adoption until an appendix to the PCS is developed.

This appendix should address the issues relating to implementation in order to make the process robust and to hold those states not utilizing the ORSANCO standards accountable to the public and to the other Compact states. This appendix should address these points:

a. The notice and opportunity for Commission staff to review must be on a permit-by-permit basis. For those states not utilizing ORSANCO standards or equivalent state counterpart, the review should focus on whether the discharge permit limitations and other requirements of the draft permit provide comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals as if the ORSANCO standards were being used to set permit limits.

b. The notice and opportunity for staff review should occur PRIOR to the commencement of public notice and comment process under the state's NPDES program, and the staff determination regarding whether the draft permit provides comparable use protection and achievement of Compact


goals, should be placed into record at the time the draft permit is public-noticed and public comment period begins.

c. Any discharge permit proposed by a state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS or their equivalent, should include in the public notice a notation of this fact, whether the ORSANCO review found the draft permit provided comparable protection, and that the ORSANCO determination is available for public review.

d. In addition to the permit-by-permit review, ORSANCO staff should review and comment on the differences between the PCS and the water quality standards of each state during their triennial review process and each state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS or equivalent should be obligated to justify the decision not to adopt PCS.

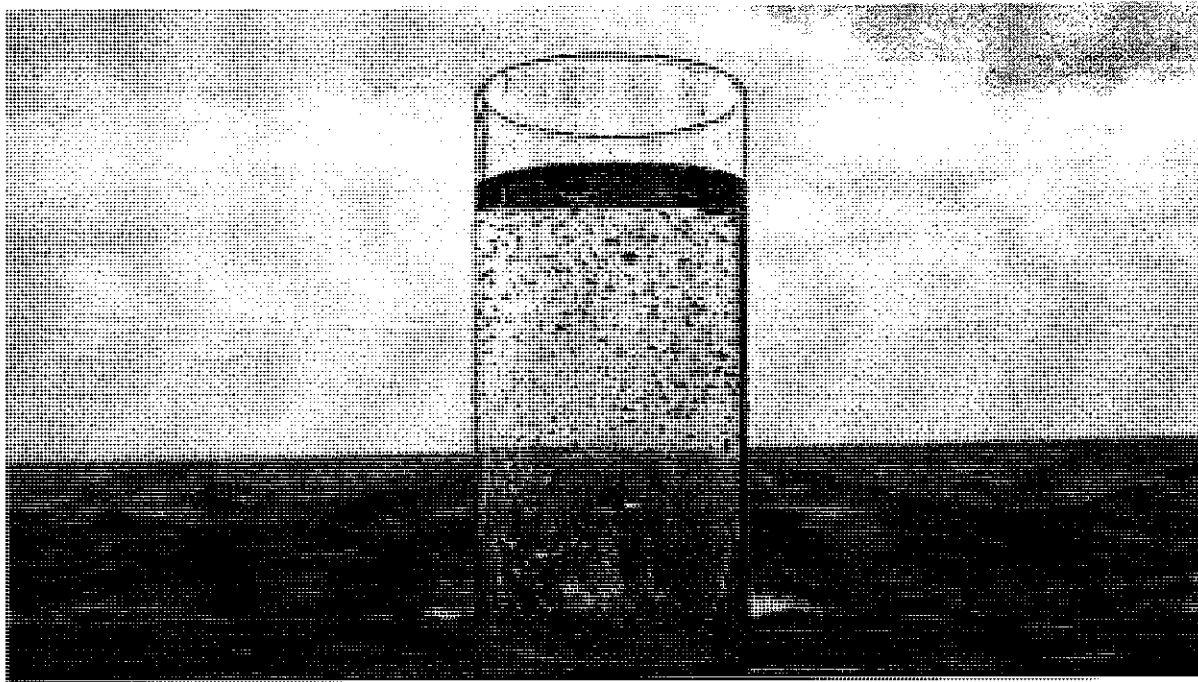

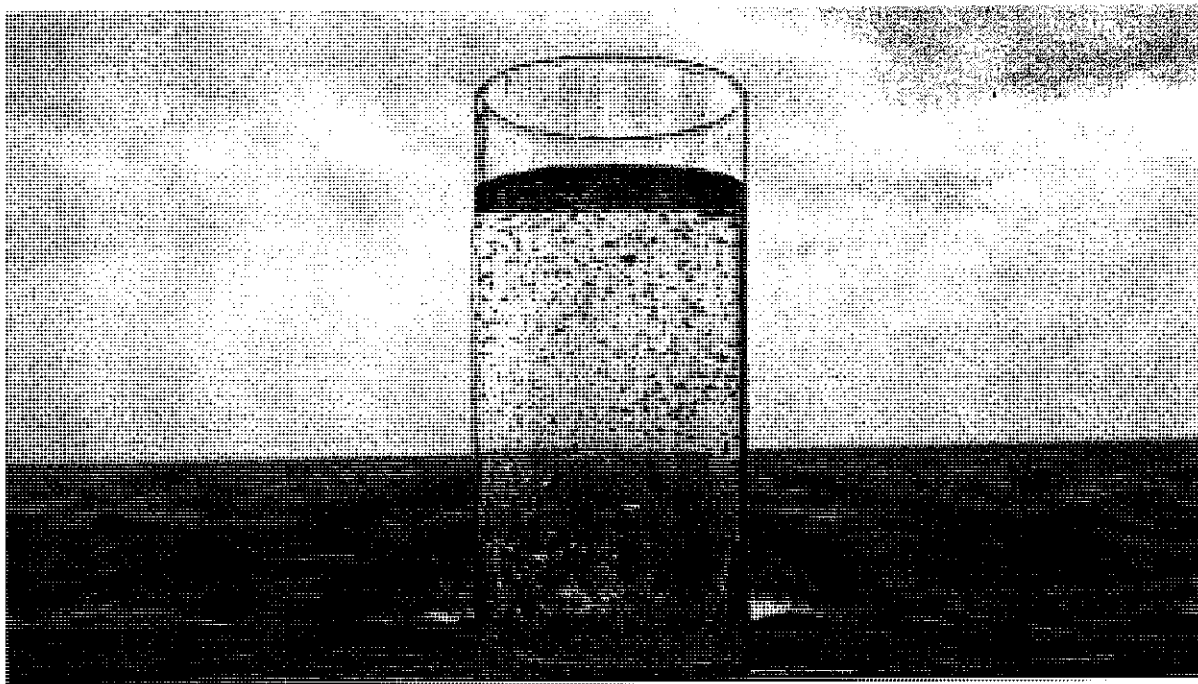

Dear ORSANCO Commissioners,

We are petitioning you to request that you abandon your plans to abdicate ORSANCO's regulatory responsibility and instead maintain, and increase where appropriate, the regulatory supervision ORSANCO has over the Ohio River.

We know that some of the Commissioners have argued that ORSANCO's regulation is unnecessary in light of the Clean Water Act. However, according to ORSANCO's own research, there are 188 instances where ORSANCO has set a standard for a pollutant that neither the EPA nor a member state has set a standard for. Moreover, there are 252 instances in which ORSANCO standards were at least 10 percent more stringent than those of the member states or the EPA. Abandoning the regulation of these hundreds of chemicals is reckless at best and possibly deadly at worst.

The River is a resource for drinking water for over 5 million people. According to your own publication, there are myriad pollutants regulated more stringently by ORSANCO than the EPA. Some of these pollutants include Ammonia, Cyanide, E. Coli, Mercury, Strontium 90 and combined Radium-226 and Radium-228. These chemicals can cause sickness, cancer, and death, and without region-wide regulation, we all become victims of whatever pollution comes downstream.

Again, drawing from your own research, in 2013 the Ohio River topped the nation's waterways for pollution discharges from industry at 24 million pounds of pollution. This amount more than doubled the total pollution in the Mississippi river, which placed second. The report also found that the Ohio has led American waterways in industrial pollution since 2001. Analyzing data from the EPA's Toxic Release Inventory from 2013 to 2017 shows that the Ohio River continues to outpace the Mississippi by millions of pounds of pollution.

With all of this evidence, the only possible conclusion is that the Ohio River needs strong regulation. For the sake of those of us who drink water from the river, we implore you not to end ORSANCO's regulation of the Ohio River.

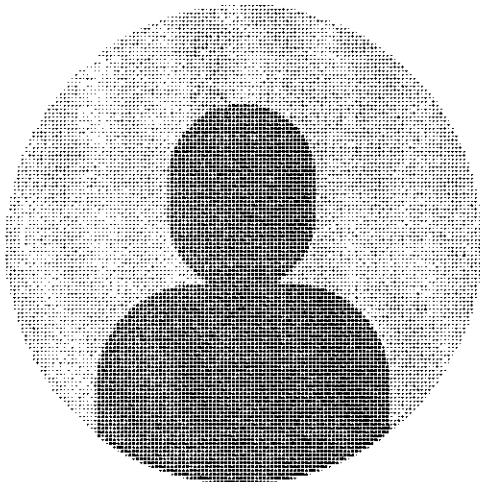

Re: Comments on the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards Proposed 2019 Revision

Dear ORSANCO:

The Environmental Integrity Project (“EIP”) submits these comments to oppose the proposed 2019 Revision to ORSANCO’s Pollution Control Standards (“PCS”). In order to serve ORSANCO’s critically important mission of protecting designated uses in the Ohio River, ORSANCO should not finalize the 2019 Revision to its PCS because:

1. ORSANCO’s PCS are intended to be standards applicable to—and binding upon—all member states, yet the 2019 Revision would, instead, downgrade the PCS from standards to mere guidelines;
2. ORSANCO’s PCS must require state National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (“NPDES”) permit writers to go beyond the federal guidelines and requirements because the federal government has been rolling back, weakening, and halting the issuance of numeric effluent limitations for numerous categories of industries that contribute to water pollution on the Ohio River and cannot be relied upon to set numerical water quality limitations stringent enough to reflect the best available technology or prevent pollution or maintain, restore, or improve water quality in the Ohio River;
3. Individual states along the Ohio River, likewise, are dealing with budgetary constraints and also cannot be relied upon to adequately protect the Ohio River, further underscoring the need for ORSANCO to fill the void of setting stringent standards for states to comply with (in addition to providing monitoring and other important work).
4. ORSANCO’s standards must not be weakened—they must be strengthened, especially to account for the oil and gas buildout along the Ohio River Valley that federal and state agencies are not adequately regulating.

Background

ORSANCO

ORSANCO was formed in 1948 when eight states and the federal government entered into a compact to reduce pollution in the Ohio River, which was approved by Congress. ORSANCO, www.orsanco.org. Its eight member states are Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia. ORSANCO.org, “Commission Activities,” <http://www.orsanco.org/commission-activities/>. The compact states that “[t]he control of future pollution and the abatement of existing pollution in the waters of said basin are of prime importance to the people thereof, and can best be accomplished through the cooperation of the States situated therein, by and through a joint or common agency.” Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Compact, at 2 (June 30, 1948) (“ORSANCO Compact”). Article 1 of the ORSANCO Compact states that each member State:

[A]grees to enact any necessary legislation to enable each such State to place and maintain the waters of said basin in a satisfactory sanitary condition, available for safe and satisfactory use as public and industrial water supplies after reasonable treatment, suitable for recreational usage, capable of maintaining fish and other aquatic life, free from unsightly or malodorous nuisances due to floating solids or sludge deposits, and adaptable to such other uses as may be legitimate.

Id. It further gave the Commission the authority “to adopt, prescribe and promulgate rules, regulations and standards for administering and enforcing” pollution control measures. *Id.* at 3, Art. VI. The ORSANCO Compact also gave the Commission the ability to, after investigation and a hearing, issue an order upon any person discharging sewage or industrial waste into a water that flows to another state to cease such discharge, which is enforceable through an action in any court of general jurisdiction or any United States District Court. *Id.* at 5, Art. IX.

Although since ORSANCO’s inception the federal Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. § 1251 *et seq.*, has been enacted, and although all of the various states have their own regulatory systems in place to issue NPDES pollution discharge permits, ORSANCO still serves a vital function by filling the gaps where federal and state authorities and programs have not gone far enough to protect the Ohio River, the ecological community that relies upon it, or the 5 million people who draw their drinking water from it, from dangerous levels of pollution.

Pollution in the Ohio River

The Ohio River is at risk from high levels of pollution from a variety of pollutants that threaten human health and the environment. It has been named by ORSANCO itself to be the most polluted river in the nation many times based on the number of pounds of toxic pollutants being dumped into it as tracked by the federal Toxics Release Inventory. *See, e.g.* Jennifer Shack, “Report: Ohio River the Most Polluted Body of Water in the U.S. for 7th Year in a Row” (Feb. 24, 2015), <https://www.wlwt.com/article/report-ohio-river-most-polluted-body-of-water-in-u-s-for-7th-year-in-row/3551807>. The Ohio River basin is home to 25 million people—nearly 8% of

the United States' pollution, and 5 million people rely on the Ohio River itself for their drinking water. ORSANCO, River Facts, <http://www.orsanco.org/river-facts/> (last viewed Apr. 14, 2019).

According to EPA's Discharge Monitoring Report ("DMR") Loading Tool, in 2018, the Ohio River Basin had over 45,210 facilities listed by EPA, including 17,319 facilities for which there was permit and monitoring data uploaded to the DMR Loading Tool. *See* <https://echo.epa.gov/trends/loading-tool/water-pollution-search/results/?s=a63dbd575262acdc5b725aafc462a2fad5a6ba49>. Of the pollutants for which pounds per year was reported, the top pollutants discharged in 2018 by toxic weighted pounds equivalent are listed in Table 1.¹

This is just a snapshot of the major pollutants being discharged into the Ohio River based on what information is being reported, not accounting for pollutants that are not reported or the thousands of additional pollutants being discharged.

There are 26 coal-fired power plants along the Ohio River, meaning one plant per every 38 miles of the 981-mile river. *See, e.g.,* James Bruggers, "Industry Tries to Strip Power from Ohio River's Water Quality Commission," *Inside Climate News*, https://insideclimatenews.org/news/30052018/ohio-river-clean-water-standards-coal-power-plants-industry-toxic-pollution-orsanco?amp%20twitter_impression=true. These power plants are the largest discharges of toxic pollutants like mercury arsenic, and selenium into the nation's waters, yet the federal EPA failed for more than 32 years (from 1982 to 2015) to set any pollution limits on toxics despite being legally required to review and, if appropriate, revise their standards at least annually. *See* 33 U.S.C. § 1314(b). Although following a lawsuit by the Environmental Integrity Project and our allies limits have now been updated, the current federal Environmental Protection Agency has already taken steps to delay and weaken these new standards. 40 C.F.R. § 423. The Ohio River—the drinking water source for 5 million people—continues to be placed in jeopardy due to the federal government failing to promulgate and

maintain adequate pollution controls. ORSANCO's role in protecting the river has never been more clear or more vital.

Despite this, the 2019 Revision to the PCS proposed by ORSANCO is flagrant attempt by industry interests to erode ORSANCO's authority to hold polluting facilities to the standards necessary to protect and support humans, wildlife, and the environment throughout the Ohio River watershed.

Substantive Comments

1. The 2019 Revision Weakens ORSANCO's Role and the PCS Themselves, Violating ORSANCO's Mission and Purpose.

ORSANCO's 2019 Revision proposes to downgrade ORSANCO's PCS to mere guidelines. The 2019 Revision also proposes to strip away references in the PCS to the federal Clean Water Act that require state NPDES Permit writers to enforce ORSANCO's standards and incorporate them into pollution discharge permits. This weakening of the PCS violates the ORSANCO Compact and must not be approved.

a. The federal Clean Water Act requires the Compact's more stringent standards to be adopted by member states.

One of the fundamental components of the federal Clean Water Act, which was enacted in 1972, is that a State permitting authority issuing an NPDES Permit may not incorporate limits that are less stringent than the federal standards, but the Act also requires that any more stringent limits established by State law or regulations permitting authorities "shall be achieved," and that the Act would not limit the ability of any state to adopt or enforce any standards that would be more stringent than federal requirements. *See* 33 U.S.C. §§ 1311(b)(1)(C), 1370. Despite this, one of the proposed 2019 Revisions to the PCS is to remove acknowledgement of this requirement from the PCS standards.

Specifically, the 2019 Revision proposes to remove the sentence: "Sections 301(b)(1)(C) and 510 of the Federal Act require that permits issued under that system incorporate applicable standards promulgated by an interstate agency wherever they are more stringent than comparable state or federal standards." ORSANCO, Pollution Control Standards for Discharges to the Ohio River, 2019 Revision, Markup, at 2 (2019), <http://www.orsanco.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/02/2019-Revision-ORSANCO-PCS-Original-Markup-001.pdf> (with this language in strike-through font) [hereinafter "2019 Revision"]. The 2019 Revision also intends to cut the following legally true statement from the PCS:

Specific wastewater discharge requirements are established in these regulations and must be incorporated into discharge permits issued under the authority of the NPDES or state discharge permitting programs when they are more stringent than: 1) applicable U.S. EPA technology-based effluent guidelines required under Sections 301, 304, 306, and 307 of the Federal Clean Water Act, or 2) any state treatment requirements, effluent standards, or water quality-based effluent limits.

In the absence of promulgated Federal effluent guidelines pursuant to Sections 301, 304, 306, and 307 of the Clean Water Act, the Compact signatory states have the responsibility to establish effluent limitations to be included in any discharge permit, consistent with the standards contained herein using best professional judgment on a case-by-case basis.

2019 Revision, at 2–3 (with this quoted material in strike-through font). The 2019 Revision also proposes to strike out the requirements in Chapter 5, entitled “Wastewater Discharge Requirements,” for “Residues from Potable Water Treatment Plants,” “Cooling Water,” and “Other Wastes.” 2019 Revision, at Chapter 5.

The provisions of the Clean Water Act have not changed, and removing the legal reality that ORSANCO’s PCS are required to be incorporated into NPDES Permits issued by the individual member states does not change that legal reality. ORSANCO’s PCS standards adopted pursuant to the ORSANCO Compact are intended to function as legal requirements and must be maintained as such. Removing this language, and making the PCS mere guidelines, would undermine the ORSANCO Compact itself as well as any efficacy of the Commission to act to set more stringent standards where State and local standards fail to provide adequate pollution controls for the Ohio River.

2. The 2019 Revision Must be Rejected because the PCS Must Remain “Standards,” and not “Guidelines” in order to Project the Ohio River in the Face of Federal Rollbacks of Water Protections.

EPA’s rollbacks of many environmental regulations render it insufficient to, alone, ensure the protection of the Ohio River and its many users. The federal Clean Water Act acknowledges and elevates the role of non-federal, non-state authorities like the ORSANCO Commission in setting pollution control requirements where federal and state agencies have failed to set standards stringent enough to protect certain waters. *See, e.g.*, 33 U.S.C. §§ 1311(b)(1)(C), 1370 (respectively requiring that “there shall be achieved . . . any more stringent limitation” and expressly allowing any “interstate agency to adopt or enforce” any standard or limitation or requirement for abatement of pollution as long as it is not “less stringent” than federal requirements). EPA’s current regulatory rollbacks, in addition to the already existing insufficient federal water pollution control requirements, underscore the need for ORSANCO’s standards to be binding rather than guidelines that are not enforceable.

Even prior to the current federal administration, the federal government had not always gone far enough to protect the Ohio River from pollution. For example, ORSANCO’s review in 2015 found that there were 11 pollutants even then for which ORSANCO had standards but the federal EPA did not. ORSANCO, ORSANCO Staff Water Quality Criteria Compilation (Feb. 14, 2018) (see Table entitled, “Comparison of Minimum Water Quality Criteria vs ORSANCO’s 122 Minimum Criteria (12/3/2015)”), <http://www.orsanco.org/wp-content/uploads/2018/02/Pollution-Control-Standards-Water-Quality-Standards-Compilation.pdf>. There were also 23 pollutants for which EPA’s standards were less stringent than ORSANCO’s standards. *Id.* These pollutants were ones for which ORSANCO, in its expertise and considering the unique threats to the Ohio River, decided additional levels of

protection were needed. The ORSANCO Commission's proposal in the 2019 Revision to downgrade these otherwise binding requirements to mere guidelines defies logic and is not supported by scientific data showing that there has been any reduced need for these protections all of a sudden.

Furthermore, under the Trump Administration, at least 4 water pollution rules have already been overturned or otherwise invalidated and at least 2 more water pollution rules are on the chopping block, according to a recent survey by the New York Times. Nadja Popovich, Livia Albeck-Ripka, and Kendra Pierre-Louis, "78 Environmental Rules on the Way Out Under Trump," *The New York Times* (last updated Dec. 28, 2018)

One of the rules of particular importance for the Ohio River may be the EPA's delay and attempts to rollback the Steam Electric Effluent Limitations Guidelines ("ELGs") for power plants, which are the water discharge limitations applicable to power plants. EPA issued the regulations on September 30, 2015 in response to a lawsuit by the Environmental Integrity Project and other environmental groups, and the rule went into effect on January 4, 2016. Environmental groups' lawsuit had highlighted that EPA had failed to update its ELGs to include limits on toxics for power plants for 32 years, despite the Clean Water Act's requirement that such rules be reviewed and revised, if appropriate, at least annually. The ELG rule sets limits on discharges, requiring zero discharge from certain coal ash wastewaters and requiring limits on toxic pollutants including arsenic and selenium in the wastewater from air pollution control devices. This is critical as power plants are the largest industrial discharger of toxic water pollution, yet, prior to the 2015 ELG rule, there were no federal limits on any toxic pollutants from this industry.

On April 25, 2017, the Trump Administration halted certain compliance deadlines in the ELG rule. The rule had required that discharge permits incorporate the new requirements "as soon as possible beginning November 1, 2018" and "no later than December 31, 2023." However, on September 18, 2017, EPA Administrator Pruitt finalized a rule postponing the earliest compliance dates for the ELG rule from 2018 to November 2020. This postponement has created uncertainty for regulatory agencies that have to issue new permits, as many plants have already received permits and taken steps that incorporate the rule's pollution-reducing requirements and deadlines. EPA also announced, on August 14, 2017, in a filing with the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit, that it was planning to re-write the limits on wastewater from bottom ash, scrubbers, and coal gasification plants. This planned re-write followed a letter from industrial dischargers requesting weaker standards, which may further signal EPA's intention to gut the limits on these waste streams from the number one discharger of toxic pollutants into our nation's waterways. One of the key roles ORSANCO can play is to maintain and even set more stringent standards on discharges from coal-fired power plants in the face of EPA's planned rollbacks.

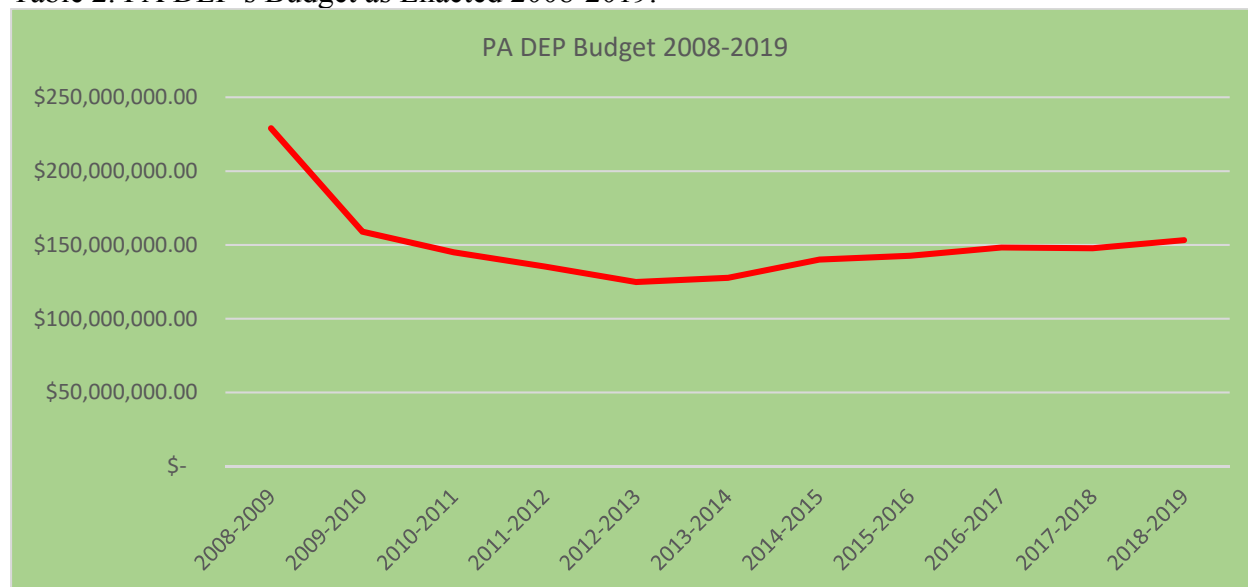
ORSANCO's standards must be strengthened, not weakened to unenforceable guidelines, to preserve and protect the uses of the Ohio River, especially given the threats of increased pollution posed by the federal government's weakening of its standards.

3. Individual States Cannot be Relied upon to Protect the Ohio River Alone.

The individual states along the Ohio River have been plagued by budgetary woes, political inaction, and competing priorities and cannot be relied upon to take bold steps to prevent and reduce pollution in the Ohio River.

For example, even in Pennsylvania, one of the states that has actively worked to incorporate ORSANCO's PCS so far, the Department of Environmental Protection's ("DEP") budget was slashed dramatically about a decade ago, decreased even further in the years that followed, and has not yet been restored or even come close to being restored despite changes in administrations, an upturn in the economy, or any other factors. *See* Table 2 for the DEP's

These budget cuts make it difficult to enforce environmental laws and make it harder for the more thorough review needed for an agency to adopt more stringent standards to get done by staff that is overworked and underfunded. Getting states to adopt more stringent pollution controls when doing so would only be optional rather than mandatory would be much less likely. ORSANCO must step up with stringent PCS, and must ensure that states adopt the PCS into their state programs. The 2019 Revision, by, instead, weakening the PCS from standards to guidelines, would have the opposite effect, rendering the PCS meaningless as states would have no obligation to adopt them.

4. The 2019 Revision to the PCS Must be Rejected, and a New Revision Must Be Proposed to Strengthen ORSANCO's Pollution Control Authority.

If any changes are to be made to ORSANCO's PCS, it should be that the PCS should be strengthened and that the Commission should carry out the terms of the ORSANCO Compact and enforce the PCS, which should be binding on all member states. Currently, some of the states in the ORSANCO compact, including Pennsylvania and Indiana, have adopted ORSANCO's standards into their own state regulations and NPDES permitting requirements, while other states, such as Ohio and Illinois, have not. *See* Julie Grant, "Ohio River Compact Considers Vote to Eliminate its Pollution Standards," *Allegheny Front* (Feb. 14, 2019), <https://www.alleghenyfront.org/ohio-river-compact-considers-vote-to-eliminate-its-pollution-standards/>. This is in direct violation of the ORSANCO Compact, as each member State signed the ORSANCO Compact with the express language that it would enact or promulgate legislation or rules to carry out ORSANCO's mission.

States are required to adopt the PCS into their own regulatory programs under the plain language of the Compact, and the states that have failed to do so are violating the ORSANCO Compact. Member states' failure to adopt or enforce ORSANCO's standards defeats the purpose of the Compact—to reduce pollution in the Ohio River, because the adoption by some states of more stringent pollution controls could be meaningless in practice if other states in the compact are continuing business as usual without curbing discharges of the same pollutants. For example, despite Pennsylvania's adoption and implementation of limits of certain releases of mercury into the Ohio River, Illinois has not incorporated similar mercury limits.

The current failure of the Commission to enforce the ORSANCO Compact's requirement that member states adopt the PCS undermines the Compact and is already threatening the Ohio River. The River has been protected to some degree by the member States that have fulfilled their obligations under the ORSANCO Compact to adopt ORSANCO's PCS, but the failure of some member states to fulfill their obligations has enabled higher levels of pollutants into the river than should have been allowed. The proposed 2019 Revision to switch the standards to mere guidelines would further erode the standards by giving even the States who have been abiding by the PCS standards a way out of complying with ORSANCO's standards and will almost certainly allow for greater pollution of the Ohio River.

This is especially true given the massive current and near-future planned buildout of the oil and gas and petrochemicals industry and the dearth of Clean Water Act regulation over the pollutants that enter U.S. waterways from this industry. This is because oil and gas facilities at several stages—from extraction, production, and processing to refining, and burning—have the potential to release into the environment a variety of toxics and other pollutants into the nation's waters. Oil and gas industry chemicals can pollute waterways by being injected underground, leaking from storage tanks and pipes, and flowing with surface runoff into streams, among other pathways. The industry's voluminous list of pollutants includes surfactants, volatile organic chemicals ("VOCs"), and many several carcinogens and other toxic pollutants, such as arsenic, benzene, cadmium, lead, formaldehyde, chlorine, and mercury.² Many oil and gas pollutants are

known to have deleterious effects on human health and the environment, but many others have not been adequately studied to determine either what their effects might be alone or in conjunction with other pollutants or what safe and unsafe exposure levels would be.

For example, a study published in the *Journal of Exposure Science and Environmental Epidemiology* in 2016 evaluated 1,021 chemicals used in hydraulic fracturing and found that, of the 1,021 fracking chemicals identified:

- Toxicity information was lacking for 781 chemicals (76%).
- Of the remaining 240 substances, evidence suggested reproductive toxicity for 103 (43%), developmental toxicity for 95 (40%), and both for 41 (17%). However, of these 157 chemicals, only 67 (43%) had final or proposed federal water quality criteria or guidelines. This means that of the 157 chemicals with evidence of deleterious effects, 90, or 57%—a majority, did not have either final or even proposed federal water quality criteria or guidelines.



Of course, the 1,021 pollutants studied may not even include all potential pollutants when looking beyond fracking to other oil and gas facilities (including those used at petrochemical plants, etc.). Given the vast chasm between which oil and gas pollutants are being released into our nation’s waters and the pollutants which have been adequately assessed and assigned effluent limitations guidelines by the federal government, ORSANCO’s role moving forward will be ever more important to prevent unsafe levels of pollution in the Ohio River.

Conclusion

For the many reasons set forth above, EIP urges ORSANCO to maintain its current PCS, reject the proposed 2019 Revision, and work to craft future revisions that will be more—not less—protective of the environment and the health, recreational, and ecological uses thereof.

Re: AK Steel Corporation – Comments on the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards, 2019 Revision



AK Steel Corporation (AK Steel) is pleased to submit comments on the Commission's latest proposed revisions to the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards – 2015 Revision (the PCS). AK Steel commented in support of the Commission's prior PCS proposal in August 2018, as well as in response to the Commission's initial request for comments on this subject in February 2018. (Copies of those comments are attached for your reference.) Because of the continued importance of this issue and the effect of the PCS on AK Steel and numerous other businesses throughout the region, we submit these comments on the Commission's current proposal.

AK Steel continues to believe that substantial revisions to the PCS are needed to eliminate the unnecessary and duplicative burdens of the current regulatory scheme while still protecting the water quality goals of the ORSANCO Compact. When ORSANCO was created in 1948, there was a clear need for improvements in water quality in the Ohio River and a lack of any effective state or federal programs to achieve that goal. Since then, the enactment of the federal Clean Water Act and implementation of federally enforceable water quality programs in each of the Compact States have brought about dramatic progress in improving water quality in the Ohio River and achieving the goals of the ORSANCO Compact. The existence of those programs, which are effective and comprehensive, has substantially altered the role ORSANCO can and should play under the modern federal-state water quality regulatory regime.

In light of the dramatic improvements in water quality regulation that have occurred over the past 70 years and the realities of the current regulatory framework, AK has the following comments and recommendations regarding the Commission's current proposal:

1. The Commission should eliminate the duplicative and unnecessary PCS

AK Steel reiterates its support for the Commission's previous proposal, which would have largely removed ORSANCO from its duplicative role in water quality regulation and allowed it to focus on its longstanding and valuable role in gathering and evaluating scientific and technical information on water quality in the Ohio River. This approach recognizes that each of the Compact States now administers a robust, USEPA-approved NPDES permitting program under the Clean Water Act and is required to establish and

enforce water quality standards that ensure the protection of the designated uses of the Ohio River and its tributaries. The ORSANCO PCS are not only duplicative and unnecessary; they create undue complexity and impose costly burdens and inefficiency on the Compact States and regulated businesses. And the proposed 2019 revision provides little or no change to these fundamental issues. ORSANCO should focus on helping to coordinate and promote consistency among the various States through its research and information-sharing functions and should eliminate the costly and unnecessary duplication embodied by the PCS.

2. In the alternative, the Commission should acknowledge and make clear that the Compact States current NPDES permitting programs provide comparable use protection and achievement of the Compact's goals as provided by the PCS.

If the Commission feels compelled to follow the approach embodied by its current proposal and to maintain the PCS largely unaltered, it should revise the proposal to clarify that:

- (i) The water quality standards and permitting provisions of each State's USEPA-approved NPDES permitting program are presumptively comparable to the water quality protections afforded by the PCS;
- (ii) Any NPDES permit issued pursuant to one of those USEPA-approved programs will be presumed to meet the goals and requirements of the ORSANCO Compact; and
- (iii) The burden of proof is on the Commission, after due notice, investigation and hearing, to demonstrate that any such NPDES does *not* provide comparable use protection and achievement of the Compact's goals as provided by the PCS, and that a permit applicant may challenge any such determination in a court of proper jurisdiction.

As currently drafted, the Commission's proposal will only create more confusion and uncertainty about both the role of ORSANCO in water quality regulation and when and how States and permittees must address and incorporate the PCS in permits for discharges to the Ohio River. Without the clarifications identified above, the proposal will merely increase the significant costs and inefficiencies associated with the PCS program, putting businesses along the Ohio River at a competitive disadvantage and creating a disincentive for further business investment within the Compact States.

AK Steel believes that the goals of the Commission's current proposal are laudatory, insofar as it appears intended to make the PCS more advisory in nature and to defer to the primary role of the States in regulating water quality. Unfortunately, the reality of the proposal seems to undermine that intent and, by maintaining the PCS in nearly unaltered form. AK Steel encourages the Commission to either return to its prior proposal – which recognizes that the PCS are no longer necessary in light of the comprehensive federal-state water quality regime established under the

Clean Water Act – or revise its proposal to ensure that the PCS are only applied to override a State-issued NPDES permit if the Commission can demonstrate that such action is necessary to meet the requirements of the Compact.

Basis and Additional Information for AK Steel Comments on ORSANCO's Current PCS Proposal

The Commission's proposal appears to be intended to provide additional permitting flexibility to the States while recognizing the primacy of their NPDES permitting programs in protecting water quality in the Ohio River. As drafted, the proposal emphasizes that the PCS "were adopted by the Commission for *use or consideration* by signatory States as they develop and implement their programs to assure that those designated uses and other goals regarding pollution control and prevention set forth in the Compact will be achieved." The new language added to Section 1.1 of the PCS goes on to recognize that the permitting and standards development processes in the individual States may vary, and that "each discharge permit issued pursuant to the Clean Water Act or other federal or state law may not contain requirements addressing one or more of the Pollution Control Standards." In such a case, the proposal would require a State to implement permit limitations that provide "comparable" use protection and achievement of the goals of the Compact as would be provided by application of the PCS.

Although this new formulation suggests that the PCS would become advisory in nature (requiring each State to merely "consider" the PCS in establishing permit limitations in individual discharge permits), the overall structure and content of the PCS seem to undercut this conclusion. Rather than providing the desired flexibility, the proposed revisions threaten to maintain the existing rigid burdens and unnecessary duplication of the current PCS, while creating considerable new ambiguity and uncertainty concerning how ORSANCO will use its commenting and enforcement authorities under the Compact and the revised PCS to ensure that State-issued permits provide "comparable" use protections.

- The Commission's current proposal would maintain the existing, comprehensive provisions of the PCS regarding water quality criteria (Chapter 3), mixing zone designations (Chapter 4), and wastewater discharge requirements (Chapter 5). Those provisions contain extensive, detailed, and prescriptive requirements that ORSANCO presumably deems necessary to protect and preserve the designated uses of the Ohio River and meet the other goals of the Compact. The continued existence of those detailed standards will likely have an inordinately presumptive or prescriptive effect on each State's determination of what permit terms are required to provide "comparable" use protections, as required by the revised PCS. Thus, while purportedly only requiring that States "consider" the detailed PCS, the effect is likely to be much more prescriptive.
- The revised PCS retain numerous requirements that are inconsistent with, and in some cases unnecessarily more stringent than, the water quality standards and implementation procedures adopted by the States and approved by USEPA pursuant to the Clean Water Act. ORSANCO also appears to be unnecessarily regulating numerous pollutants whose regulation is not necessary to ensure the achievement and maintenance of high quality water and aquatic

values in the Ohio River. This suggests a desire to regulate as many pollutants as possible without regard for necessity or effectiveness. The possibility that ORSANCO will continue to insist on the implementation and enforcement of these provisions through its enforcement authority raises the specter that States will be forced to incorporate unnecessary and burdensome requirements in their NPDES permits that provide no demonstrable additional environmental benefit for the Ohio River.

- The current PCS proposal retains provisions for the issuance of variances from the mixing zone and wastewater discharge requirements of the PCS (Section 1.6) and for approval of alternative site-specific water quality criteria for specific constituents (Section 1.7). It is unclear why these variance and site-specific water quality criteria provisions are even needed if States are merely required to “consider” the PCS in issuing discharge permits. Maintaining provisions for approval of variances and site-specific criteria suggests that ORSANCO will continue to view the PCS as mandatory.
- The Commission’s proposal contains conflicting signals regarding the continued role and applicability of the detailed water quality criteria set out in Chapter 3. On the one hand, the proposal deletes two provisions that *require* compliance with the water quality criteria. (See Sections 1.1 and 5.1.) On the other hand, the highly detailed and prescriptive water quality criteria have nevertheless been retained in their entirety, without alteration, in the current proposal. Moreover, portions of those water quality criteria are incorporated by reference in the wastewater discharge requirements for chemical constituents set forth in Section 5.3 of the revised PCS. Thus, while eliminating a few statements requiring compliance with the water quality criteria (and replacing them with a more generic reference to compliance with the goals of the Compact in Section 1.1), the existing, detailed water quality criteria remain a central component of the PCS and are likely to continue to play a major, if not determinative, role in setting discharge limitations in NPDES permits.
- Despite the suggestion that States must merely “consider” the PCS in establishing permit terms, the near-universal use of mandatory language throughout the PCS suggests otherwise. The ubiquitous use of the word “shall” throughout the PCS indicates that ORSANCO continues to view the water quality criteria, mixing zone provisions, and wastewater discharge requirements of the PCS to be mandatory, not merely advisory. If ORSANCO indeed intends otherwise, the mandatory language should be eliminated.
- The process for adoption and revision of the PCS, including individual water quality criteria and discharge requirements, continues to provide no opportunity for affected parties to challenge the appropriateness or applicability of the PCS. Regulated entities have no opportunity to challenge the basis or soundness of standards that may be applied within their NPDES permits. This lack of an opportunity to challenge these de facto legal standards is fundamentally unfair and deprives permittees of regulatory and legal due process.
- The Commission’s authority under Article IX of the Compact to issue orders to *compel compliance* with the requirements of the Compact reinforces the concern that the unaltered PCS will be used to override State NPDES permitting decisions. Under the latest proposal,

ORSANCO will be given the opportunity to review and comment on all permits for discharges to the main stem of the Ohio River. Thus, if ORSANCO determines that a proposed NPDES permit does not meet its standards (as embodied in the PCS), it may submit comments to that effect, and if the State regulatory authority does not alter the proposed permit, the Commission may issue an order compelling the permittee to nevertheless comply with the PCS.

The clear result of this change will be greater uncertainty and inefficiency in the permitting process and increased costs for the regulated community who must decipher what the final terms of a proposed NPDES permit may be. Out of an abundance of caution, States and permittees may be forced to propose permit terms that continue to fully incorporate the detailed requirements of the PCS – regardless of whether they are appropriate or necessary – rather than run the risk of additional delay, cost and uncertainty should ORSANCO decide that the State-proposed terms do not provide “comparable” use protection. Without substantial additional revisions as suggested herein, the proposed retention of the PCS in their current form will serve, in essence, as a mandatory baseline for all permits authorizing discharges into the Ohio River.

It is also noteworthy that Section XII.A.7 of ORSANCO’s By-Laws require the review of the PCS on a triennial basis. By maintaining the extensive, complex provisions of Chapters 3, 4, and 5 of the PCS, ORSANCO will be required to expend extensive time and staff resources every three years to review and update the PCS – despite the fact that they are purportedly advisory in nature and are not needed to protect the quality of the Ohio River. In a time of limited public budgets and numerous pressing demands, ORSANCO should not be expending precious resources on a task that duplicates the States’ own exhaustive triennial reviews under the Clean Water Act.

In sum, the PCS serve little effective purpose under the current, comprehensive water quality regulatory regime. AK strongly recommends that the Commission return to its prior proposal. The Compact States are well equipped to ensure the protection of water quality in the Ohio River. And ORSANCO is well equipped to provide a complementary research and coordination role to help the States in fulfilling their responsibilities. In the alternative, if the Commission chooses to retain the detailed provisions of the PCS in their current form, it should explicitly state that the States’ USEPA-approved NPDES programs and the permits issued thereunder provide comparable protection of the designated uses of the Ohio River and achievement of the goals of the Compact as provided under the PCS. Thus, if the Commission seeks to force a Compact State to incorporate some or all of the PCS into any discharge permit, the burden of proof should be on the Commission to demonstrate that such changes are necessary to meet the explicit requirements of the Compact. This approach is clearly consistent with the language of the Compact itself, which recognizes that “no single standard for the treatment of sewage or industrial waste” is appropriate throughout the Ohio River basin. The PCS may have a legitimate continued role in the current legal climate, but that role should be to advise and inform, not to direct. The proposal should be revised to reflect this important distinction.

Re: Comments on ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards (PCS) – Triennial Review

To Whom It May Concern:

AK Steel Corporation (AK Steel) is pleased to submit these comments to assist in the Commission's review and evaluation of potential revisions to the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards – 2015 Revision (the PCS). AK Steel appreciates the historical role of ORSANCO in helping to protect and preserve water quality in the Ohio River and in collecting and disseminating water quality data and information. The Commission's recent request for comments is an important opportunity to assess the role of ORSANCO in light of the significant regulatory developments and improvements in water quality in the Ohio River that have occurred in the 70 years since ORSANCO was formed.



Summary of Comments

AK Steel has reviewed the five alternatives identified by the Commission and supports the adoption of Alternative 2 Expanded as the most sensible and cost-effective approach to satisfying the goals of the ORSANCO Compact in the current legal and regulatory environment. As noted in the Commission's materials and in the comments of several Advisory Committees, ORSANCO was created in 1948, at a time when the need for water quality improvements in the Ohio River was clear. There was an absence of an effective regulatory framework to address the needs that were critical. Since that time, and as a result of the enactment of the federal Clean Water Act and related laws, a comprehensive system of federal and state water quality programs and standards has been developed and implemented in all of the ORSANCO Compact States. The result has been a dramatic improvement in the quality of the Ohio River, as well as its tributaries and other streams throughout the Compact States.

Today, each of the Compact States is implementing a federally-enforceable water quality program approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency pursuant to the Clean Water Act. Each of those programs includes designated uses, "free from" mandates, water quality standards, wastewater discharge requirements, mixing zone provisions, and enforcement authorities. Those programs have been effective in addressing each State's streams as aquatic habitats, as well as supporting their uses for recreation and drinking water.

Whereas the ORSANCO PCS may have been necessary when the Compact was first signed, they have become duplicative of the subsequently enacted federal and state water quality programs established under the Clean Water Act. Today, the water quality goals of the Compact are being effectively addressed by the Clean Water Act, and the PCS provide little or no added value. In fact, the differences between the PCS and Clean Water Act standards can lead to confusion for the States and the regulated community, and can create complications in the permitting process,

where there is often no effective way to question or challenge the appropriateness or applicability of the underlying PCS in specific permitting situations.

AK Steel believes that the most valuable role ORSANCO can play in meeting the goals of the ORSANCO Compact in the current regulatory environment is to concentrate on its scientific and technical information gathering and research. This role allows ORSANCO to provide important information to the States in carrying out their obligations to preserve and protect water quality under the Clean Water Act, and in helping to coordinate and promote consistency among the various States in the Ohio River basin. This is a unique role that only ORSANCO can perform in the current framework, and is certainly its highest and best use.

AK Steel Corporation is one of a few remaining independent steel manufacturers based in the United States, with nine (9) steel manufacturing facilities located in Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky, West Virginia, and Pennsylvania and with total employment of approximately 10,000 people. Cokemaking operations at Mountain State Carbon commenced in 1917; steelmaking operations at the Ashland Works in 1923; and steel finishing operations at the Rockport Works in 1998. Collectively, these three facilities currently employ between 750 and 1,500 people, depending on business conditions, and provide critical manufacturing, finishing and support services to the other AK Steel facilities. Environmental programs at these facilities require substantial investments in pollution control facilities and substantial ongoing operating and maintenance costs to ensure clean air and water. Thus, AK Steel is vitally interested in the ORSANCO PCS and how they are implemented in ORSANCO Compact State water quality programs. Moreover, AK Steel has a long-standing tradition of working closely and cooperatively with environmental

regulators in West Virginia, Kentucky, and Indiana to ensure that its operations meet all applicable standards, including those applicable to the Ohio River. AK Steel is proud of its history of environmental compliance, and is committed to environmental excellence in all of its operations.

Process wastewater, non-contact cooling water and storm water discharges from each of AK Steel's facilities on the Ohio River have been regulated effectively for many years by State-issued NPDES permits. These permits contain both technology-based effluent limits derived from 40 CFR Part 420 (the federal categorical effluent limitations guideline regulation for the Iron and Steel Manufacturing Point Source Category) and water quality-based effluent limits derived by the States under the CWA.

Additional Information

AK Steel believes that the adoption of Alternative 2 Expanded is both appropriate and consistent with the mandates of the ORSANCO Compact. The ORSANCO Compact establishes certain minimum requirements for the Commission, its staff, and the signatory States, including:

- Article I requires the States to "enact any necessary legislation" to reach certain general goals identified in Article I, but does not provide for any specific standards or requirements.
- Article VI sets certain limited, baseline treatment requirements for discharges of sewage and industrial wastes (primarily settleable solids and TSS limits for sewage), but grants discretion to the Commission to determine if additional treatment standards are needed to protect public health or to preserve the waters for other legitimate purposes.
- Article VII preserves the rights of signatory States to adopt more stringent standards than those required by Article VI.
- Article VIII requires ORSANCO to survey and study water pollution in the Ohio River drainage basin and to publish a comprehensive report on its findings.
- Article IX gives ORSANCO powers to enforce its standards and requirements.

Thus, ORSANCO must continue to exist and function to meet these basic requirements. But beyond these baseline requirements, we believe the Commission is given wide latitude to determine whether additional pollution control standards are necessary, or whether ORSANCO even must adopt its own regulations or pollution control standards to meet the minimal goals of the Compact, given the existence of mandatory federal and state regulatory programs that address those same goals. AK Steel believes that the Commission is well within its rights to determine – after investigation, due notice, and hearing – that the bulk of the Pollution Control Standards may no longer be necessary in light of the subsequent implementation of the Clean Water Act. Nothing in the Compact, ORSANCO's By-Laws, or the Pollution Control Standards undercuts this conclusion or requires the adoption of more extensive standards. The Commission simply needs to determine that the Compact's goals of protecting public health and preserving other legitimate purposes, including those listed in Article I, are satisfied by the States' implementation of the Clean Water Act permitting programs.

In support of this conclusion, AK Steel notes the following:

- The PCS are largely duplicative of the States' water quality standards adopted pursuant to the Clean Water Act. Beneficial use designations are essentially the same. Most water quality criteria are either the same or provide the same degree of human health and aquatic life protection. Mixing zone designations are similar. Given federal and State technology-based discharge requirements and water quality-based limits, the PCS wastewater discharge requirements are superfluous for most categorical industrial dischargers and municipal dischargers.
- Where there are differences between the ORSANCO PCS and state water quality criteria and implementation procedures, the PCS, which must be implemented by the States, sometimes result in NPDES permit conditions that are more stringent than otherwise required by the States standards – and with no demonstrable environmental benefit. Examples for AK Steel and Mountain State Carbon include PCS provisions governing mercury, selenium and phenolics.
- The implementation of the ORSANCO PCS creates confusion for the States and regulated entities. Unlike the state WQS development and implementation, the process for adoption of the PCS provides no opportunity to challenge the appropriateness or applicability of the PCS. The result is that if a regulated entity believes that a particular PCS requirement is inappropriate, its only option is to challenge that requirement as applied in the entity's NPDES permit – a process that does not allow the permittee to challenge the underlying soundness of the PCS and deprives permittees of regulatory and legal due process. Moreover, implementation of the PCS creates a separate set of standards that apply only to the Ohio River, and that differ from the standards that apply throughout the remainder of each of the Compact States. Eliminating this confusion will improve regulatory consistency and promote clarity for the regulated community.
- Today the regulated community faces a continual increase in the amount and complexity of environmental laws and regulations, with finite company resources available to stay abreast of the latest developments and ensure compliance. The ORSANCO PCS add another layer of complexity on top of the already expansive federal and state regulatory scheme governing water quality. Companies should not be faced with the choice of either dedicating significant additional resources to monitoring the ORSANCO PCS development process, or simply hoping that the implementation of the ORSANCO standards does not result in the inclusion of unworkable requirements in their NPDES permits – particularly if the PCS are no longer necessary to meet the water quality goals for the Ohio River.
- The ORSANCO resources devoted to the PCS program can be more effectively used to support other ORSANCO programs that do not overlap with state and federal water quality programs, and that provide real added value to the States. ORSANCO has particular skill and expertise in assessing water quality and the biological integrity of the Ohio River, disseminating that information to the States and public to ensure coordination and consistency among the States' regulatory programs and other water quality initiatives, engaging in public outreach, and assisting in spill detection and response through information-gathering and coordination.

- Most importantly, the beneficial uses for the Ohio River associated with nearly all PCS water quality criteria are being achieved throughout the River with a small number of exceptions. And even those few exceptions are being addressed through the States' Clean Water Act-mandated programs.

AK Steel recognizes the concerns identified in the Minority Report of Commissioners, which questions the initial preference of a majority of Commissioners for Alternative 2 Expanded. AK Steel believes that those concerns, while sincere, are unfounded. First, while it may be true that the ORSANCO PCS contain water quality criteria for a number of parameters that are not covered by comparable state or federal criteria, it is not necessarily true that the maintenance of those additional ORSANCO criteria is necessary to protect the aquatic life and uses of the Ohio River. Under the Clean Water Act, States are required to develop and enforce water quality criteria to protect aquatic life and designated uses of all streams, including the Ohio River. And U.S. EPA is charged with ensuring that each State's water quality program satisfies the requirements of the Clean Water Act. Thus, the concern voiced in the Minority Report that reliance on the States' standards "may not be adequate to protect the aquatic life and uses of the Ohio River" ignores the basic reality and requirements of the Clean Water Act, the States' EPA-approved programs, and their application to the Ohio River. In fact, the States' programs include criteria for over 100 pollutants that are not covered by the ORSANCO PCS, belying the notion that they there are somehow lax.

Second, the Minority Report expresses a concern about the risk of a lack of coherent implementation of the various States' water quality standards and policies applicable to the Ohio River, and thus the purported need for ORSANCO to enforce such coherence. This concern overlooks the important role of cooperative federalism in implementing the Clean Water Act. Under that approach, each State is given leeway to develop its own water quality standards and policies in light of unique local conditions, needs, and priorities. But that leeway is subject to the oversight and approval of U.S. EPA, whose broad perspective and mandate ensures that the States are individually and collectively meeting the fundamental water quality goals of the Act. ORSANCO need not duplicate the role of U.S. EPA. There is no need to impose a "one size fits all" solution throughout the Ohio River basin, as long as each State is implementing a water quality program that meets the underlying goals of the Clean Water Act.

Third, the Minority Report's concern about "the vagaries of the political process" overstates the role of "politics" in the federal-state Clean Water Act regulatory program and also suggests a troubling lack of confidence in the citizens' elected representatives. In fact, the ongoing development, review and implementation of the States' water quality programs, including the strenuous triennial review process required under the Act, ensure that those water quality standards are data-driven and reflect sound science. Moreover, it is entirely appropriate for federal and state regulatory programs to ultimately reflect the Nation's current policy preferences as articulated by Congress and the States' legislatures, as those bodies reflect the will of the citizenry regarding how to balance environmental protection, economic growth, and other important social factors. AK Steel is confident that the current federal-state partnership under the Clean Water Act has resulted in dramatic water quality improvements over the past several

decades and will continue to protect and preserve the quality of the Nation's rivers and streams, including the Ohio River.

In sum, AK Steel believes that Alternative 2 Expanded is the best alternative because it maintains the beneficial uses of the Ohio River consistent with the mandates of the ORSANCO Compact, while removing the duplicative and resource intensive aspects of the PCS. And it allows ORSANCO to concentrate its resources on those tasks that it can best perform to help promote and preserve water quality in the Ohio River. Although AK Steel believes that Alternative 2 Expanded is the best alternative, we believe that Alternatives 1 and 2 would also sustain the goals and purposes of the ORSANCO Compact while reducing unnecessary regulation, and are therefore viable options.

Given the complexity of the PCS and state water quality standards and implementation procedures, AK Steel believes that Alternatives 3 and 4 would likely consume an inordinate amount of ORSANCO and State resources and time, would create more duplication and inconsistency, would not likely yield much in the way of real environmental benefit, and are not necessary to meet the goals of the ORSANCO Compact. In a time of limited resources and a need for greater cooperation and efficiencies, creating a super-regulatory regime for ORSANCO, on top of the already stringent requirements of the Clean Water Act, would be wasteful and inadvisable. AK Steel also does not support Alternative 5, which would require ORSANCO to maintain and update the PCS, but would make them essentially voluntary. There seems no point in spending considerable resources on maintaining the PCS if they have no legal significance and likely no practical effect on water quality.

Finally, should the Commission decide not to pursue Alternatives 1, 2, or 2 Expanded, and to maintain (or even expand) the existing PCS, AK Steel requests that the Commission consider specific revisions to the water quality criteria for phenolics and selenium and to the mixing zone ban for mercury. Detailed explanations for these requested revisions are provided in comments provided under separate cover by AK Steel.

To Whom It May Concern:

AK Steel Corporation (AK Steel) is pleased to submit these comments on the Commission's proposed revisions to the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards – 2015 Revision (the PCS). These comments reiterate and supplement the comments submitted by AK Steel on February 23, 2018 in response to the Commission's previous request for comments on this subject. AK Steel appreciates the historical role of ORSANCO in helping to protect and preserve water quality in the Ohio River and in collecting and disseminating water quality data and information to the States and the public. The Commission's recent proposal is an important and timely response to the significant regulatory developments and improvements in water quality in the Ohio River that have occurred in the 70 years since ORSANCO was formed.

- The proposed PCS revisions would relieve ORSANCO of the significant administrative and scientific/technical burden of periodically reviewing and updating water quality criteria for the many conventional, non-conventional, toxic metal, and toxic organic pollutants currently regulated under the PCS. Under the Clean Water Act, USEPA does the “heavy lifting” in this regard by developing and updating recommended water quality criteria based on advances in aquatic toxicology, the latest information on the impacts of pollutants on human health, and other highly technical factors. The ORSANCO Compact States use the USEPA-recommended criteria to fashion their respective State water quality standards, subject to potential modifications to reflect State-specific circumstances. Because the State water quality standards must protect designated human health, aquatic life, recreational, and other designated uses of the

Ohio River, and because they must be approved by USEPA, the public can be assured that the fundamental goals of the ORSANCO Compact and the Clean Water Act, as applied to the Ohio River, are being addressed in a comprehensive manner.

- The resources ORSANCO currently devotes to the PCS program can be more effectively used to support other ORSANCO programs that do not overlap with state and federal water quality programs, and that provide real added value to the States. ORSANCO has particular skill and expertise in assessing water quality and the biological integrity of the Ohio River, disseminating that information to the States and public to ensure coordination and consistency among the States' regulatory programs and other water quality initiatives, engaging in public outreach, and assisting in spill detection and response through information-gathering and coordination. These functions can provide meaningful and long-lasting benefits to water quality throughout the Ohio River basin by providing support to the States in satisfying their Clean Water Act obligations without unnecessarily wasting regulatory resources and creating confusion for the regulated community.
- Most importantly, the beneficial uses of the Ohio River associated with nearly all PCS water quality criteria are being achieved throughout the River with a small number of exceptions. And even those few exceptions are being addressed through the States' Clean Water Act-mandated programs, under the oversight of USEPA, which works to ensure consistent Clean Water Act compliance across all States.

AK Steel recognizes the concerns identified by some Commissioners and members of the public regarding the proposed PCS revisions, but believes that those concerns, while sincere, are unfounded. First, while it may be true that the ORSANCO PCS contain water quality criteria for some parameters that are not covered by comparable state or federal criteria, it is not necessarily true that the maintenance of those additional ORSANCO criteria is necessary to protect the aquatic life and uses of the Ohio River. Under the Clean Water Act, States are required to develop and enforce water quality criteria to protect aquatic life and designated uses of all streams, including the Ohio River. And USEPA is charged with ensuring that each State's water quality program satisfies the requirements of the Clean Water Act. Thus, the concern that reliance on the States' standards "may not be adequate to protect the aquatic life and uses of the Ohio River" ignores the basic reality and requirements of the Clean Water Act, the States' EPA-approved programs, and their application to the Ohio River. In fact, the States' programs include criteria for over 100 pollutants that are not covered by the ORSANCO PCS, belying the notion that they there are somehow lax. A copy of the approximately 138 pollutants regulated by the States, but not by ORSANCO, are attached for the Commission's reference.

It appears that ORSANCO may be unnecessarily regulating numerous pollutants – the 188 pollutants cited by opponents of the proposed PCS revisions – as proxies or indicators for the pollutants that "really matter," i.e., those that are regulated by USEPA and the States under the Clean Water Act. Thus, ORSANCO's current regulation of numerous additional pollutant parameters beyond those required by the Clean Water Act may be neither legally nor

scientifically necessary, nor necessary to ensure the achievement and maintenance of high quality water and aquatic values in the Ohio River. Regulation should be focused on achieving the States' water quality goals for the Ohio River, not simply regulating as many pollutant parameters as possible without regard for necessity or effectiveness.

Second, some have expressed a concern about a possible lack of coherent implementation across the various State programs with respect to the water quality standards and policies applicable to the Ohio River, and thus the purported need for ORSANCO to enforce such coherence and, presumably, uniformity across all States. This concern overlooks the explicit decision by Congress to embrace the concept of cooperative federalism in the regulation of the Nation's waters, as seen in the basic design of the Clean Water Act and its implementing programs. Under that approach, each State is given leeway to develop its own water quality standards and policies in light of unique local conditions, needs, and priorities. But that leeway is subject to the oversight and approval of USEPA, whose broad perspective and mandate ensure that the States are individually and collectively meeting the fundamental water quality goals of the Act. ORSANCO need not duplicate the role of USEPA. There is no need to impose a "one size fits all" solution throughout the Ohio River basin, as long as each State is implementing a water quality program that meets the underlying goals of the Clean Water Act. This approach serves to protect the Ohio River as a whole while recognizing the unique needs, particular circumstances, and local knowledge within each State.

Yet some public commenters appear to implicitly question the wisdom of Congress in establishing the basic structure of the Clean Water Act and to doubt the capabilities and, indeed, the trustworthiness of the States and USEPA to fulfill their prescribed roles under the Clean Water Act. Some also have questioned whether the proposed PCS revisions will result in overburdening the States. However, each of the ORSANCO member States currently administers a Clean Water Act program that meets the stringent requirements of the Act, including setting and regularly updating water quality standards for all waters in the State, issuing NPDES permits, performing water quality certifications, requiring regular monitoring and evaluation of waters, enforcing strict sampling and testing requirements, and satisfying a host of other Clean Water Act requirements. And each of those programs is subject to the regular oversight and approval of USEPA. The States have ample technical expertise and experience to handle their responsibilities, and USEPA has the most extensive resources in the Nation to oversee, approve, and assist in the States' respective programs – certainly far greater than those of ORSANCO. Of course, ORSANCO can provide valuable assistance to the States in the form of collecting and evaluating water quality data from the Ohio River, disseminating that information to encourage consistency, and making other technical recommendations. But the States, with the oversight of USEPA, are clearly capable of fully and effectively regulating their waters, including the Ohio River and its tributaries, to meet the Clean Water Act's strict requirements.

Third, those who have expressed concerns about "the vagaries of the political process" overstate the role of "politics" in the federal-state Clean Water Act regulatory program and also belie a troubling lack of confidence in the citizens' elected representatives. In fact, the ongoing development, review and implementation of the States' water quality programs, including the

strenuous triennial review process required under the Act, ensure that those water quality standards are data-driven and reflect sound science. Moreover, it is entirely appropriate for federal and state regulatory programs to ultimately reflect the Nation's current policy preferences as articulated by Congress and the States' legislatures, as those bodies reflect the will of the citizenry regarding how to balance environmental protection, economic growth, and other important social factors. AK Steel is confident that the current federal-state partnership under the Clean Water Act has resulted in dramatic water quality improvements over the past several decades and will continue to protect and preserve the quality of the Nation's rivers and streams, including the Ohio River.

Finally, AK Steel disagrees with the comments of those who would maintain the PCS in their present form, or even expand the scope of the PCS and the regulatory role of ORSANCO along the Ohio River. Given the complexity of the PCS and state water quality standards and implementation procedures, such an expansion would likely consume an inordinate amount of ORSANCO and State resources and time, would create more duplication and inconsistency, would not likely yield much in the way of real environmental benefit, and is not necessary to meet the goals of the ORSANCO Compact. In a time of limited resources and a need for greater cooperation and efficiencies, creating a super-regulatory regime for ORSANCO, on top of the already stringent requirements of the Clean Water Act, would be wasteful and inadvisable.


In sum, AK Steel believes that the proposed revisions to the ORSANCO PCS are both appropriate and advisable because they will help maintain the beneficial uses of the Ohio River consistent with the mandates of the ORSANCO Compact, while removing the duplicative and resource intensive aspects of the PCS. And they will allow ORSANCO to concentrate its resources on those tasks that it can best perform to help promote and preserve water quality in the Ohio River.

AK Steel commends the ORSANCO Commission for engaging in an extended public review process for the proposed PCS revisions, beginning with the creation of the Ad Hoc Committee on Water Quality Standards Implementation nearly four years ago. Beginning in late 2014, the Ad Hoc Committee engaged in a careful review of ORSANCO's historical and current role in water quality standards implementation and published a white paper in April 2017 that evaluated five alternative approaches to ORSANCO's continued implementation of the PCS. The ORSANCO Technical Committee and each of its standing advisory committees, representing various river users, watershed organizations, and regulated entities, submitted detailed comments on those alternatives. A subsequent round of preliminary public review and comment in early 2018 resulted in the receipt of hundreds of pages of written comments from individual citizens, environmental organizations, regulated businesses, and other interested parties. After reviewing those comments, the Commission voted in early June 2018 to subject the current proposal to an additional round of formal public review, scheduled to conclude on August 20, 2018. As evidence of the success of these efforts, a public hearing on the proposal, held on July 26, 2018, yielded a standing room only turnout. The ultimate product of this multi-year effort is an exhaustive, thorough, and fully transparent public review process that has put the Commission in

the best possible position to make a fully-informed decision on this proposal, and AK Steel applauds the Commission and its staff for their outstanding efforts.

Dear Commissioners:

These comments are filed on behalf of the chemical and manufacturing industries as the ORSANCO Chemical Industry Advisory Committee (“the Committee”) in response to the February 14, 2019 announcement of a decision by ORSANCO to authorize the Pollution Control Standards (PCS) Committee to proceed to public comment about recommended changes to the PCS. On March 1, 2019, ORSANCO released Notice of Public Hearings and written comment instructions with a close of the comment period being April 15, 2019.

The Committee offers these comments to the recent and additional announcement of proposed revisions to the PCS that in general terms leave its text in place with language that attempts to set forth a hybrid of conflicting concepts that appear to nod at state’s rights relative to water quality issues, qualified in some vague manner by the Commission. The Committee has actively participated in offering comments to the ongoing dialogue concerning the merit of ORSANCO continuing with the PCS program over the past couple of years.


The Committee continues to offer the perspective that 1948 Compact of ORSANCO must be informed by the passage of 71 years and modern-day state and federal environmental law, regulation, and policy. The resources, both public and private, that are expended on the laws of state and federal water protection programs are significant. The Ohio River benefits in a tangible manner from the monetary investment and implementation of the state and federal water quality enforceable laws that specifically target its quality. The PCS have been eclipsed by those significant and substantive federal and state programs over the decades, rendering ORSANCO’s efforts to mirror and influence federal/state water quality standards duplicative with speculative benefit. ORSANCO’s greatest value to its member states and the public is its unique scientific and technical research and capabilities all of which are dedicated to the Ohio River. ORSANCO’s true contribution to the Ohio River and its member states is its promotion of research and information sharing.

The Committee’s response to the recent proposed modification is the PCS should be removed from the ORSANCO program. The awkward language proposed is confusing and does not represent clearly stated policy, rendering the PCS difficult to implement. This confusion represents investment of more money on bureaucracy and not environmental benefit. If the PCS remain in some form, ORSANCO is urged as follows:

- If the PCS remain, narrative clarification must be added to make it clear that ORSANCO has an advisory role that does not usurp state or federal law.
- If the PCS remain, ORSANCO must affirmatively provide that member states are obligated to implement state and federal law and regulation, but are not obligated to implement the PCS water quality criteria or standards.
- If the PCS remain, ORSANCO must affirmatively provide within the PCS that the States' USEPA approved NPDES permitting programs and EPA reviewed water quality standards are deemed legally and technically adequate relative the ORSANCO's guiding principle related to the protection of designated uses – but not the PCS water quality criteria or standards.
- If the PCS remain, narrative clarification must be added to make it clear the applicable water quality standards are those set by the member states, not ORSANCO.
- If the PCS are to remain, ORSANCO must provide narrative clarification that it acknowledges that the Commission will engage in its advisory role as a participant in the administrative process found in state and federal regulatory actions and/or permitting actions through public notice and comment afforded within the Clean Water Act and the federal NPDES program or the delegate programs to the states.
- If the PCS remain, narrative clarification must be provided to eliminate regulatory or public confusion that the continued existence of detailed water quality criteria, mixing zone designations, and wastewater discharge requirements are merely recommendations that may or may not be adopted by member states. Narrative clarification must be provided to eliminate regulatory or public confusion as to the preemption of state and federal law relative to the PSC recommendations concerning variances and alternative water quality criteria for site-specific constituents.
- If the PCS remain, narrative clarification must be provided to acknowledge that a member state may make a determination to adopt or not adopt a PCS provision by statute, rule, permit action or any other valid action authorized by that member state.

In conclusion, the Committee urges the Commissioners to provide clarity so that regulators and the public may engage in supporting ORSANCO, as opposed to pondering its beneficial role with the Ohio River.

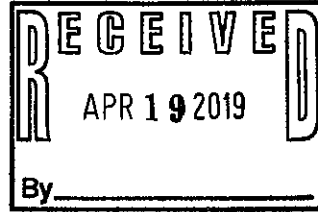





North American Stainless (NAS) is a fully integrated stainless steel producer located along the Ohio River in Ghent, Kentucky. Since 1990, NAS has grown to employ over 1500 people and to produce both long and flat stainless steel products. NAS is dependent on the Ohio River as a source of process water as we have both a Water Withdrawal Permit and KPDES Permit.

NAS is pleased to submit comments on the Commission's latest proposed revisions to the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards – 2015 Revision (the PCS). Because of the continued importance of this issue and the effect of the PCS on NAS, we submit these comments on the Commission's current proposal.

NAS continues to believe that substantial revisions to the PCS are needed to eliminate the unnecessary and duplicative burdens of the current regulatory scheme while still protecting the water quality goals of the ORSANCO Compact. The enactment of the federal Clean Water Act and implementation of federally enforceable State water quality programs have brought about dramatic improvement in the Ohio River water quality. The existence of these comprehensive State programs has substantially altered the role ORSANCO can and should play under the modern federal-state water quality regulatory regime.

What can you do today for a better tomorrow?

I am writing on behalf of Loveland Sustainability Council (LSC) related to the Commission's review its Pollution Control Standards (PCS). LSC does not want this commission to abdicate its authority and responsibility for setting regional unified pollution control standards, in fact LSC would advocate for the Commission to make existing regulations stronger, since the Ohio River is one of the most polluted rivers in the country. The current (re)worded proposal has the same intent as the previous recommendation. It fails to protect the water quality for 5 million people. The commissioners were put in place to protect the people, plant life, wildlife and environment along the Ohio river, NOT the interests of industry.

The current alternative fails to protect human health through its abdication of the PCS to the states along the Ohio River using a permit process. Permit-by-permit reviews by states do not hold states accountable. This is an important, not redundant, role of ORSANCO. It is not redundant to have Congress & the Supreme Court, just as it is not redundant to have school districts align with state and federal laws. Checks and balances are necessary and that is an important function of ORSANCO.

Here are some lessons/spin I gleaned from the August 2018 meeting to the one held in April 2019:

- 1) The commissioners drank water from the tap instead of bottled water. So you were listening to some of what was said.
- 2) Commissioners were careful to drop the phrase about "fast-tracking" and tried to accentuate the time table for the proposed changes. You can't change history, but you can reword it.
- 3) Commissioners also rebranded the new proposal with "redundancy", rather than the true mission to provide checks and balances.
- 4) I also noticed that there were fewer commissions present at this meeting and one sent an understudy. I believe it is easier to read the words of the folks (real people the commissioners are met to protect) than it is to see how far they had to push their walkers to get to the podium, how worried they were for their families, wildlife and the environment, how passionate and knowledgeable the public voices are.....even without the power of a large company behind them.
- 5) I imagine the families of the commissioners were very proud when they heard that their loved one was appointed to this important, noble position. I can't imagine anyone of them would want to believe that their loved one would put the greed of industry in front of human and environmental needs.
- 6) I know that people thanked the commission for 3 meetings, but to me that was way under what I would expect for a board that covers 8 states.

As noted at the July public hearing, ORSANCO's has more than 100 additional regulations than the state of Indiana. This is true of the other states along the Ohio River. These inconsistencies will result in additional pollutants in water, especially downstream from states with less stringent, scientifically based standards. The current ORSANCO standards are based on 70 years of scientifically based research to protect life. There is no reason to withdraw or weaken these standards with permits. It is fine for states to exceed these standards; it is NOT okay for states to select by permit their own standards.

Instead of weakening ORSANCO, the commission needs to be addressing the REAL change that is needed:

- 1) Limit the amount of private sector commissioner positions
- 2) Include public health professionals as mandatory positions on the commission
- 3) Be long sighted, not short sighted

The Ohio River needs a unified voice for PCS due to the complicated transboundary water quality problems that are inherent along the Ohio River. ORSANCO was established 70 years ago to provide consistent regulations between the states that the Ohio River flows through, regardless of individual states laws or federal regulations. ORSANCOs voice and regulations are needed to address complicated pollutant questions that arise, especially where the federal government has chosen not to act.

Comments to ORSANCO to allow states to regulate individual NPDES discharges to the Ohio River as the basis for standards regulating the entire Ohio River.

The new proposal from the Board to ORSANCO is better than the 5 original proposals, except no change in current method of determining pollutant levels in the Ohio River. However, it still has many short comings in that it allows states the independence to set NPDES levels in their state, that will obviously affect the state across the river which will have no recourse to modify the NPDES permit given by the first state. Hence the second receiving state will have no direct political recourse, even by going to the board of ORSANCO, since that right rests with each state. Cumulative impacts of such effluent loadings need not be used to determine and NPDES permit limits necessarily. Dilution as the answer to pollution is not the preferred method anymore.

Second, the US EPA chemical standards are normally applied across a large area, at least an ecoregion. The variance in geology and topography along the length of the Ohio River demands different sensitivity of the biota to pollutants based on the chemistry of the river water. Ohio River water chemistry varies from Pittsburgh to Cairo as metamorphic rocks become sedimentary, Ordovician in age through the Cincinnati Arch but Mesozoic on either side of the arch where coal and slates are found. The lower river is a large meandering alluvial system with little bed rock exposure, shallower and wider than upper or mid river. Total salts or conductivity vary widely. The turbidity seems to control the Total Phosphorus concentration in the river, and although the P- concentration has been going down in the river over the years since 2000, the P-concentration still goes up with river mile towards the Mississippi R. And the major cities (Cincinnati, Louisville and Evansville appear to have elevated Ammonia and soluble reactive phosphorus spikes associated with their WWTPs and urban runoff (River Run 2001-2007). Much of the load of TP and NO₃- appear to come from south-flowing, agricultural tributaries as well as the point source loading to the river along its route. My analysis of the ORSANCO data collected 6 times per year suggest that loading to the river is equivalent to the tributary loading of for TP and much greater for inorganic N. ORSANCO needs the power to work with states to curtail both point and non point source loading from cities and tributaries. All of the states have more stringent effluent limits than does the Ohio River. We could ask why. Is it still the old notion that dilution is the answer to pollution, not only for nutrients but more toxic compounds(e.g. Fracking Bromide, PFOS and PFOA, Carbon tetrachloride, Hg, Cd, Atrazine, PCB's, PAH's to name a few)?

Third, ORSANCO does specific studies on compounds that might challenge the river (total salts including Bromide, Mercury and methylmercury transformation). ORSANCO does its monitoring in adjusted sites to identify possible impacts of particular effluents (thermal once-through cooling power plants, Hg sources, NO₃- sources like Rockport, IN). If these studies identified a chronic problem under the new plan, they could only suggest to the states to correct the problem, not adjudicate the solution themselves with approval of their board. We need the added protection, not just the data, to set and enforce standards for the river that allow industry and river ecology to prosper. The US EPA can identify toxic materials and suggest MCLs for them, but not examine an individual river system until the problem is so severe that Congress can act (Upper Mississippi and Great Lakes Restoration Plans). We have an operational oversight on the Ohio River with enforcement powers from collective agreement amongst the States impacted in ORSANCO compact. Let's keep it that way.

Fourth, the US EPA has learned that lakes and reservoirs with longer retention times, especially the Great Lakes, have to have more conservative effluent standards than small rivers in the several states. In 2014 our 600 mile *Microcystis aeruginosa* algal bloom, required water treatment plants along the river to monitor Microcystin, with the help of ORSANCO, and stop using the water or treat it with activated wood charcoal. The bloom was not driven by PO₄-3 or TP as in the Lake Erie, but rather a suite of unusual flow conditions that US EPA and ORSANCO have modeled and can

predict. Although a rare event today, with climate change likely increasing spring rains and runoff and causing more severe droughts in late summer, these conditions may reoccur in future at a higher frequency. Clearly the Ohio River acts differently than large lakes, but similar perhaps to the shallow Lake St Marys, where the cyanobacteria make use of the phosphate mobilized in the P-enriched sediments. Apparently, the Microcystis in the Ohio River at such low flows could sink to near the bottom at night, taking up phosphorus for growth, rising during the daylight on vacuoles of oxygen and oils to the surface to use the higher light intensity. I should mention that unlike most large rivers in Ohio, like the Great Miami where we have semi-continuous data from Heidelberg University, total phosphorus does not rise at low flow from the impact of point sources. The ORSANCO data from 2000-2017 shows that as the flow decreases the TP decreases in the river, as though the river were P-limited. This finding I support from my seven years of looking at PO4-3 and chlorophyll biomass along the length of the Ohio River every 5 miles. The point here is that the Ohio River with potentially long water retention times during summer droughts, acts differently than any river in any of the contributing states, so far as I know. Without ORSANCO stepping up with the help of a team of experts and the US EPA, we would not have known about this fundamental difference of our 'run of the river navigational dams' and what they do for fine sediment retention at high flows and water replacement times during droughts. Clearly we need ORSANCO not just as a data gatherer to promote wise choices in the future, but to be able to act upon them once they are discovered through their studies.

New challenges to the river may require more than a one state fix. For example the continued expansion of *Hydrilla verticillata*, changing the macroinvertebrate consumers and fish, the expansion of silver carp, bighead carp, both filter feeders, black carp, a molluscivore and grass carp, an herbivore. The introduction of *Daphnia lumholzi* now common in the plankton which some predators cannot take and the probable introduction of the diatom called snot algae, *Didymosphenia geminata*. Even the European Ruffe, now in Lake Superior could find its way to the river as well as the invasive Gobies in the Lake Michigan. These invasives moving with our technology and climate change will challenge even ORSANCO to gather data and act. What if these ecological changes had to be appreciated by each state and the federal agencies to act. ORSANCO is much more responsive to threats to the Ohio River, and needs the power to generate a coordinated response to those threats.

I have attached my powerpoint data analysis of ORSANCO data to document several of my points from 2000-2017. Using US EPA's MCLs and water quality standards derived for ecoregions may not encompass the complexity of the Ohio River with 981 miles of mainstem fed by the Monongahela and Allegheny Rivers, which make it the longest river in the US when connected to the Mississippi. Ohio, for example, is promoting a new set of nutrient and chlorophyll standards for our large rivers (Miltner 2010). Will these be adopted or modified for the Ohio River. We are fortunate to have ORSANCO as an overseer of data and action overseen by the board made up of the states with a valid interest in the Ohio River ecology and industry.

I am writing on behalf of the West Virginia Municipal Water Quality Association (WVMWQA) regarding the Commission's 2019 Revision of its Pollution Control Standards (PCS) (hereinafter, 2019 Revision). The WVMWQA supports the adoption of the 2019 Revision, subject to a suggested alternative action and several clarifications, all detailed below.

The WVMWQA comprises public water, sewer, and stormwater utilities across West Virginia. Our members strive to protect public health and the environment in an affordable and cost-effective manner. Several of our members discharge into the Ohio River and are, therefore, directly impacted by the Commission's decision about whether the PCS will remain in effect and if "yes," how so.

While we commend the Commission's work to protect water quality in the Ohio River, we reiterate our support to eliminate the PCS in their entirety, effective after a one-year transition period for any State that wishes such a delay. Today's mature Clean Water Act legal and regulatory framework more than adequately ensures full protection for the river through a very transparent process. This includes the ability of any affected State to impose more stringent requirements which upstream states would have to ensure are met.

States which have relied on certain provisions in the PCS, rather than incorporating them into their own State regulations, could have a one-to-two-year transition period to update their respective state laws and regulations. For all the other compact members, the PCS should be removed without delay.

Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission (ORSANCO) has historically played an important role in protecting human health, aquatic life, and the overall health of the Ohio River. The League of Women Voters of Ohio (LWVO) strongly supports cooperative planning and administration along watershed lines and across jurisdictional lines, especially for watersheds as significant as the Ohio River.

LWVO is firmly opposed to the current draft of the Pollution Control Standards (PCS) released for public comment on March 1st. Making pollution controls voluntary for states along Ohio will eliminate accountability and put our public health, environment, and regional economy at risk. ORSANCO should require states to protect the drinking water supply of 5 million people and the entire Ohio River ecosystem. ORSANCO gave no scientific justification for reducing water protections, when in fact the Ohio River continues to face negative impacts from industry and climate change. Every three years, ORSANCO should evaluate the mandatory PCS standards and update them as needed through a fully transparent process in which the public has substantial opportunity to participate.

Any state wishing to deviate from mandatory ORSANCO standards should be required to participate in a public, transparent, and science-based process and to adequately prove that the changes will not negatively impact water quality. In addition, ORSANCO should publish a report at least every three years that compares each state's performance against the mandatory PCS. Lastly, ORSANCO should continue to evaluate NPDES permits issued by the states and develop an annual report to summarize the findings that are available to the public.

Any decrease in water standards will affect the health of the Ohio River Valley, and the people of Ohio whose main source of water comes from the Ohio River. Thank you.

To the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission (ORSANCO):

Water pollution is a severe health risk. Globally, more than three times as many people die from water pollution every year than from violence, including wars. Further, water and air pollution-related death, sickness, and welfare, cause an estimated \$4.6 trillion in annual losses – or about 6.2 percent of the global economy.

The river provides drinking water for 5 million people living in parts of 14 states including my family. The proposed rules put the people and economy of the Ohio River watershed at significant risk. In 2013, the Ohio River topped the list of the nation's waterways for pollution discharges from industry, more than double the second place waterway. Even with the 2015 revised Pollution Control Standards (PCS), the Ohio River is not as clean as it must be to protect those who consume its waters. Should the Pollution Control Standards be made voluntary; they will trigger pressure from polluters to relax standards in upstream states that would negatively impact all those living downstream. In effect, these rules would unleash a race to the bottom.

More than two-dozen coal-fired power plants line the Ohio River, and at least nine plants in the Ohio River watershed have reported that nearby groundwater exceeds state and federal limits of contamination. It is well established that contaminated groundwater often migrates to nearby waterways. These chemicals include arsenic, cadmium, chromium, lead, selenium, radium 226 and radium 228 combined, and thallium, which are all pollutants covered in Chapter 3 of the Pollution Control Standards and which are currently required to be consistent with human and aquatic health standards. In the face of growing water quality risks, this proposed relaxation of control standards is irresponsible. ORSANCO should abandon these proposed relaxations of the Pollution Control Standards. Instead, rule changes to improve and strengthen the standards across all member states is needed.

The current mandatory standards while needing to be strengthened, are necessary and appropriate for improving the health of the river and maintaining water quality necessary to support all designated uses outlined in the Compact fully. Any future proposals regarding the PSC should mandate state adoption of standards that meet OSANCO's baseline requirements. The proposed Pollution Control Standards abandons the long-standing reason for ORSANCO namely providing a framework for watershed rulemaking to protect downstream users. ORSANCO should also produce triennial public reports reviewing the performance of compact state's PCS. The Commission should continue its triennial evaluations of the PCS standards with fully transparent public participation. Lastly, ORSANCO should continue to evaluate, comment on pending NPDES permits and develop an annual report to summarize the findings that are available to the public.



Will some states be negatively impacted by the voluntary decisions of other states? Is this proposed change to save money for industrial discharges? Has an evaluation of the potential health risks to the 5 million drinking water users been completed? Please provide us with your rationale for the proposed rule change? We specifically oppose, the original Alternative #2 which would eliminate criteria, mixing zone requirements, and most wastewater discharge requirements.

FLOW is concerned about the vagueness of the new proposal which would "allow states to use alternative criteria from those contained in ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards in their NPDES permitting processes, so long as resulting permit requirements are protective of Ohio River designated uses".

FLOW is very concerned that the Commission recognizes that each discharge permit issued pursuant to the Clean Water Act or other federal or state law **may not contain requirements** addressing one or more of the Pollution Control Standards. FLOW opposes the current Pollution Control Standard Change.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am submitting these comments as Chair of ORSANCO's Watershed Organizations Advisory Subcommittee ("WOAC") and Executive Director of Ohio River Foundation ("ORF"), in response to the current proposal of ORSANCO to make changes to the PCS.

Briefly, we are encouraged by the improved proposal that the current incarnation represents from that proposed in 2018. However, while ORSANCO now proposes to retain many of its activities relative to the PCS it makes adoption of ORSANCO's work by the states optional and provides too much regulatory flexibility. Therefore, we cannot support the proposal in its current form, but encourage ORSANCO to continue to work on the current proposal to achieve a more acceptable and agreeable one. Our objections to, and concerns about, the current proposal are more fully discussed below.

ORSANCO's History and Authority

The Ohio River flows almost a thousand miles through six states, with more states included in its drainage basin. In 1948, eight of those states – Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia – signed the interstate compact that created ORSANCO and established the commitment of those states to “enact any necessary legislation to enable each such State to place and maintain the waters of said basin in a satisfactory sanitary condition, available for safe and satisfactory use as public and industrial water supplies after reasonable treatment, suitable for recreational usage, capable of maintaining fish and other aquatic life, free from unsightly or malodorous nuisances due to floating solids or sludge deposits, and adaptable to such other uses as may be legitimate.” The Compact provides ORSANCO with authority to promulgate rules and issue orders to ensure that “[a]ll industrial wastes discharged or permitted to flow into the aforesaid waters shall be modified or treated, within a time reasonable for the construction of the necessary works, in order to protect the public health or to preserve the waters for [these uses] . . . to such degree as may be determined to be necessary by the Commission after investigation, due notice and hearing.”

As early as 1949, ORSANCO began putting in place water treatment standards to carry out this obligation. In 1972, Congress enacted the “Clean Water Act” (“CWA”) as we know it today, and in 1984 ORSANCO revised its standards to mirror the Clean Water Act structure of designated uses, water quality criteria to protect those uses, and effluent limitations (including mixing zone requirements and a variance procedure). ORSANCO has since reviewed and updated these Pollution Control Standards every three years.

ORSANCO's stated purpose is to control pollution of the Ohio River. That's a vital role: the Clean Water Act and other federal water laws do not do a good job of regulating multi-state waters, like the Ohio River. Several WOAC member organizations will submit in their written comments that ORSANCO's Compact requires certain behavior by ORSANCO in mandating state regulatory action and adoption of standards. Furthermore, they will point out that ORSANCO's current position that the actions of states, vis-à-vis ORSANCO's standards can be voluntary contradicts the mandate dictated under the Compact. We will leave it to those commenters for a further discussion, notwithstanding that any enforcement of the Compact may rely solely on ORSANCO and not be available for citizens to enforce as it may do so under the Clean Water Act. Thus, citizens rely on ORSANCO to “police” the states for compliance with the Compact, even though it has rarely (or never) issued orders or employed use of its Compact police powers.

For decades, the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission (ORSANCO) has issued water quality standards for the river that have been adopted, in whole or part, by several Ohio River states.

The states along the river (Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, Illinois and Pennsylvania) either develop their own water quality standards or adopt ORSANCO standards. There is disparity as to how different states arrive at their standards, and the permits they issue businesses to pollute the river reflect that difference. Furthermore, for more than 100 pollutants, ORSANCO issues standards where no state guidelines exist. In keeping with its bylaws and mission, ORSANCO should be the driving force for uniformity in pollution control for this multi-state river. If different conditions exist along the 981-mile river, then ORSANCO should work with the states to develop standards that are appropriate and fair and do not abridge downriver states' rights or conditions.

In some cases, ORSANCO's standards may be different than state standards. This should motivate ORSANCO and the states to reconcile differences. Instead, some states are exerting enormous pressure on ORSANCO to relinquish its standards setting role or make the adoption of any standard optional, with the expectation that all the states will agree to appropriate standards protective of each state's water quality. This is a risky bet where interstate cooperation is susceptible to state political interests. Setting standards is hard work on behalf of the public interest that should be embraced and vigorously pursued. ORSANCO should not make adoption of any of its standards optional, unless bona fide exceptions exist as allowed under the Clean Water Act.

Abdicating its role and responsibility is an affront to millions of people who depend on the river as their sole source of drinking water. Citizens at a public hearing voiced their concerns and news outlets in Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, West Virginia and Pennsylvania have published articles questioning the merit of this proposal. The public and some states have valid concerns, and ORSANCO should not turn a deaf ear or blind eye.

The Value of River-Wide Water Quality Criteria

As discussed above, there are clearly significant inconsistencies among state standards for the Ohio River that require further investigation before ORSANCO can draw any conclusions. Meanwhile, the affirmative value of river-wide criteria is clear. There have already been a number of instances where ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards have and will continue to play an important role in protecting water quality in the Ohio River.

For example, over the last decade ORSANCO has acted to address a growing concern with levels of Total Dissolved Solids ("TDS") in the Ohio River, by using an expedited PCS process in 2012 to reinstate a (previously eliminated) limit of 500 mg/L at drinking water intakes in order to protect drinking water quality. ORSANCO staff have subsequently conducted valuable research regarding background levels of TDS in order to support translation of that standard into appropriate permit limits. See ORSANCO, *Characterization of Dissolved Solids in the Ohio River and Selected Tributaries* (Feb. 2014), available at <http://www.orsanco.org/wp-content/uploads/2016/12/Characterization-of-Dissolved-Solids-in-the-Ohio-River-and-Selected-Tributaries.pdf>. This is an instance where ORSANCO, because of its triennial PCS review process, was well-positioned to react swiftly to a unique Ohio River problem and provide drinking water protection along the entire river, backed up by sound science and expertise. Without the PCS process, it is not clear when affected states – themselves facing budget constraints – might have dealt with this problem and what resources they might have to use to do so. The Water Users Advisory Committee comments similarly identify pollutants such as ammonia, E. coli, temperature, and others as ones where ORSANCO's standards provide important, uniform water quality protection across the entire Ohio River to the benefit of states as well as their citizens.

Even where addressing a given pollutant is simply a matter of adopting water quality criteria issued by U.S. EPA, ORSANCO can do so efficiently in order to bring the PCS up-to-date for the entire Ohio River at one time. As one example, ORSANCO has repeatedly indicated its readiness to adopt an updated U.S. EPA aquatic life criterion for selenium. Now that the federal criteria have been issued (in summer 2016), ORSANCO can do so. Notably, some states will not be conducting triennial reviews in which they would address this development for some time – for instance, West Virginia adopted fish tissue limits based on the draft criteria in 2016, but apparently will not address the water column limits in the final criterion until its next triennial review in 2020. By addressing this issue in its 2018 PCS review, ORSANCO will ensure those additional protections are in place significantly earlier. Moreover, in addressing this and other federal criteria, ORSANCO can determine on a river-wide basis whether those criteria are appropriate for the Ohio River rather than leaving individual member states to do so, with potentially disparate results.

Water Quality Assessment for the Ohio River

Sections 305(b) and 303(d) of the federal Clean Water Act require each state to conduct an assessment of the status of its waters every two years and make a determination as to whether those waters are “impaired” by any pollutant. 33 U.S.C. § 1315(b); 33 U.S.C. § 1313(d); 40 C.F.R. §§ 130.7, 130.8. ORSANCO has prepared a biennial section 305(b) assessment for the Ohio River ever since 2002, offering an expert view “of the degree to which the river supports each of its four designated uses: warm water aquatic life; public water supply; contact recreation; and fish consumption.” Although ORSANCO’s section 305(b) report does not substitute for each state’s duty to assess and determine the impairment status of the portions of the Ohio River within its jurisdiction, the Ohio River states have traditionally relied heavily on ORSANCO’s work in carrying out these Clean Water Act obligations. Often, states simply adopt ORSANCO’s evaluation and conclusions wholesale in determining the impairment status of the Ohio River.

State Adoption of ORSANCO Standards

Importantly, it has recently come to our attention that ORSANCO may be placing undue importance on a recent Ohio ERAC decision involving Dayton Power & Light (DPL). The major holding in that administrative court case was that Ohio EPA did not follow state law (Ohio Revised Code) in adopting an ORSANCO standard or criteria. The court never ruled on whether or not Ohio could adopt the ORSANCO standard, only that it did not properly follow state law in doing so. Note, that this case was not reviewed by other state courts and did not get beyond an administrative proceeding. Consequently, ORSANCO and its member states placing any importance on this ruling should limit it to the fact that any state seeking to adopt an ORSANCO standard should follow all applicable state laws relative to rulemaking and administrative procedure.

Conclusion

Any proposal for ORSANCO to enable states to avoid adopting its standards is obviously a significant policy change. Fundamentally, we believe that the current PCS process is in fact efficient and focused on the areas where ORSANCO is needed most and adoption of the PCS should be mandated, unless a state has a justifiable reason, as mentioned below.

Nevertheless, if ORSANCO does decide to refine its approach to the PCS, we urge the Commission to ensure it avoids throwing the baby out with the bathwater and preserves the PCS as a valuable tool for providing efficient and effective water quality standards across the whole Ohio River.

Before the Commission determines the wisest course of action, it must conduct further analysis of these key assumptions:

1. Pre-dating the Clean Water Act, the states in the Compact took it into their own hands to protect the integrity of the Ohio River and made a commitment to protecting to special uses of the River. We believe that all states should adopt and implement ORSANCO’s PCS, but [with amendments] we view this option as an interim measure.
2. The current proposal makes standards adoption discretionary, weakening their intent to protect the integrity of River’s valuable natural resources. While standards in existing permits may not be able to be removed due to anti-backsliding provisions, new permits however might not take the PCS into consideration, but instead may rely on a weaker state standard
3. The current proposal provides a permit by permit review of standards by the states that preserve the uses of the River, but there needs to be accountability of equivalent levels of protection. ORSANCO alleges “no single standard...is applicable...due to variable factors...”; but, it is important that ORSANCO establish baseline uniform reference discharge standards and mechanisms for holding states accountable.
4. Although ORSANCO’s role will not change in developing standards, states should be advised that these standards represent the best means of maintaining the uses of the River.

5. The river and watershed need nutrient criteria and standards. By revising the PCS to only apply to “entity discharging sewage or industrial waste” ORSANCO avoids this responsibility. If this is the intent, ORSANCO should be working with watershed states to create such nutrient parameters, similar to efforts on the Great Lakes and Chesapeake Bay.

Furthermore, the following conditions need to be added/addressed in the 2019 PCS proposal:

1. ORSANCO must work towards requiring all states to adopt and implement the PCS or equivalent ones;
2. states are only allowed to deviate from PCS for reasons justified under the Clean Water Act;
3. policies and procedures are developed to respond if a state proposes to deviate from PCS, such as a state needs to inform the other states, provide public notice of its intention to deviate from PCS and why, and allow for the public and other states to comment on the proposal;
4. policies and procedures are developed to continue to monitor for state deviations from ORSANCO standards and are ready for implementation by the October 2019 commission meeting;
5. ORSANCO should develop a report available to the public every 3 years to compare USEPA criteria, the PCS, and each state standards for all parameters;
6. ORSANCO should continue to perform permit reviews and outline this process in its policies and procedures.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide these comments and look forward to working with the Commission to make any improvements to the PCS that will have the end result of protecting and improving the condition of the Ohio River and avoid any risk of jeopardizing gains made in the last 70 years.

FracTracker Alliance respectfully submits these comments to oppose the proposed 2019 Revision to ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards ("PCS"). The 2019 Revision would downgrade the PCS from standards to mere guidelines. We believe ORSANCO's PCS must require state National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System ("NPDES") permits to go beyond the federal guidelines and requirements since the federal government has been weakening effluent limitations for numerous categories of industries that contribute to water pollution on the Ohio River. The federal government cannot be relied upon to set numerical water quality limitations stringent enough to reflect the best available technology or prevent pollution or maintain, restore, or improve water quality in the Ohio River.

The Ohio River is at risk from high levels of pollution from a variety of pollutants that threaten human health and the environment. It has been named by ORSANCO itself to be the most polluted river in the nation based on the number of pounds of toxic pollutants being dumped into it as tracked by the federal Toxics Release Inventory. See, e.g. Jennifer Shack, "Report: Ohio River the Most Polluted Body of Water in the U.S. for 7th Year in a Row" (Feb. 24, 2015), <https://www.wlwt.com/article/report-ohio-river-most-polluted-body-of-water-in-u-s-for-7th-year-in-row/3551807>.

The 2019 Revision to the PCS proposed by ORSANCO is a flagrant attempt by industry interests to erode ORSANCO's authority to hold polluting facilities to the standards necessary to protect and support users and river-dependent wildlife throughout the Ohio River watershed.

According to official state datasets, FracTracker has found 4,451 active oil and gas wells in Southwest Pennsylvania counties, 4,190 of these wells are horizontal and generally known to individually produce millions of gallons of noxious liquid waste. In Ohio, there are 2,604

unconventional wells in the Utica Shale. In West Virginia, there are 3,497 "active" horizontal wells (69,392 total active wells). Kentucky contains thousands of additional oil and gas wells. Most of these wells present known and potential sources of egregious water pollution. Planned large-scale petrochemical facilities and expanding networks of pipelines pose other water contamination risks to the Ohio River and its tributaries. Due to such threats and other known and prevalent causes of impaired water quality in the basin, the 2019 revision must be rejected. Individual states - with budgetary woes and other constraints cannot be relied upon to protect the Ohio River alone. We respectfully seek a new revision - to Strengthen ORSANCO's Pollution Control Authority. Thank you.

To Whom It May Concern:

On March 1, 2019, ORSANCO made available for comment its draft revisions to the Pollution Control Standards (“PCS”). The following comments regarding this action are submitted on behalf of the Ohio Utilities and Generation and its member companies (“OUG”).¹ OUG members own and operate power plants and other facilities that generate, transmit, and distribute electricity for residential, commercial, industrial, and institutional customers. These power plants and other facilities are subject to the Clean Water Act and Ohio water regulations. OUG’s purpose, in part, is to participate collectively on behalf of its members in administrative proceedings under various environmental laws and in litigation arising from those proceedings that affect OUG.

Background

In 2017, ORSANCO solicited comments from its Advisory Committees regarding five alternatives to address its role in developing the PCS for the Ohio River. These alternatives ranged from continuing with the status quo to completely eliminating ORSANCO’s role in developing the standards. On August 29, 2017, the Power Industry Advisory Committee submitted comments to ORSANCO. OUG endorsed those comments, having provided input on the initial comments. OUG further incorporated those comments by reference in comments submitted in February 2018 and August 2018.

In early 2018, ORSANCO expressed its intent to adopt Alternative 2, which was the Power Industry Advisory Committee's preference. This would "[m]odify ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards ... by removal of the Water Quality Criteria (Chapter 3), Mixing Zone Designation (Chapter 4) and portions of wastewater discharge requirements (Chapter 5) from the [Pollution Control Standards] and maintain the Chapters on Designated Uses."² At the Technical Committee meeting on February 7-8, 2018, some members of the public and some States expressed concerns that this action would be to the detriment of the Ohio River. This sentiment was reiterated in hundreds of non-substantive comments submitted by the public.

At the June 7, 2018 Commissioner's meeting, the Commissioners voted to proceed with the adoption of Alternative 2. At this meeting, nongovernmental organizations ("NGOs") and the public had a strong presence and requested that ORSANCO reconsider Alternative 2. Ultimately, the Commissioners voted to recommend Alternative 2 with all Commissioners voting yes with the exception of six Commissioners. The Commissioners also voted to have another public comment period and to hold a public hearing. The goal was to cast a final vote at the October 2018 meeting.

On June 26, 2018, ORSANCO held the public hearing. Almost 100 people attended the hearing and almost 50 people provided verbal comments. All of the commenters urged ORSANCO to not move forward with its proposal to adopt Alternative 2. In addition, the public comment period was open from June 26 to August 20, 2018. ORSANCO received over 5,500 comments against Alternative 2, 38 substantive comments against Alternative 2, and 10 substantive comments supporting Alternative 2. Most of the comments on Alternative 2 appear to be due to a lack of understanding of how Ohio River water quality is protected. The Compact was signed on June 30, 1948. At that time, the U.S. EPA and state agencies that would regulate water pollution did not exist and there was a need to address the increasing raw sewage and unregulated industrial pollution discharged to the Ohio River. Since that time, the Clean Water Act was enacted (and revised multiple times) and has been implemented at both the State and Federal level.

At the October 2018 meeting, there was significant pushback from NGOs asking the Commissioner to delay a vote on Alternative 2. Ultimately, the Commissioners deferred action on a vote to approve Alternative 2. The PCS Committee met October 20, 2018 and designated a subcommittee to continue review of its role in developing the PCS. The subcommittee had conference calls on November 4, 8, and 15, 2018 and met in person on November 30, 2018. The subcommittee set forth key tenants with regard to ORSANCO's involvement with the PCS:

- any proposal should be consistent with the compact;
- any proposal should provide for a cost effective use of ORSANCO and State resources;
- any proposal should provide for the PCS to be available for States to use if desired;
- any proposal should not be mandated to the States;

- any proposal should preserve the PCS to be available for specific main stem Ohio River problems that may arise in the future; and
- any proposal should ensure that the uses identified in the Compact are maintained.

On March 1, 2019, ORSANCO issued draft revisions to the PCS. According to ORSANCO, these revisions:

- maintain the PCS for the Ohio River to help ensure the uses outlined in ORSANCO's Compact are achieved;
- provide needed flexibility for member states to utilize the PCS in their Ohio River discharge permits as needed while ensuring the Ohio River uses are achieved;
- maintain ORSANCO's role in water quality protection established in its Compact; and
- recognize that consistency among states as it relates to Ohio River water quality is achieved through maintenance of the protective uses for the Ohio River as established in its Compact.

Comments

Alternative 2.

ORSANCO should consider moving forward with Alternative 2. Under Alternative 2, ORSANCO would no longer conduct a triennial review of the PCS or assess variances for the Ohio River. However, under the Clean Water Act, each state is required to develop and enforce water quality standards; these requirements must be approved by U.S. EPA. In addition, most of the numeric criteria promulgated by the states come directly from U.S. EPA recommendations. Thus, under Alternative 2, contrary to the concerns expressed by some, the Ohio River will continue to be protected by the states, with oversight and input from U.S. EPA. Further, ORSANCO would maintain the chapters on Designated Uses and presumably continue to submit an Integrated Report on these uses for the entire Ohio River.

It should be noted that Ohio EPA cannot incorporate ORSANCO's PCS by reference nor can it include any of ORSANCO's PCS in a permit without first promulgating, through notice and comment rulemaking, the standards under Ohio Law.³ Therefore, any changes to ORSANCO's PCS must then be adopted by Ohio EPA through a rulemaking, which requires Ohio EPA to provide its own legal and technical justification for the revisions before the revised standards can be implemented on the Ohio River. This step, however, allows interested parties to challenge any proposed standards when there is no defensible legal or technical basis for the standards. By adopting Alternative 2, ORSANCO is simply removing one component of an already long process in promulgating and implementing regulations to protect the Ohio River.

OUG would also like to point out that, currently, there is no consistency among member states in implementing the PCS. Some states adopt the PCS by reference, some states “pick and choose” what PCS elements are adopted, while others (such as Ohio EPA) are required to conduct a formal state rulemaking to adopt any elements of the PCS. This confusion is detrimental to the regulated community as the advantage of having regulatory certainty (in terms of permit requirements) is often unavailable.

OUG has long questioned the jurisdiction for challenging ORSANCO’s ability to promulgate the PCS. Article VI of the Compact gives the Commission authority “to adopt, prescribe and promulgate rules, regulations and standards for administering and enforcing the provisions of this article.” The Compact also gives the Commission authority to issue orders requiring a person to eliminate, modify, or treat a discharge into the Ohio River. Article IX also indicates that the Commission can enforce these orders in any Court of General jurisdiction or any United States district court in the signatory states “by mandamus, injunction, specific performance or other form of remedy.” Ohio R.C. §6113.03 provides that the courts of common pleas are granted the jurisdiction specified in Article IX. In contrast, the Compact is silent regarding whether a party has a right to appeal ORSANCO’s PCS, and ORSANCO’s legal staff contends that parties are not afforded judicial review. Thus, OUG has often found it frustrating when ORSANCO proposed revisions where there was no sound legal or technical basis for the revision. Even when OUG had the opportunity to comment on ORSANCO’s revisions, there was no legal recourse if ORSANCO disregarded OUG’s comments. In contrast, as noted above, when states promulgate standards, there is a legal avenue to challenge those standards.

Rather than trying to be a regulatory body that duplicates the work of the states, OUG thinks that, by adopting Alternative 2, ORSANCO can focus on one of its greatest assets to the states – collecting data on the health of the Ohio River. This is a very important aspect of developing water quality standards. This is especially critical given the limited resources both states and ORSANCO have faced in the most recent years. Many OUG companies rely on ORSANCO monitoring data to assess water quality near their generating facilities.

ORSANCO’s 2019 Revision.

ORSANCO’s current proposal maintains the PCS but leaves it up to the states on whether they choose to implement the PCS through rulemaking or through NPDES permits. While OUG does not oppose the current revision should ORSANCO not adopt Alternative 2, OUG does not think the proposed revision differs much from the current status of the PCS for the following reasons:

- Under the proposed revisions, ORSANCO will still have to review and revise the PCS. Thus, ORSANCO resources will continue to be used to fulfill this requirement. The purpose of Alternative 2 was to free up ORSANCO resources so that ORSANCO could focus on tasks such as monitoring and emergency response.
- Under the proposed revisions, ORSANCO will still need to seek public comments on the revisions to the PCS. Once again, this consumes the limited resources of ORSANCO.

Further, the question remains regarding how an interested party can challenge any standards that are not scientifically sound or legally justified.

- Currently, states implement the PCS differently. Some states implement the PCS by directly putting discharge limits in NPDES permits. Other states, such as Ohio, must promulgate the PCS via their own rulemaking, which prolongs the rulemaking process. Thus, there is really no difference under the proposed revision.

OUG reiterates that its members can support the proposed revision if Alternative 2 is no longer a viable option. However, ORSANCO should consider if these revisions alleviate pressure on ORSANCO's limited resources.

Other Comments

OUG recommends that ORSANCO eliminate the human health temperature standard of 110 degrees F. This standard was developed to address the cooling water discharge of one plant, the J.M. Stuart Station, which has been closed permanently. Thus, this standard is no longer necessary.

Conclusion

OUG thanks ORSANCO for the opportunity to comment and would be happy to meet with ORSANCO to discuss the above recommendations.

To Whom It May Concern:

The Wet Weather Partnership is a national association of local communities with combined sewer systems (and combined sewer overflows, or "CSOs") who have for many years advocated for fair treatment of CSO communities, and whose goal is to seek environmentally responsible solutions to all urban wet weather issues in an efficient, fiscally prudent manner. Most of its member communities also have urban storm water discharges and strive to develop programs that reflect the most cost-effective control of urban wet weather discharges. Several member communities are located within the Ohio River Valley.

While we commend the Commission's work to protect water quality in the Ohio River, we reiterate our support to eliminate the PCS in their entirety, effective after a one-year transition period for any State that wishes such a delay. Today's mature Clean Water Act legal and regulatory framework more than adequately ensures full protection for the river through a very transparent process. This includes the ability of any affected State to impose more stringent requirements which upstream states would have to ensure are met.

States which have relied on certain provisions in the PCS, rather than incorporating them into their own State regulations, could have a one-to-two-year transition period to update their respective state laws and regulations. For all the other compact members, the PCS should be removed without delay.

Should the Commission ultimately decide to retain the PCS, we support the addition of clarifying language to the PCS giving compact states flexibility to customize their water

quality standards and National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits notwithstanding the PCS, providing any such state-specific approaches are consistent with federal requirements. We understand that such State departures from current PCS requirements would require notice by the affected State to USEPA.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide our thoughts on the best use of the Commission's expertise and resources.

Re: Sierra Club Call to Action: Protect the Ohio River and Drinking Water for 5 Million People.

Dear ORSANCO:

I am Hank Graddy, Chair of the Sierra Club, Cumberland Chapter (Ky) Water Committee. I have served on the ORSANCO Watershed Organization Advisory Committee (WOAC) in that capacity since that advisory committee was established.

These comments have been adopted by the Cumberland Chapter (Ky) of the Sierra Club and are intended to be generally consistent with comments from the other Sierra Club Chapters along the Ohio River.

The Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission's (ORSANCO) latest proposed Pollution Control Standard (PCS) recommendations are an improvement over the proposed action under consideration last year – referred to as Alternative 2 – but the recommendations are not adequate and should be withdrawn. ORSANCO should maintain the PCS standards, and maintain the requirement that all states revise their state water quality standards and permitting programs to utilize the ORSANCO standards when issuing discharge permits into the Ohio River.

Rationale: Setting Ohio River Pollution Control Standards (PCS) is the most important work that ORSANCO performs.

The majority of the mainstem states for which the utilization of the ORSANCO PCS Standards is an issue, already utilize these standards in their permitting decisions. Indiana and Pennsylvania do so as a matter of regulation, West Virginia does so as a matter of policy, and Kentucky incorporated the ORSANCO standards into its water quality standards for the Ohio until 2009, when it determined that except for 3 parameters, the state standards were equivalent to the ORSANCO standards. Ohio has a separate set of water quality standards for discharges into the Ohio River, which incorporate some, but not all, of the ORSANCO standards. Illinois does not utilize the ORSANCO standards at all in the permitting decisions.

The Pollution Control Standards are the product of decades of deliberation by the Technical Committee and other committees of ORSANCO, and of the Commission itself, based on a determination that these standards were necessary and appropriate for improving the health of the river and maintaining water quality necessary to fully support all designated uses outlined in the Compact. That a compact state's Commissioners would have voted without objection to approve these standards for discharges into the mainstem, and then determine to ignore the standards when setting permitting monitoring requirements and discharge limitations, is deeply cynical. The Commission should not alter the applicability PCS standards by making them "advisable" to accommodate two mainstem states who do not currently utilize the standards or their equivalent.

Our criticism of the pending proposal goes further. We believe this proposal is a breach of the ORSANCO Compact. We previously attached the Compact in full as it appears in the Kentucky Revised Statutes at KRS 224.18-760 to our August 20, 2018 comments, and we highlighted in yellow the language in the Compact which we maintain requires the signatory states to adopt the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards, without any weakening alterations. We will not set forth herein the entire Compact again, but we will summarize our reading of the Compact, as follows:

1. Article I contains the commitment of each state to every other state to full cooperation, including agreement to any necessary legislation to enable each state to place and maintain safe use, including suitable for recreational usage, of the waters in the Ohio River basin.
2. Article VI contains the guiding principle that pollution for one state shall not injuriously affect the uses of any other state, sets basic treatment technology standards, with the recognition that a higher degree of treatment may be required, and authorizes the Commission to determine the treatment needed to protect public health and preserve water uses, including the authorization or rules, regulations and standards.
3. Article VII contains an express reservation of the power of any state to impose additional conditions and restrictions that would further lesson or prevent pollution of the waters within the jurisdiction of that state.
4. Article IX contains the authorization for ORSANCO to take enforcement action against any municipality or entity within the Ohio River basin concerning their discharge.

Nowhere does any state reserve any authority to enact weaker standards, conditions or restrictions than the ORSANCO standards conditions or restrictions. Without such reservation of authority, each state that is within this ORSANCO Compact is legally bound by the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards.

Where every state has recognized ORSANCO's authority to bring an enforcement action against any municipality or entity within that state, that state has no reservation of authority to undermine the ORSANCO enforcement action by authorizing a municipality or entity to discharge more pollution than ORSANCO has authorized.

These standards are necessary to protect the Ohio River, which 5 million people rely on for drinking water. ORSANCO's proposal would make subtle changes to the language that would have serious impacts and leave key pollution control standards on the cutting room floor. The draft PCS would eliminate the current mandate for states to adopt the PCS, making these protections optional. Currently, citizens are able to use the Compact to pressure state Governors and the water quality agencies to do more to protect the Ohio River and the drinking water of 5 million people. If the Compact PCS become voluntary, our elected officials will be able to point to the voluntary nature of the Compact to avoid discussions and actions to improve the health of the Ohio River.

If it were legal, a patchwork of standards will lead to confusion for businesses, and be less cost-effective. Standards maintained by one agency provide cost-effective management for the Ohio River States as well as providing clarity for businesses applying for permits to build along the river.

With our criticism of the current proposal, the Sierra Club also wants to express appreciation to the ORSANCO Commissioners for hearing and acting on the public criticism of Alternative 2 expressed throughout 2018, and for the decision in October 2018 to take no action on Alternative 2 at the Fall ORSANCO Commission meeting. During 2018, Sierra Club Chapters and the vast majority of the public expressed strong opposition to any action that would end the ORSANCO responsibility to set Pollution Control Standards for the Ohio River as was proposed in Alternative 2. We thank you for hearing the public and rejecting this proposed action.

In The Alternative: If the Commission determines to move forward with the proposal that it has presented for public comment, it should defer adoption until an appendix to the PCS is developed that addresses the issues relating to implementation in order to make the process robust and to hold those states *not* utilizing the ORSANCO standards accountable to the public and the other Compact states.

These matters should be incorporated into an Appendix, released for public review, and final approval of the proposed revision to the PCS should be accompanied by revisions addressing each of these points:

a. The notice and opportunity for Commission staff to review must be on a permit-by-permit basis. For those states not utilizing ORSANCO standards or their equivalent state counterpart, the review should focus on whether the discharge permit limitations and other requirements of the draft permit provide comparable use protection and

achievement of Compact goals as if the ORSANCO standards were being utilized to set permit limits.

b. The notice and opportunity for staff review should occur *prior* to the commencement of the public notice and comment process under the state's NPDES program, and the staff determination regarding whether the draft permit provides comparable use protection and achievement of Compact goals, should be placed into record at the time that the draft permit is public-noticed and the public comment period begins.

c. Any discharge permit proposed by a state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS standards or their equivalent, should include in the public notice a notation of this fact, whether the ORSANCO review found the draft permit provided comparable protection, and that the ORSANCO determination is available for public review.

d. In addition to the permit-by-permit review, ORSANCO staff should review and comment on the differences between the PCS standards and the water quality standards of each state during their triennial review process, and each state not utilizing the ORSANCO PCS or the equivalent standard should be obligated justify the decision not to adopt each of the PCS into the state water quality regulations.

ORSANCO Must Set Numeric Nutrient Standards for the Ohio River:

The river and watershed need nutrient criteria and standards. By revising the PCS to only apply to "entity discharging sewage or industrial waste" ORSANCO may seek to avoid this responsibility. ORSANCO should be working with watershed states to create such parameters, similar to efforts on the Great Lakes and Chesapeake Bay.

ORSANCO should take the lead in setting numeric nutrient standards for the Ohio River. This need is longstanding and ORSANCO is in the best position to lead. In fact, this is exactly what ORSANCO reported that it was working on in the most recent 2018 ORSANCO Annual Report, at page15:

Nutrient Criteria Development

Excessive nutrients have long been an issue in our nation's waterways, and the Ohio River is no exception. To resolve this issue, ORSANCO staff have been working towards defensible nutrient criteria for the Ohio River for over a decade using nutrient, planktonic algae, and chlorophyll-a....

In 2014, ORSANCO purchased 60 continuous dissolved oxygen loggers to obtain this information that was previously unavailable. Since then, these loggers have been placed alongside the macroinvertebrate samplers in the Belleville, Markland, McAlpine, Olmstead/Open Water, Montgomery, Racine, JT Myers, Willow Island, Greenup, and Cannelton pools in the Ohio River. Additionally, water samples were obtained for nutrient and chlorophyll-a analysis at each of these sites.

ORSANCO staff are currently analyzing the data from this paired study, and early indications are promising that defensible nutrient criteria can be developed from this approach. This study is scheduled to continue during the 2018 field season.

The need is compelling. The 2018 Annual Report discusses current eutrophication problems in the Ohio River at page 15 and 16:

Harmful Algal Blooms

Algae are present in the Ohio River throughout the year.....

Cyanobacteria can produce toxins which can be harmful if ingested. For this reason, an algal bloom which consists primarily of cyanobacteria is considered a Harmful Algal Bloom (HAB)...

*On August 19, 2015, ORSANCO received an NRC report of a paint-like green material on the Ohio River at Pike Island Locks and Dam (ORM 84.2), which covered 100 X 200 feet. This was quickly identified as the blue-green algae *Microcystis aeruginosa*. Over the next month, this bloom expanded to cover the Ohio River from Pike Island L&D to Cannelton L&D (ORM 84.2 to 720.7).....*

The Sierra Club stands ready to work with ORSANCO to improve and protect the water quality in the Ohio River. We stand ready to help the public better understand what ORSANCO does and to build public support for your work. We reaffirm our opinion that ORSANCO's role of setting Ohio River Pollution Control Standards is the most important role for ORSANCO.

The Indiana Manufacturers Association (IMA) is pleased to submit comments on the Commission's latest proposed revisions to the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards – 2015 Revision (the PCS). Because of the continued importance of this issue and the effect of the PCS on Indiana manufacturers we submit these comments on the Commission's current proposal.

The IMA represents over 1000 member companies throughout Indiana on issues including environmental policy. Indiana manufacturers seek a uniform and consistent regulatory environment and the IMA has advocated policies to break down overlapping authorities.

The IMA continues to believe that substantial revisions to the PCS are needed to eliminate the unnecessary and duplicative burdens of the current regulatory scheme while still protecting the water quality goals of the ORSANCO Compact. The enactment of the federal Clean Water Act and implementation of federally enforceable State water quality programs have brought about dramatic improvement water in the Ohio River water quality. The existence of these comprehensive State programs has substantially altered the role ORSANCO can and should play under the modern federal-state water quality regulatory regime.

Ideally, the Commission should eliminate the duplicative and unnecessary Pollution Control Standards. The IMA supports the Commission's previous proposal, which would have largely removed ORSANCO from its duplicative role in water quality regulation and allowed it to focus on its longstanding and valuable role in gathering and evaluating scientific and technical information on water quality in the Ohio River.

If the Commission feels compelled to follow the approach embodied by its current proposal and to maintain the PCS largely unaltered, it should revise the proposal to clarify that:

- (i) The water quality standards and permitting provisions of each State's USEPA-approved NPDES permitting program are presumptively comparable to the water quality protections afforded by the PCS;
- (ii) Any NPDES permit issued pursuant to one of those USEPA-approved programs will be presumed to meet the goals and requirements of the ORSANCO Compact; and
- (iii) The burden of proof is on the Commission, after due notice, investigation and hearing, to demonstrate that any such NPDES does *not* provide "comparable" use protection and achievement of the Compact's

goals as provided by the PCS, and that a permit applicant may challenge any such determination in a court of proper jurisdiction.

As currently drafted, the Commission's proposal will only create more confusion and uncertainty about both the role of ORSANCO in water quality regulation and when and how States and permittees must address and incorporate the PCS in permits for discharges to the Ohio River. Without the clarifications identified above, the proposal will merely increase the significant costs and inefficiencies associated with the PCS program, putting businesses along the Ohio River at a competitive disadvantage and creating a disincentive for further business investment within the Compact States.

FirstEnergy Corp. ("FirstEnergy") submits the following comments to the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission ("ORSANCO") regarding the ongoing review of the pollution control standards ("PCS")

FirstEnergy Corp. ("FirstEnergy") is a diversified energy company headquartered in Akron, Ohio. FirstEnergy's 10 operating companies form one of the nation's largest investor-owned electric systems, servicing customers in six states, including Maryland, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia. The operating companies are the Potomac Edison Company, Ohio Edison Company, The Illuminating Company, Toledo Edison Company, Pennsylvania Electric Company, Metropolitan Edison Company, Pennsylvania Power Company, West Penn Power Company, Monongahela Power Company and Jersey Central Power and Light. Together, these companies are involved in the transmission and distribution of electricity serving approximately 6 million customers over a 65,000 square mile area. This electric service is provided through approximately 194,000,000 miles of distribution circuits and over 24,000 miles of transmission circuits. FirstEnergy's generating fleet features scrubbed coal and hydroelectric and has a generating capacity of approximately 5,000 megawatts. FirstEnergy is committed to generating and providing its customers with safe, reliable and cost-effective electricity while ensuring the protection of our country's waterways, including the Ohio River and its tributaries.

FirstEnergy participated in the development of and concurs with comments filed by the Ohio Utility Group ("OUG") in support of the Commission's adoption of Alternative #2, as well as initial comments filed on August 29, 2017 by the Power Industry Advisory Committee. In addition, FirstEnergy is pleased to offer the following comments to further emphasize points raised by the OUG.

ORSANCO recently made available for comment its revisions to the PCS. The PCS have undergone extensive discussion and debate as to whether they should continue and in what form. FirstEnergy recognizes that ORSANCO was formed in 1948 predating all of the state environmental agencies, United States Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA"), and the Clean Water Act. Since that time, the Clean Water Act and related laws have been enacted, as well as the development and implementation of a comprehensive system of federal and state water quality programs and standards, which administer all ORSANCO Compact States. The result has been a dramatic improvement in the quality of the Ohio River, as well as its tributaries and other streams throughout the Compact States.

Today, each of the Compact States is implementing a federally-enforceable water quality program approved by the EPA pursuant to the Clean Water Act. Those programs have been effective in addressing each State's streams as aquatic habitats, as well as supporting their uses for recreation and drinking water.

FirstEnergy believes the regulatory water quality framework that has developed and matured, outside of ORSANCO, since the 1970s makes the PCS an unnecessary, duplicative effort for ORSANCO, the Compact States, and the regulated community. FirstEnergy supports Alternative 2, as it was provided and supported in the February 2018 public notice and the ORSANCO commissioners June 7, 2018 meeting.

FirstEnergy, as a member of the regulated community, believes that regulatory consistency and transparency are important attributes for all involved in the environmental process. Also, it is important that water quality standards and designations have a firm understanding of the streams current water quality and how pollutants affect relevant biological populations. The PCS goes against both goals.

First, the PCS is inconsistently applied across the Compact States. Some states adopt the PCS by reference, some states “pick and choose” what PCS elements are adopted, while others (such as Ohio EPA) are required to conduct a formal state rulemaking to adopt any elements of the PCS. Given FirstEnergy’s service territory, the inconsistency creates regulatory uncertainty in the environmental process, particularly between Compact States.

Second, we live in a world where we must be more efficient with less resources. ORSANCO has provided states and the regulated community with data on the health of the Ohio River. The data has been critical to helping develop appropriate environmental regulations and water quality standards. By maintaining the PCS, ORSANCO is tacitly shifting focus away from such important data collecting programs and reallocating resources to a duplicative and inconsistent PCS that provides negligible environmental benefit.

FirstEnergy appreciates the opportunity to provide these comments on the PCS Program and request the Commission carefully consider these comments, as well as those from OUG. Please do not hesitate to call Dan Havalo at (330) 315-6714 to discuss these comments in more detail.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment. The current proposed PCS is acceptable under the condition that:

- ORSANCO works towards requiring all states to adopt and implement the PCS or equivalent.
- States are only allowed to deviate from PCS for good scientific reasons [or based on social and economic justification].
- Policies and procedures are developed to respond if a state proposes to deviate from PCS, i.e. that state needs to inform the other states, provide public notice of its intention to deviate from PCS and why, and allow for the public and other states to comment on the proposal.
- Policies and procedures are developed to continue to monitor for deviations from ORSANCO standards and are ready for implementation by the October commission meeting.
- ORSANCO should maintain the triennial review process, developing a report available to the public every 3 years to compare USEPA criteria and PCS with each state standards for all parameters.
- ORSANCO should continue to perform permit reviews, and seek funding for additional staffing in order to make sure such reviews can be done in as timely a manner as possible.

In addition, given the probable buildup of oil and gas along the OHIO, and the fact that these wells do not have to abide by any major environmental regulations, and the possibility of increased cumulative pollutants entering the River due to the current ORSANCO PCS proposal, we would strongly advocate for additional sampling sites being added to the current Organic Detection System, to allow for a better coverage, and earlier detection of spills and harmful pollution level increases.

Established in 1911, the Kentucky Association of Manufacturers ("KAM") is the Commonwealth's oldest industrial trade association. The Association's mission is to raise the prosperity of all Kentuckians by protecting and growing the Commonwealth's economic engine, manufacturing. KAM seeks to enhance the competitiveness of manufacturers by shaping a legislative and regulatory environment conducive to economic growth, and to increase understanding among policymakers, the media, and the general public about the importance of manufacturing to America's economic strength. KAM, in coordination with its Kentucky Chemical Industry Council ("CIC"), supports environmental programs that are based on sound science, consider cost-benefit relationships, and consider technical and economic feasibility. KAM and CIC appreciate the opportunity to submit the following comments regarding the above-referenced action.

On February 23, 2018, KAM/CIC responded to ORSANCO's request for comment regarding the organization's review of its Pollution Control Standards ("PCS"). At that time, KAM and CIC supported Alternative #2 offered by ORSANCO's PCS review materials, which includes the following statement:

In recognition of the successes of the federal Clean Water Act and the related state water pollution control programs of member states, the Pollution Control Standards (PCS) should be revised by adding a provision that recognizes that water quality standards and criteria, as well as mixing zone requirements, and other provisions of the PCS are being adequately addressed by member states in accordance with programs appropriate for implementation of the federal Clean Water Act. To the extent that all member states are operating under such programs, the Commission may conclude that it need not continue with triennial review process related to water quality criteria (and related provisions) of the PCS.

The implementation of the federal Clean Water Act and federally enforceable state water quality programs have brought about dramatic improvement in the Ohio River water quality. In addition, the existence of these comprehensive state programs has substantially altered the role ORSANCO can and should play under the modern federal-state water quality regulatory relationship. Therefore, KAM and CIC continue to support ORSANCO's previously proposed Alternative #2. That alternative would have largely removed ORSANCO from its duplicative role in water quality regulation and allowed it to focus on its longstanding and valuable role in gathering, evaluating, and sharing scientific and technical information on water quality in the Ohio River. Simply, ORSANCO's PCS are no longer necessary in light of the federal and

state-delegated programs.

KAM and CIC urge ORSANCO to revise the program to be consistent with the above-quoted language in Alternative #2. To do otherwise would be to perpetuate the unnecessary and duplicative burdens of the ORSANCO PCS relative to state water quality protection programs, which creates confusion, complexity, and unnecessarily costly burdens resulting in inefficiency.

However, in the event that ORSANCO feels compelled to follow the approach contained in the current proposal, it is critical that the Commission acknowledge that current NPDES permitting programs and water quality standards are presumptively providing comparable use protection and achievement of the Compact's goals, unless ORSANCO can prove otherwise after due notice, investigation and hearing.

The PCS serve little effective purpose under the current, comprehensive water quality regulatory regime. Consequently, KAM and CIC urge the Commission to return to its prior proposal. Please do not hesitate to contact me at (502) 352-4612 with any questions you may have.

If ORSANCO were to no longer set mandatory standards for the Ohio River compact states, but instead merely recommended standards for the states to consider, there may be certain advantages and disadvantages. On the one hand, without common standards there may be greater conflicts and lawsuits among the member states and various water users, with damages to the river going unresolved while legal battles drag on. On the other hand, it may be easier to reach consensus in order to simply recommend protective standards, allowing for setting "advisory standards" for many of the unregulated contaminants currently being discharged and spilled into the Ohio River.

Regardless of whether PCSs are mandatory or merely recommendations, ORSANCO should increase protections through increased monitoring. ORSANCO's ODS monitoring sites should be increased in the River(s). In addition, ORSANCO should begin asking that each permit being reviewed should include an assessment of whether continuous monitoring at the permit's outfalls is feasible for any and all contaminants of concern. The sooner permittees become aware of unintended discharges, the sooner they can improve their operations, reduce overall costs, and protect the river.

Another permit item ORSANCO should review is whether the permittee has sufficient Spill Insurance to cover the potential liability costs of damages to downstream uses. Most facilities don't have this add-on policy. In West Virginia (even after the Charleston spill) the state does not offer continuing education courses for insurance agents to know how to write Spill policies. Other states may be as negligent in this area as well. If ORSANCO were to begin asking for these spill insurance policies to be noted in permits, then more facilities would likely become covered.

ORSANCO could increase protections for public water supplies if there was a requirement for spillers to promptly notify downstream utilities of their spills within a reasonably short time frame (such as one hour), or be fined. The fines could go into ORSANCO's Source Water Protection and Spill Response Programs. Reportable quantities of contaminants of concern could be established for many currently unregulated contaminants as well as any regulated ones.

ORSANCO may or may not benefit by making its PCSs non-mandatory. That topic needs a fullsome debate. ORSANCO should also look at other options, in preparation for a greater overhaul of its programs, with the intention of once again taking the lead in protecting the Ohio River and its uses.

The Nature Conservancy in Ohio appreciates the opportunity to convey our position on the 2019 proposed amendments to the Pollution Control Standards, 2015 Edition.

The Nature Conservancy is a non-partisan, science-based organization that seeks to conserve the lands and waters on which all life depends. Within the signatory states to the compact that created ORSANCO the Nature Conservancy counts more than 300,000 members. We work collaboratively with business, farmers, sports groups, government, and local communities to develop pragmatic, market-based solutions to conservation challenges in every state in the Ohio River Basin. Over the past decade we have helped create several very large business-environmental collaborations including the Ohio River Basin Alliance, 4R Nutrient Stewardship Certification, and the Ohio River Basin Fish Habitat Partnership. During this time, we have been fortunate to have worked with outstanding staff from your organization and count ORSANCO as a strong partner in maintaining the health of the Ohio River for millions of users along it.

After reading the proposed amendments we believe that this is an important juncture for ORSANCO and your amazingly successful interstate structure that has very much enabled the recovery of the Ohio River from its highly degraded state in the 1940s to the multi-use powerhouse that it is today. We offer the following observations on the proposed changes.

The proposed amendments to the pollution control standards will end the role of ORSANCO in setting pollution control standards and allow individual states to set limits. While we agree with Article VI of the ORSANCO Compact that states “no single standard for the treatment of sewage or industrial waste is applicable to all parts of the District due to such variable factors as size, flow, locations, character, self-purification, and usage of waters within the district” we are concerned that with the proposed changes, individual states may be tempted to set limits that enhance their competitive advantage or favor economic interests within a state at the expense of other users. We emphasize that Article VI as referenced within the proposed 2019 amended Pollution Control Standards (PCS) still states that “Minimum requirements for treatment of sewage and industrial wastes originating within a signatory state shall not injuriously affect the various uses of the interstate waters”.

While we are concerned about unintended consequences of the switch from ORSANCO setting pollution control standards, to each signatory state assuming that role, we recognize and commend the revisions made to the proposed amendments released in 2018. We are appreciative that commissioners recognized and addressed the concerns of The Nature Conservancy and other parties.

Specifically, we are pleased that the PCS program for ORSANCO will not be eliminated. Retaining the ability of ORSANCO to continue to evaluate the condition and needs of these interstate waters assures that an important safeguard will remain in place should individual states fail to satisfactorily protect recognized uses. Another important revision to the previously proposed amendments is that "...each signatory state will provide notice and an opportunity for comment to the Commission of any proposed or draft discharge permit to the main stem of the Ohio River". We also note that the 2019 revisions to the PCS still grant authority of the commission to require higher degrees of treatment where they are determined to be necessary after investigation, due notice and hearing.


Another important change is that the standards also set forth certain general conditions, water quality criteria and waste water discharge requirements deemed advisable by the Commission to comply with the Compact. We note that "These standards were adopted by the Commission for use or consideration by signatory States as they develop and implement their programs to assure that those designated uses and other goals regarding pollution control and prevention set forth in the Compact will be achieved". It appears that the general conditions, water quality criteria, etc. as stated above are still listed in Chapter 3 of the PCS despite previous references to that chapter being eliminated.

As part of the changes to the role of the PCS program it is our understanding that the current tri-annual review schedule would likely change. While it may no longer be necessary to conduct these reviews as frequently, The Nature Conservancy in Ohio strongly recommends that no more than a 5-year cycle is utilized. Changing stream flow patterns brought about by ongoing climatic change in the Ohio River Basin as stated in the Institute for Water Resources Ohio River Basin Climate Pilot Study (Drum et al 2017) may result in previous dilution relationships and background levels of chemical constituents changing considerably. Should changes in load, and dilution occur rapidly, a long review rotation would be insufficient to provide appropriate guidance or feedback to states.

Conclusion

We greatly appreciate the leadership of ORSANCO to address the water quality and quantity issues along the Ohio River. Overall, the proposed amendments are reasonable and provide important safeguards to protect the multiple uses of the interstate waters within the compact area. Thank you for the opportunity to address this important proposal.

To Whom It May Concern:

On behalf of the Louisville & Jefferson County Metropolitan Sewer District (MSD), I would like to express our continued support of the Commission and its mission to protect and improve the water quality of the Ohio River. We appreciate the opportunity to submit the following comments related to the review and revision of the Commission's Pollution Control Standards.

MSD supports the proposed revisions to *Chapter 1: General Provisions, 1.1. Authority and Purpose* of the Commission's Pollution Control Standards (PCS). A review of the proposed changes seems to indicate that ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards are transitioning from a regulatory program to more of an advisory document for discretionary use by the states.

We believe these changes will eliminate the potential perception of duplication of regulatory responsibilities and provide clarity to the valuable role that ORSANCO plays in protecting the Ohio River uses. While the states should maintain their role in the development of water quality criteria and the issuance of permits, ORSANCO should continue to facilitate a strong dialogue between the Compact states to achieve relative consistency in the implementation of water quality programs.

Additionally, MSD respectfully offers the following comments to sections of the PCS where changes have not been proposed. Since MSD is regulated by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, our comments focus on potential conflicts with water quality standards (WQS) administered by the Kentucky Division of Water (KDOW). Of particular note, KDOW is currently conducting its own Triennial Review of Kentucky's WQS.

Concern No. 1 - Section 3.3 (A) (2) states:

"...for the months of April through October, measurements of E. coli bacteria should not exceed 130/100 mL as a 90-day geometric mean..."

MSD recommends limiting the period designated for contact recreation to only include May through October. Including the month of April in the contact recreation season for the Ohio River conflicts with Kentucky WQS which uses a May through October contact recreation season. A review of historic Ohio River flows in the Louisville area, as provided in the *Ohio River Fact Book* (prepared by ORSANCO), indicates that April has the second highest average stream flow (197,400 cfs) of any month.

Additionally, a review of historic Ohio River water temperatures in the Louisville area, as provided in the *Ohio River Fact Book*, indicates that April historically has average monthly water temperatures below 55°F. According to the National Center for Cold Water Safety¹, immersion into water temperatures between 50 to 60°F is very dangerous and can be immediately life-threatening.

¹ The National Center for Cold Water Safety is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization. Temperature information was referenced from their website: www.coldwatersafety.org/WhatIsCold.html.

Considering the Commission's Pollution Control Standards do not have a high flow provision or a temperature threshold that limits the applicability of the contact recreational criteria to conditions suitable and safe for contact recreation, the inclusion of the month of April does not seem appropriate and should be removed from the contact recreation season.

Concern No. 2 - Section 2.2 (B) states:

"Human health protection criteria shall assure water quality conditions that ...are suitable for contact recreation as defined in Chapter 1.2.G during those months when the river is otherwise suitable for such activities;"

MSD suggests revising the above language to read as follows:

"...are suitable for contact recreation as defined in Chapter 1.2.G during ~~these~~ the months of May through October when the river flows and water temperatures are otherwise suitable for such activities;"

Concern No. 3 - Chapter 4 (D) states:

"No mixing zone shall adversely impact water quality so as to interfere with potable or industrial water supplies, bathing areas, reproduction of fish, other aquatic life and wildlife."

MSD suggests that ORSANCO include a definition of the term "bathing areas". Currently KDOW is proposing the definition of a bathing area as follows:

"Bathing area means those surface waters that are:

- (a) Frequented by bathers for swimming;*
- (b) Have a lifeguard; or*
- (c) Have a bathhouse facility."*

Concern No. 4 - Section 5.4 (C) (2) states:

*"In addition, the system must be operated in accordance with an approved Long Term Control Plan (LTCP), where required, and **the discharge must not interfere with the attainment of the water quality criteria set forth in Chapter 3 except in situations where alternative criteria are authorized by the permitting agency and the Commission.** Authorization of such alternative criteria shall be based upon and justified through a Use Attainability Analysis (UAA) consistent with 40 CFR 131.10g. The LTCP must be developed and implemented to fully attain the alternative criteria.*

*The approved LTCP and UAA will identify the conditions, at or above which, the contact recreation use and associated bacteria cannot be achieved, **and will identify alternative bacteria criteria that can be achieved.** The alternative bacteria criteria shall apply for the period during which conditions exist and shall not exceed 2000 fecal coliform per 100 mL as a monthly geometric mean for the protection of public water supplies."*

The existing language in Section 5.4 (C) (2) of the ORSANCO PCS appears to conflict with the revisions that the Commission is currently proposing for Section 1.1 of the PCS. The proposed Section 1.1 revisions indicate that criteria references within the PCS are no longer intended to have a direct regulatory application, but rather are meant to serve as a technical reference for states to use in the permitting process, if so desired. However, Section 5.4 language suggests that the Commission has a regulatory authorization role for alternative water quality criteria approvals. This Section should be revised to reflect ORSANCO's role consistent with Section 1.1, remove the requirement for Commission approval, and maintain the state's commitment to protection of designated uses.

Therefore, MSD recommends the following changes to Section 5.4 (C) (2):

~~"In addition, the system must be operated in accordance with an approved Long Term Control Plan (LTCP), where required, and the discharge must not interfere with the attainment of the water quality criteria set forth in Chapter 3 except in situations where alternative criteria are authorized by the permitting agency and the Commission designated uses. Authorization of such Permitting agencies may authorize alternative criteria shall be based upon and justified or revise designated uses through a Use Attainability Analysis (UAA) consistent with 40 CFR 131.10g. The LTCP must be developed and implemented to fully attain the alternative criteria."~~

~~"The approved LTCP and UAA will identify the conditions, at or above which, the contact recreation use and associated bacteria cannot be achieved, and will identify alternative bacteria criteria that can be achieved. The alternative bacteria criteria shall apply for the period during which conditions exist and shall not exceed 2000 fecal coliform per 100 mL as a monthly geometric mean for the protection of public water supplies."~~

Concern No. 5 - Section 5.4 (C) (3) states:

*"Bypasses of secondary treatment which are necessary in order to implement a CSO long-term control plan which includes primary treatment options at the municipal wastewater treatment plant may be allowed, **provided it is not technically or financially feasible** to provide secondary treatment of greater amounts of wet weather flow."*


MSD is concerned that the phrase "provided it is not technically or financially feasible to provide secondary treatment of greater amounts of wet weather flow" represents a potentially extreme standard for approval that seems inconsistent with Section 402(q) of the Clean Water Act which states:

"For approval of a CSO-related bypass, the long-term control plan, at a minimum, should provide justification for the cut-off point at which the flow will be diverted from the secondary treatment portion of the treatment plant, and provide a benefit-cost analysis demonstrating that conveyance of wet weather flow to the POTW for primary treatment is more beneficial than other CSO abatement alternatives such as storage and pump back for secondary treatment, sewer separation or satellite treatment."

MSD suggests that the PCS should be revised to be more consistent with the CSO Policy.

As the second largest public sewer utility in Kentucky, Sanitation District No. 1 of Northern Kentucky (SD1) is responsible for the collection and treatment of Northern Kentucky's wastewater, as well as regional storm water management. Our service area covers approximately 200 square miles and encompasses more than 30 municipalities and unincorporated communities in Boone, Campbell, and Kenton counties. SD1 is providing the following comments on the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission (ORSANCO) "Proposed Amendments to the Pollution Control Standards for Discharges to the Ohio River (2019 Revision)".

The proposed revisions to the Commission's Pollution Control Standards include significant changes to *Chapter 1: General Provisions, 1.1. Authority and Purpose*. A review of the proposed changes seems to indicate that ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards are transitioning from a regulatory program to more of an advisory document for discretionary use by the states:

"These standards were adopted by the Commission for use or consideration by signatory States as they develop and implement their programs..."

While in general SD1 supports changes being proposed to the Commission's PCS, there are five concerns with existing language in other sections of the PCS which we would like the Commission to consider for modification. Since SD1 is regulated by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, our comments focus on potential conflicts with water quality standards (WQS) administered by the Kentucky Division of Water (KDOW). Of particular note, KDOW is currently conducting its own Triennial Review of Kentucky's WQS.

SD1 comments on existing PCS language are as follows:

Concern No. 1 - Section 3.3 (A) (2) states:

"...for the months of April through October, measurements of E. coli bacteria should not exceed 130/100 mL as a 90-day geometric mean..."

SD1 Comment: Including the month of April in the contact recreation season for the Ohio River conflicts with Kentucky WQS which uses a May through October contact recreation season. A review of historic Ohio River flows in the Cincinnati area¹, as provided in the *Ohio River Fact Book* (prepared by ORSANCO), and more recent USGS data from the Markland Lock and Dam², both indicate that April has the second highest average stream flow (169,200 cfs and 184,000 cfs, respectively) of any month³.

Additionally, a review of historic Ohio River water temperatures in the Cincinnati area⁴, as provided in the *Ohio River Fact Book*, and more recent USGS data from the Markland Lock and Dam⁵, both indicate that April historically has average monthly water temperatures below 55°F (53.6°F and 54.5°F, respectively). According to the National Center for Cold Water Safety⁶, immersion into water temperatures between 50 to 60°F is very dangerous and can be immediately life-threatening.

Considering the Commission's Pollution Control Standards do not have a high flow provision or a temperature threshold that limits the applicability of the contact recreational criteria to conditions suitable and safe for contact recreation, the inclusion of the month of April does not seem appropriate and should be removed from the contact recreation season.

Concern No. 2 - Section 2.2 (B) states:

"Human health protection criteria shall assure water quality conditions that ...are suitable for contact recreation as defined in Chapter 1.2.G during those months when the river is otherwise suitable for such activities;"

SD1 Comment: In relation to the previous SD1 Comment, suggest revising the above language to read as follows:

"...are suitable for contact recreation as defined in Chapter 1.2.G during ~~those~~ the months of May through October when the river flows and water temperatures are otherwise suitable for such activities;"

The proposed revisions indicate that criteria references within the PCS are no longer intended to have a direct regulatory application, but rather are meant to serve as a technical reference for states to use in the permitting process, if so desired. Additionally, the current direction of the ORSANCO PCS appears to be moving the Commission away from a regulatory approval role. This Section should be revised to reflect this transition and remove the requirement for Commission approval.

Therefore, SD1 recommends the following changes to Section 5.4 (C) (2):

"In addition, the system must be operated in accordance with an approved Long Term Control Plan (LTCP), where required, and the discharge must not interfere with ~~the attainment of the water quality criteria set forth in Chapter 3 except in situations where alternative criteria are authorized by~~

~~the permitting agency and the Commission designated uses. Authorization of such Permitting agencies may authorize alternative criteria shall be based upon and justified or revise designated uses through a Use Attainability Analysis (UAA) consistent with 40 CFR 131.10g. The LTCP must be developed and implemented to fully attain the alternative criteria.~~



Evidently the architects of this compact did not trust industrial leaders and the politicians who catered to them to prioritize the environmental quality of the Ohio River over cost-cutting discharges of harmful toxins into the river.

What has changed? Is it not the pro-business, government-supportive efforts to increase financial profits by easing government regulations that is driving the proposed revisions of Pollution Standards for Discharges to the Ohio River? I suspect you would like us to believe that individual states, municipalities, and industries will *voluntarily* comply with the established guidelines for discharges into the Ohio River and that those guidelines will remain effective in protecting the water.

For 70 years, ORSANCO has overseen the Ohio River and managed its pollution standards, some of such standards being more strict than what is required federally by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and state agencies. They have created standards specific to the conditions of the Ohio River that best benefit the water quality which is remarkable because not all systems and areas are the same. So, the water quality and pollution standards that federal agencies or even state agencies set may not be applicable to all bodies of water since each is unique. This is why it is important and special that the Ohio River has its own set of specific pollution standards to ensure protection of the river and the 5 million people that rely on it for resources such as drinking water.

If the ORSANCO standards are made voluntary, it will be up to the states to develop their own standards. First, this will be economically unfavorable for the Ohio River states as they will have to spend on resources and to develop the new standards. While I am glad to see that the new revisions will keep the Pollution Control Standards in place and are therefore far superior to the proposed option 2 of the PCS released in 2018, these standards must not be left discretionary but instead be made mandatory.

Permit by permit review by states fails to hold the states accountable and does not address equivalent levels of protection under ORSANCO. I realize ORSANCO has no authority to mandate or enforce standards and to date has not addressed the monumental build-out of the petrochemical industry in the Ohio River Valley. However, current uses of the Ohio River by both past established industries as well as new impacts of petrochemical build-out and river use will have significant and far reaching effects on water quality. Under the Energy and Policy Act of 2005, oil and gas facilities are exempt from most major environmental laws, including eleven major federal laws; however, this does not mean that they do not release toxic compounds, which without the legal carveout exemptions would be classified as hazardous, that affect human health and the environment. This buildout will undoubtedly compromise the drinking water of millions of residents and aquatic ecosystems and waterfowl.

It is my understanding that other than ORSANCO, which monitors organic contaminants, there are no other agencies or facilities that have any programs in place to protect citizens from contaminants that will enter the river from watersheds already being subject to deep-shale drilling, high-volume, high-pressure horizontal fracturing (i.e., fracking) and the numerous Class 2 injection wells already taking this toxic, highly radioactive frack waste without monitoring of nearby surface, ground- or drinking-water supplies. The construction of Shell's ethane cracker in Monaca PA and likely siting of another ethane cracker plant in Belmont County will significantly increase the amount of pollution coming from well pads using high pressure hydraulic fracking and Class 2 injection wells, which are not designed for hazardous waste, in the watershed.

Peer-reviewed studies show that many of the chemicals released through the process of fracking and plastics production are carcinogenic, endocrine disrupting, mutagenic, neurotoxic, obesogenic and persistent in the environment. Without ORSANCO's Organic Detection System, there is no way to ensure that spills or non-point pollutants will be detected.

I urge that ORSANCO seek secure avenues of permanent, long-term funding for the Organic Detection System (ODS). Additionally, in light of the petrochemical development, the ODS system and other testing programs should be expanded. These additions might include:

- More GC/MS systems along the river
- More sampling sites, closer to regions affected by fracking and petrochemical facilities
- Keep triennial review in place
- Conduct a non-point source study (last one was 2003)
- Add VOC compounds that are found in fracking industry to ODS analysis
- Update Tier II chemical storage data

Thank you for your attention to the serious threats to the health of our entire region and our

longterm economic viability if these incredibly weak industry-biased standards are adopted.

Dear Sir or Madam: I am writing in opposition to the proposed roll back of pollution control standards by the Ohio River Sanitary Authority (ORSANCO) As a resident of the North Side of Pittsburgh I am only a few blocks away from the river and its quality directly affects my health and well being.

It seems beyond belief that ORSANCO would consider reducing its pollution control standards. According to ORSANCO's own water quality monitoring nearly two-thirds of the length of the Ohio River (64%, or about 682 miles) is impaired for primary contact recreational use. By definition impaired waters require additional, not reduced, pollution control in order to comply with the Clean Water Act. Moreover significant new industrial discharge activity has been proposed for the river including new ethane refineries. These will only add to the River's existing load of pollution which already violates water quality standards. In order to maintain progress toward compliance with water quality standards it is important the ORSANCO maintain and consider strengthening its pollution control standards, not retract them.

My name is Ruth Bamberger. I live in Ludlow, KY and am an active member of the Cumberland Chapter of the KY Sierra Club.

I read the revised language in the draft document and a statement on the draft that Hank Graddy, Water Chair for the Cumberland Chapter, circulated to interested parties. The draft appears to be a modification of language with no substantive change. It still gives the states too much leeway in short circuiting the pollution standards of ORSANCO.

At the hearing, the Executive Director commented that the Commission's decision to modify its role in enforcing pollution standards was in part a concern for redundancy in EPA, ORSANCO, and state regulations. As a former instructor in Public Policy and Public Administration, I understand that redundancy is bound to happen in a federal system with multi layers of governance. When the Obama administration's WATERS OF THE UNITED STATES regulations went into effect, it greatly expanded the domain of the Clean Water Act to include wetlands and streams, which as you know, if pollution is in these waterways, the larger rivers ultimately are affected. Now with the current Trump administration/EPA proposed regulations to weaken the previous rule, ORSANCO needs to give second thought to weakening its enforcement standards. Now more than ever, we need this interstate compact to maintain and even strengthen its enforcement standards to protect our drinking water, fish population, and opportunities for safe healthful recreation.

To members of the board of ORSANCO:

My name is Brewster Rhoads and I live in Cincinnati. I am very concerned about the proposal to drop the current ORSANCO water quality standards and give the member states extensive flexibility to implement and enforce standards which may be lower than ORSANCO currently requires.

I would like to speak from the point of view of someone who has been deeply involved in recreation on the Ohio for nearly 40 years. As an avid kayaker, I paddle on the Ohio 100-150 days a year. I live part time on a 60+ year old house boat moored at the historic Ohio River Launch Club. And I started and still chair both the Ohio River Paddlefest (the largest event of its kind in the U.S.) and the Great Ohio River Swim (the largest cross Ohio swimming event on the entire river).

With my colleagues who assist with organizing these events, I have been fighting the widely held public image of the Ohio as dirty and dangerous. Paddlefest and the Swim work hard to expose participants to the beauty and safety of the Ohio. When people experience the Ohio in such an intimate and personal way, they generally change their preconceived notions and often become "cheerleaders" and advocates for the river.

One of the best arguments to address fears of the cleanliness and safety of the Ohio is that fact that ORSANCO exists and enforces water quality standards that protect our drinking water (I live 1/2 mile from the Greater Cincinnati Water Works plant in the California neighborhood in Cincinnati) AND the health of people who recreate in and on the Ohio.

I am deeply concerned that any attempt to provide additional flexibility to member states to alter their standards to meet the bare minimum required by the Clean Water Act as enforced by the US EPA will reduce public confidence in the quality and safety of the waters of the Ohio.

This is especially troubling as communities along the Ohio are working hard to "reconnect" to the Ohio to promote economic development, tourism, outdoor recreation and a "sense of place" - all of which are key to attracting and retaining the talented workforce desperately needed by local businesses both large and small.

If you decide to move ahead with this plan, I implore you to:

- 1) further boost your water quality monitoring
- 2) ensure transparency and public engagement as states propose permits that are not consistent with current ORSANCO standards
- 3) increase your staff capacity to critique every single proposed state permit to ensure that they will not allow discharges that are currently prohibited

Bottom line... ORSANCO must continue to be the Guardian that gives the public confidence that the Ohio will not become dirtier and more dangerous as states and industry seek the "flexibility" to deviate from well established ORSANCO water quality standards.

ORSANCO has made vast improvements in the Ohio River's water quality since the 1950s, yet (according to the EPA Toxics Release Inventory) toxic industrial discharges still make the Ohio the most polluted river in the United States. So why would we want to diminish ORSANCO's oversight authority now? And whom would it benefit? The likely answer is that industry is putting tremendous pressure on the states, and the states are in a race to the bottom to attract and keep industry. They are in a downward spiral of offering tax breaks and other incentives, and promising fewer and weaker regulations, with a wink and nod towards enforcement. Somehow, they think this will make them come out on top, but when public health is eroded, health care costs skyrocket, public education takes a big hit, qualified workers become scarce, and economic outcomes tank.

The successful futures of cities like Cincinnati depend on attracting and keeping bright minds who can drive innovation and invention. They know that a thriving river basin is a multiplier for all the recreational and other non-polluting businesses and attractions that will generate the renaissance they are looking for.

They also know that good public health policies are pro-growth, that water pollution can result in long-term costs to the state, and that related health costs can overwhelm our economy. For example, in the Flint, Michigan catastrophe, drinking water became chronically polluted with lead. A 2009 study predicted that the 5-year-olds exposed to lead that year would cost Michigan in economic losses ranging from \$3.9 to \$4.85 billion per year in loss of future lifetime earnings.

We need to maintain ORSANCO as an independent body that can make accurate, transparent assessments and conduct unbiased oversight to protect our water supply, which provides drinking water to 5 million people.

ORSANCO provides a collaborative model, the antidote to adversarial dynamics.

Their regional standards provide a degree of insulation that helps buffer against changes in the political climate.

ORSANCO's continued independence ensures integrity in science and monitoring, whereas the states, pushed by the powerful coal and petrochemical industries, may be less apt to protect aquatic ecosystems along the entire length of the river from pollution.

To the ORSANCO Commissioners:

- *The states must not be allowed to opt out.

- *Compliance must be uniform among states.

- *The Pollution Control Standards must be strengthened to include emerging contaminants from petrochemical & frack waste, not weakened.

The Ohio River Foundation notes that "During rain storms raw sewage is discharged directly into the river at 1350 points along the river. A result is that stretches of the Ohio River near many major cities are closed to swimming. Non-point source runoff and agricultural activities contribute significant amounts of contaminants to the river. Acid mine drainage is a major source of water quality problems for the upper Ohio Rivers and its tributaries. Many sections of the Ohio River do not meet water quality standards for bacteria and pathogens, PCBs, lead, mercury, metal and organics and other pollution. Approximately 164 species of fish have been found in the Ohio River. Once 80 species of

mussels lived in the Ohio River but currently only 50 species occur and 5 of those are in danger of extinction. There are fish consumption advisories in place for the entire length of the river." (www.ohioriverfdn.org). Preservation and reclamation of the Ohio River is paramount to the health and safety of the 5 million people who drink its water. Water is of primary importance to the survival of all species terrestrial and aquatic. We need to move forward not regress in our care of this precious resource. I sincerely hope that good sense overrules greed.

By not providing clear, quantifiable, and scientifically supported standards that each state must abide by, ORSANCO is allowing polluters a huge loophole to double back on the progress ORSANCO has made on the Ohio River.

Just because some states are not complying with current restrictions, is not a reason to cede ground. Instead, ORSANCO should find ways to enforce the standards that are known to protect the river.

I testified at the recent hearing in Erlanger in opposition to the current proposal, and wish to submit a written version of my comment.

Recent comments from some commissioners as well as the the current ORSANCO pollution control standards proposal under consideration often refers to the original language of the 1948 compact. I think it is important to go back and look at the source documents from that time. If one reviews the 1948-1949 annual report (<http://www.orsanco.org/wp-content/uploads/2016/07/annualreport1948-49.pdf>), you can see that public health officials dominated the Board. Only five commissioners were from the private sector - and of those, one was from a news publication and another was from a transportation company. The federal commissioners were drawn from US government agencies - one was from the US Fish and Wildlife Service, one from the Corps of Engineers, and one was the US Surgeon General, Leonard Scheele. Scheele was notable for overseeing the fluoridation of many public drinking water systems, as well as massive childhood polio vaccination programs during his time as Surgeon General.

Seventy years later, the private sector representation on the commission is now twice as many as it was in 1948-49. More than 10 individuals come from the private sector. Many of these private sector representatives have significant ties to polluting industries who wish to weaken ORSANCO's oversight. And today there is not a single representative of a public health organization on ORSANCO. This is a completely bewildering fact considering how so many of the water crises across our country involve public health concerns - Flint being the major example, but there are several other examples, such as the public health warning advising against drinking Toledo's water supply in 2014 due to industrial contamination.

I would like to quote from the 1948-49 annual report to show how difficult it is to come together for interstate regulation:

"It was in the year 1908 that the State of Ohio declared that its river cities need not install sewage treatment facilities until communities in other states on the banks of the Ohio did likewise. This initiated discussion among the several Ohio River states pointing to the desirability of joint action on pollution-abatement measures. However, no steps of consequence towards cooperation were taken until 1928. By then increasing industrial pollution had seriously burdened the river. This led to an informal agreement among the states of Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia, Kentucky, New York, Illinois, Maryland, Indiana, Tennessee, North Carolina, and Virginia to act in concert for control of taste-producing phenol discharges from coke plants."

So what happened between the 1920s and when ORSANCO was finally formed after World War II? By 1936, things were so bad that the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce worked with other civic organizations to improve the situation because the city's drinking water had started to become endangered due to the pollution of the Ohio River. It took another decade for each state to create originating legislation. In other words, it took 40 years from the beginning of the problem to the creation of a solution.

This history is important because it shows how long progress takes, and how it takes devastating, decades-long disasters to get everyone to come to the table. I fear if ORSANCO goes down any further with a path towards voluntary standards indicated by its current proposal, we may find ourselves in the same situation that created ORSANCO in the first place.

Dear ORSANCO Commissioners,

I am writing to urge you to vote to continue to make MANDATORY, rather than optional, ORSANCO'S pollution control standards along the Ohio River. Your recent proposal to change the standards into "guidelines and comments" on discharge permits, is the reason for my tremendous concern.

Since 1948, when ORSANCO was formed to establish and regulate common pollution control standards for all eight states in the Ohio River watershed, *Article I of the ORSANCO Compact of the member States stated: "the abatement of existing pollution in the waters of [the Ohio River basin] are of prime importance to the people...and can best be accomplished through the cooperation of the States situated therein, by and through a joint or common agency."*

Allowing each state to determine which standards they may adhere to cancels out the function and purpose of ORSANCO. Under voluntary pollution control standards, any state may be swayed by greed to reduce pollution standards on industry discharge permits in order to bring industry to their state. From your outstanding history of protecting the Ohio River, ORSANCO has shown time and again that jobs and health are compatible endeavors. History has also shown that without the muscle of ORSANCO mandatory pollution standards, health loses. One only need to look at the fights that ORSANCO has endured in the battles to maintain a clean river. Please do not quit.

Water sources are also contaminated by rain runoff from such things as oil-slick roads; construction, mining and dump sites; and livestock wastes from farm operations. Leaky septic tanks, pesticides and fertilizers are among the other sources that can contaminate our rivers. Over 40 percent of American waterways are considered unsafe for swimming and fishing. Additionally, water resources face an ongoing threat from man-made environmental disasters, such as the 2014 Fracking explosion in eastern Ohio.

The new EPA rules eliminate protection of small streams and wetlands. As a city Planning Commissioner (retired) for 13 years for the City of Montgomery, we set our zoning code storm water standards to reflect intentions of best management practices established by the EPA and ORSANCO. However, federal EPA standards are at the whim of the current president and not based on the science that demonstrates the necessity for rigorous pollution control protection. ORSANCO pollution control standards, based on science and not politics, are more consistent than the EPA standards. The new EPA rule eliminates protection from non-point source pollution that will run directly into our waterways, including but not limited to; salt and oil from roads, chemicals from industry and mining, fertilizers from lawns and farms. Allowing states to set their own guidelines without transparency, science, oversight, and enforcement by ORSANCO, will give states the option to use the lower

EPA standards which will harm the River.

By eliminating the coordinated Pollution Control Standards for water discharges, nutrient standards, and enforcement of quality pollution control standards for the Ohio River, each state along the Ohio River will be able to set its own standards for what it considers appropriate for aquatic life, human health and safe drinking water. If one state chooses to lower what it considers safe drinking water standards, it can adversely affect all 5 million people who draw their drinking water from this River. It could possibly lead to drinking water disasters that recently occurred in Flint, Michigan and western Lake Erie!

I cannot understand why anyone would want a system that has been so successful for these many years to be changed to lower standards. To that end, I am requesting that the ORSANCO commissioners vote *NO* on the ORSANCO recent proposal. Please keep **the mandatory pollution control standards in place.**

Dear Chairman:

Conservation groups are opposing attempts to weaken clean water protections for the Ohio River, which supplies drinking water to more than 5 million people, as well as a home for fish and wildlife. In comments submitted today the groups urged the commission to maintain regional pollution-reduction goals to confront serious threats to the river, communities, and fish and wildlife.

Weakening clean water protections for the Ohio River and the five million who depend on it for their drinking water is a terrible idea. The river and its communities continue to face serious threats from sewage contamination, farm runoff, and toxic pollution. Now is not the time to cut back on regional standards for the river. We need more – not less – protection for clean water. Instead of scaling back the rules for polluters, the region needs to come together to support solutions to help each state meet clean water goals to protect the health of the river, people, and fish and wildlife.

The Ohio River Valley Water Sanitary Commission, is slated to vote on the anti-clean water proposal at its meeting June 4-6.

The Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission attempted to scuttle regional pollution control standards last year—a move that failed following public outcry over increased pollution in the iconic river. The recent attempt to make the adoption of pollution control standards voluntary is the first step towards eliminating pollution protections.

Regionally adopted standards and cooperation remains the most effective, efficient and fair way to prevent pollution into the Ohio River. Working together, states have been able to limit pollution into the river to protect people and wildlife. Consistency and shared responsibility for downstream impacts remain paramount.

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The ORSANCO mission is really something- to protect the uses of a nearly thousand mile long river, flowing through states in a boom time for hydraulic fracturing, providing drinking water for 5 million people. How should ORSANCO balance 'uses'—aquatic life, drinking water, industrial, recreation—in a civilization is not set up for all to flourish together.

Additionally, if the job of ORSANCO is to protect any measure of the river's uses, they have to choose their methods within their budget. An article in the NKY Tribune 2015 chronicling the last changing of the guard for the Executive Director of ORSANCO gives a glimpse of the options for how ORSANCO can focus its mission. Is it about the continuous discharges Tennant said had been gotten under control? The accidents which come suddenly and strike hard? The dollars go to great chemists but enforcement has to be outsourced. The crew is heroic after a spill but continuous discharges creep back as new development permits request variances.

People from a drinking water treatment background have the sense that, when there's a spill, knowing what is in the water "really helps utilities prepare for treatment and to have a plan." The article continues to say that knowing the chemicals in the water helps water treatment not to use too much chemicals and this way saves tax payers money. It also saves people from drinking chemicals meant to remove and cancel out other chemicals. And this whole way of thinking assumes that the life in the water-before-it-is-treated (the water of the main stem of the river, the tributaries throughout the region) can deal with the accidents and the continuous releases... or go swim with the fishes. Like in most of our culture and institutions, there's no room to value intact ecosystems. And we underestimate continually the health impacts of destroying ecosystems and filling the soil, air, and water with chemical byproducts of oil and gas drilling and other mining activity.

Like 98.9% of the rest of comments submitted, I oppose making the PCS voluntary and hope that excellent monitoring *linked to* careful permitting and enforcement activity around the regular discharges into the river sticks at the heart of the mission of ORSANCO. We all see the petrochemical hub making its way towards construction on the dozens of sites along the river. We need ORSANCO now more than ever to keep the PCS and related permitting process intact, mandatory, and in your domain as regional oversight board.

If we find, however, that political expediency and industry interests trump citizen input, we will need to make our public comments harder to ignore. Climate and the wider ecological emergency demand new ways of engaging with our political system and new ways of relating to the planetary ecosystem that sustains all our life.

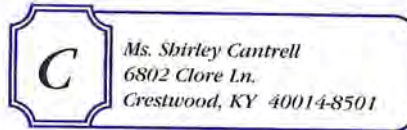

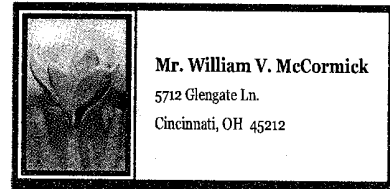

For over fifty years I have lived on the bank of Harrods Creek, ¼ mile from the Ohio River. My family and I have had the pleasure of boating on the river and operating a small marina on Harrods Creek. Water quality is of tremendous importance to me and my family and boaters who dock at our marina.

I urge you to continue to maintain high pollution control standards and strictly enforce these standards in issuing discharge permits into our river. I am asking the Commission to reject the proposed revisions to the Pollution Control Standards (PCS), keep the current PCS Standards, and require all states to revise their state water quality standards and their permitting programs to be in compliance with ORSANCO standards when issuing discharge permits.

Decades of deliberation have determined that these pollution control standards are necessary and appropriate for improving the health of the river and maintaining water quality. It is essential that ALL states that border on the Ohio River limit the pollutants that are discharged into our river.

Since 1948 ORSANCO has set pollution control standards for the Ohio River to help improve the water quality of the river and provide critical guidance to the eight states within the basin. Please continue your responsibility of setting uniform pollution control standards and improve ways to hold states accountable to their implementation and enforcement.

Optional adoption of ORSANCO's uniform pollution control standard threaten to unravel decades of work to improve the health of the Ohio River. Please consider the following points when considering the future of ORSANCO's Pollution Control Standards:

1. Without uniform implementation of pollution control standards there will be protection gaps and inconsistencies. A 2015 survey conducted by ORSANCO comparing state water quality standards to ORSANCO's pollution control standards found a total of 440 pollutants where there are no state water quality standards or ORSANCO's standards are more protective than the states.
2. A state-by-state approach to setting water quality standards raises concerns related to interstate conflict. Without uniform standards for the Ohio River, an upriver state could develop weak water quality standards that would lead to pollution related issues for downriver states.
3. ORSANCO's pollution control standards are set to manage the Ohio River basin as a whole, rather than disjointed river segments. River users should be able to count on ORSANCO to set and enforce uniform pollution control standards that bring the entire Ohio River closer to meeting the Clean Water Act's key tenants of fishable, swimmable, and drinkable.

AK Steel Corporation (AK Steel) is pleased to submit comments on the Commission's latest proposed revisions to the ORSANCO Pollution Control Standards – 2015 Revision (the PCS). AK Steel commented in support of the Commission's prior PCS proposal in August 2018, as well as in response to the Commission's initial request for comments on this subject in February 2018. (Copies of those comments are attached for your reference.) Because of the continued importance of this issue and the effect of the PCS on AK Steel and numerous other businesses throughout the region, we submit these comments on the Commission's current proposal.

AK Steel continues to believe that substantial revisions to the PCS are needed to eliminate the unnecessary and duplicative burdens of the current regulatory scheme while still protecting the water quality goals of the ORSANCO Compact. When ORSANCO was created in 1948, there was a clear need for improvements in water quality in the Ohio River and a lack of any effective state or federal programs to achieve that goal. Since then, the enactment of the federal Clean Water Act and implementation of federally enforceable water quality programs in each of the Compact States have brought about dramatic progress in improving water quality in the Ohio River and achieving the goals of the ORSANCO Compact. The existence of those programs, which are effective and comprehensive, has substantially altered the role ORSANCO can and should play under the modern federal-state water quality regulatory regime.

In light of the dramatic improvements in water quality regulation that have occurred over the past 70 years and the realities of the current regulatory framework, AK has the following comments and recommendations regarding the Commission's current proposal:

1. The Commission should eliminate the duplicative and unnecessary PCS

AK Steel reiterates its support for the Commission's previous proposal, which would have largely removed ORSANCO from its duplicative role in water quality regulation and allowed it to focus on its longstanding and valuable role in gathering and evaluating scientific and technical information on water quality in the Ohio River.

This approach recognizes that each of the Compact States now administers a robust, USEPA-approved NPDES permitting program under the Clean Water Act and is required to establish and enforce water quality standards that ensure the protection of the designated uses of the Ohio River and its tributaries. The ORSANCO PCS are not only duplicative and unnecessary; they create undue complexity and impose costly burdens and inefficiency on the Compact States and regulated businesses. And the proposed 2019 revision provides little or no change to these fundamental issues. ORSANCO should focus on helping to coordinate and promote consistency among the various States through its research and information-sharing functions and should eliminate the costly and unnecessary duplication embodied by the PCS.

2. In the alternative, the Commission should acknowledge and make clear that the Compact States current NPDES permitting programs provide comparable use protection and achievement of the Compact's goals as provided by the PCS.

If the Commission feels compelled to follow the approach embodied by its current proposal and to maintain the PCS largely unaltered, it should revise the proposal to clarify that:

- (i) The water quality standards and permitting provisions of each State's USEPA-approved NPDES permitting program are presumptively comparable to the water quality protections afforded by the PCS;
- (ii) Any NPDES permit issued pursuant to one of those USEPA-approved programs will be presumed to meet the goals and requirements of the ORSANCO Compact; and
- (iii) The burden of proof is on the Commission, after due notice, investigation and hearing, to demonstrate that any such NPDES does *not* provide comparable use protection and achievement of the Compact's goals as provided by the PCS, and that a permit applicant may challenge any such determination in a court of proper jurisdiction.

As currently drafted, the Commission's proposal will only create more confusion and uncertainty about both the role of ORSANCO in water quality regulation and when and how States and permittees must address and incorporate the PCS in permits for discharges to the Ohio River. Without the clarifications identified above, the proposal will merely increase the significant costs and inefficiencies associated with the PCS program, putting businesses along the Ohio River at a competitive disadvantage and creating a disincentive for further business investment within the Compact States.

AK Steel believes that the goals of the Commission's current proposal are laudatory, insofar as it appears intended to make the PCS more advisory in nature and to defer to the primary role of the States in regulating water quality. Unfortunately, the reality of the proposal seems to undermine that intent and, by maintaining the PCS in nearly unaltered form. AK Steel encourages the Commission to either return to its prior proposal – which recognizes that the PCS are no longer necessary in light of the comprehensive federal-state water quality regime established under the Clean Water Act – or revise its proposal to ensure that the PCS are only applied to override a State-issued NPDES permit if the Commission can demonstrate that such action is necessary to meet the requirements of the Compact.

Basis and Additional Information for AK Steel Comments on ORSANCO's Current PCS Proposal

The Commission's proposal appears to be intended to provide additional permitting flexibility to the States while recognizing the primacy of their NPDES permitting programs in protecting water quality in the Ohio River. As drafted, the proposal emphasizes that the PCS “were adopted by the Commission for *use or consideration* by signatory States as they develop and implement their programs to assure that those designated uses and other goals regarding pollution control and prevention set forth in the Compact will be achieved.” The new language added to Section 1.1 of the PCS goes on to recognize that the permitting and standards development processes in the individual States may vary, and that “each discharge permit issued pursuant to the Clean Water Act or other federal or state law may not contain requirements addressing one or more of the Pollution Control Standards.” In such a case, the proposal would require a State to implement permit limitations that provide “comparable” use protection and achievement of the goals of the Compact as would be provided by application of the PCS.

Although this new formulation suggests that the PCS would become advisory in nature (requiring each State to merely “consider” the PCS in establishing permit limitations in individual discharge permits), the overall structure and content of the PCS seem to undercut this conclusion. Rather than providing the desired flexibility, the proposed revisions threaten to maintain the existing rigid burdens and unnecessary duplication of the current PCS, while creating considerable new ambiguity and uncertainty concerning how ORSANCO will use its commenting and enforcement authorities under the Compact and the revised PCS to ensure that State-issued permits provide “comparable” use protections.

- The Commission's current proposal would maintain the existing, comprehensive provisions of the PCS

regarding water quality criteria (Chapter 3), mixing zone designations (Chapter 4), and wastewater discharge requirements (Chapter 5). Those provisions contain extensive, detailed, and prescriptive requirements that ORSANCO presumably deems necessary to protect and preserve the designated uses of the Ohio River and meet the other goals of the Compact. The continued existence of those detailed standards will likely have an inordinately presumptive or prescriptive effect on each State's determination of what permit terms are required to provide "comparable" use protections, as required by the revised PCS. Thus, while purportedly only requiring that States "consider" the detailed PCS, the effect is likely to be much more prescriptive.

- The revised PCS retain numerous requirements that are inconsistent with, and in some cases unnecessarily more stringent than, the water quality standards and implementation procedures adopted by the States and approved by USEPA pursuant to the Clean Water Act. ORSANCO also appears to be unnecessarily regulating numerous pollutants whose regulation is not necessary to ensure the achievement and maintenance of high quality water and aquatic values in the Ohio River. This suggests a desire to regulate as many pollutants as possible without regard for necessity or effectiveness. The possibility that ORSANCO will continue to insist on the implementation and enforcement of these provisions through its enforcement authority raises the specter that States will be forced to incorporate unnecessary and burdensome requirements in their NPDES permits that provide no demonstrable additional environmental benefit for the Ohio River.
- The current PCS proposal retains provisions for the issuance of variances from the mixing zone and wastewater discharge requirements of the PCS (Section 1.6) and for approval of alternative site-specific water quality criteria for specific constituents (Section 1.7). It is unclear why these variance and site-specific water quality criteria provisions are even needed if States are merely required to "consider" the PCS in issuing discharge permits. Maintaining provisions for approval of variances and site-specific criteria suggests that ORSANCO will continue to view the PCS as mandatory.
- The Commission's proposal contains conflicting signals regarding the continued role and applicability of the detailed water quality criteria set out in Chapter 3. On the one hand, the proposal deletes two provisions that *require* compliance with the water quality criteria. (See Sections 1.1 and 5.1.) On the other hand, the highly detailed and prescriptive water quality criteria have nevertheless been retained in their entirety, without alteration, in the current proposal. Moreover, portions of those water quality criteria are incorporated by reference in the wastewater discharge requirements for chemical constituents set forth in Section 5.3 of the revised PCS. Thus, while eliminating a few statements requiring compliance with the water quality criteria (and replacing them with a more generic reference to compliance with the goals of the Compact in Section 1.1), the existing, detailed water quality criteria remain a central component of the PCS and are likely to continue to play a major, if not determinative, role in setting discharge limitations in NPDES permits.
- Despite the suggestion that States must merely "consider" the PCS in establishing permit terms, the near-universal use of mandatory language throughout the PCS suggests otherwise. The ubiquitous use of the word "shall" throughout the PCS indicates that ORSANCO continues to view the water quality criteria, mixing zone provisions, and wastewater discharge requirements of the PCS to be mandatory, not merely advisory. If ORSANCO indeed intends otherwise, the mandatory language should be eliminated.
- The process for adoption and revision of the PCS, including individual water quality criteria and discharge requirements, continues to provide no opportunity for affected parties to challenge the appropriateness or applicability of the PCS. Regulated entities have no opportunity to challenge the basis or soundness of standards that may be applied within their NPDES permits. This lack of an opportunity to challenge these de facto legal standards is fundamentally unfair and deprives permittees of regulatory and legal due process.
- The Commission's authority under Article IX of the Compact to issue orders to *compel compliance* with the requirements of the Compact reinforces the concern that the unaltered PCS will be used to override State NPDES permitting decisions. Under the latest proposal, ORSANCO will be given the opportunity to review and comment on all permits for discharges to the main stem of the Ohio River. Thus, if ORSANCO determines that a proposed NPDES permit does not meet its standards (as embodied in the PCS), it may submit comments to that effect, and if the State regulatory authority does not alter the proposed permit, the Commission may issue an order compelling the

permittee to nevertheless comply with the PCS.

The clear result of this change will be greater uncertainty and inefficiency in the permitting process and increased costs for the regulated community who must decipher what the final terms of a proposed NPDES permit may be.

Out of an abundance of caution, States and permittees may be forced to propose permit terms that continue to fully incorporate the detailed requirements of the PCS – regardless of whether they are appropriate or necessary – rather than run the risk of additional delay, cost and uncertainty should ORSANCO decide that the State-proposed terms do not provide “comparable” use protection. Without substantial additional revisions as suggested herein, the proposed retention of the PCS in their current form will serve, in essence, as a mandatory baseline for all permits authorizing discharges into the Ohio River.

It is also noteworthy that Section XII.A.7 of ORSANCO’s By-Laws require the review of the PCS on a triennial basis. By maintaining the extensive, complex provisions of Chapters 3, 4, and 5 of the PCS, ORSANCO will be required to expend extensive time and staff resources every three years to review and update the PCS – despite the fact that they are purportedly advisory in nature and are not needed to protect the quality of the Ohio River. In a time of limited public budgets and numerous pressing demands, ORSANCO should not be expending precious resources on a task that duplicates the States’ own exhaustive triennial reviews under the Clean Water Act.

In sum, the PCS serve little effective purpose under the current, comprehensive water quality regulatory regime.

AK strongly recommends that the Commission return to its prior proposal. The Compact States are well equipped to ensure the protection of water quality in the Ohio River. And ORSANCO is well equipped to provide a complementary research and coordination role to help the States in fulfilling their responsibilities. In the alternative, if the Commission chooses to retain the detailed provisions of the PCS in their current form, it should explicitly state that the States’ USEPA-approved NPDES programs and the permits issued thereunder provide comparable protection of the designated uses of the Ohio River and achievement of the goals of the Compact as provided under the PCS. Thus, if the Commission seeks to force a Compact State to incorporate some or all of the PCS into any discharge permit, the burden of proof should be on the Commission to demonstrate that such changes are necessary to meet the explicit requirements of the Compact. This approach is clearly consistent with the language of the Compact itself, which recognizes that “no single standard for the treatment of sewage or industrial waste” is appropriate throughout the Ohio River basin. The PCS may have a legitimate continued role in the current legal climate, but that role should be to advise and inform, not to direct. The proposal should be revised to reflect this important distinction.

2. A state-by-state approach to setting water quality standards raises concerns related to interstate conflict. Without uniform standards for the Ohio River, an upriver state could develop weak water quality standards that would lead to pollution related issues for downriver states.
3. ORSANCO's pollution control standards are set to manage the Ohio River basin as a whole, rather than disjointed river segments. River users should be able to count on ORSANCO to set and enforce uniform pollution control standards that bring the entire Ohio River closer to meeting the Clean Water Act's key tenants of fishable, swimmable, and drinkable.

1. Without uniform implementation of pollution control standards there will be protection gaps and inconsistencies. A 2015 survey conducted by ORSANCO comparing state water quality standards to ORSANCO's pollution control standards found a total of 440 pollutants where there are no state water quality standards or ORSANCO's standards are more protective than the states.
2. A state-by-state approach to setting water quality standards raises concerns related to interstate conflict. Without uniform standards for the Ohio River, an upriver state could develop weak water quality standards that would lead to pollution related issues for downriver states.
3. ORSANCO's pollution control standards are set to manage the Ohio River basin as a whole, rather than disjointed river segments. River users should be able to count on ORSANCO to set and enforce uniform pollution control standards that bring the entire Ohio River closer to meeting the Clean Water Act's key tenants of fishable, swimmable, and drinkable.

Like many others who commented on ORSANCO's proposal to stop setting uniform water pollution standards for the Ohio River, I am pleased that you chose to continue setting standards. However, I'm informed that you are proposing to make the standards voluntary. I'm guessing this idea comes from the same place as the earlier proposal: pressure from politicians probably, themselves motivated by pressure from lobbyists and campaign contributors.

It's perfectly clear that making the standards voluntary would remove any point in setting standards. There may be some ORSANCO states that would choose to make a priority of protecting the health and safety of their citizens, and of other life in and around the river--I'm certain that my state (WV) is not one of them. In fact as you likely know, the WV legislature recently voted not to allow updated standards for our water, after being lobbied by the WV Manufacturers' Association--using the excuse that since WV citizens tend to be heavier than average and drink less water, it won't hurt us to have dirtier water. Likely lobbyists in your other states don't feel free to speak in such language--but they can quite possibly see to it that standards are set to the convenience of polluters, not the needs of children and others. Yes, each state has its DEP or DEQ, but we know from long experience that these are captured agencies.

Dear ORSANCO Commissioners,

I thank ORSANCO for setting uniform pollution control standards for the Ohio River. These standards must be enforced by all states. Voluntary adoption of the standards by states is not an option. The Ohio River must be maintained and improved to be as clean as possible.

As a retired PhD industrial chemist with over 30yr of experience, I had to account for all products from my reactions. One thing that I learned was; It is easiest to control a pollutant in a concentrated form in the plant. It is nearly impossible to remove the pollutant once it is dispersed in the environment. The old saying from the 60's that "dilution of pollution is no solution" is very valid.

I grew up in San Pedro, the port of Los Angeles. Fortunately we had a sea breeze that swept most of the LA smog away. I remember disliking trips into downtown LA because of the smog and air pollution. While I was studying chemistry at Caltech, I remember going into a lab at 1 o'clock. At that time the air was clear enough to see several blocks. When I came out of the lab at four, I would be lucky to see the stop light a half block away. The smog was that bad. One freshman student from back East, after he had been on campus for a week, asked, "Where did those mountains come from?". Although the Pasadena Hills are only a couple of miles away, the smog had been so bad for a week he had not seen them.

Driving on the LA freeways a few years later my eyes were watering so badly that I questioned whether it was safe to continue driving. It was worse than driving into Parkersburg after the Ames fire had burned for five days when I did turn around.

I followed the research on smog and was immensely pleased as the processes were understood and controls implemented so that today it is possible to live in LA.

Then the ozone hole was detected. A chemical understanding developed that fluorocarbons were the cause. Regulations were implemented and the ozone hole is disappearing.

In the 70s I used to drive along the Naugatuck River in Connecticut. When I first started, the color of the river varied from red, yellow, green, or brown and nothing grew on the banks. When I left the colors were gone and grass and trees were growing on the banks of the river.

These are three examples where we have successfully remediated human caused pollution. It has been done and we can do it again.

I had polio when I was four and a half and walked with braces and crutches ever since. As a freshman at Caltech I explained to the coach, "My legs are paralyzed, I have no kick, my left arm isn't very strong, and I want to be on the swim team. I can change in the locker room, walk with my braces and crutches to the pool deck, take off my braces on a bench, and crawl into the pool." His response was, "Lets see what you can do." I was on the swimming and water polo teams.

In graduate school my wife to-be and I learned to flat water canoe. In New Jersey and Connecticut we paddled with

the Appalachian Mountain Club on flat water and Class II white water. West Virginia Wild Water introduced us to class III kayaking. On first white water trip we camped in a grassy field and launched into a calm pool at the start.

Later I realized I was living the the 23rd Psalm. ("The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures, He leads me beside quiet waters, He restores my soul.") Through the kindness of people I was able to function, we camped in a green field, and we started the trips in still water. Every time I paddle, I come back with my soul restored!

In a canoe or kayak, I have the same mobility as anyone. Once paddling with our young sons, we came across a river beaver. The beaver surfaced, swam in a circle, saw our canoes, flapped his tail, and dived. He did this three times. It was one of my greatest moments as a father — to share this with my family.

Today I am ashamed to have to testify about what should be an obvious truth. I am ashamed of our political process. I am ashamed of our school system that hasn't taught us how to think. I am ashamed of myself for not taking a much more active role and letting others do the hard work.

I am especially ashamed of West Virginia. As an extractive economy, it's environmental record is not very good. There is an old saying, "Fool me once shame on you, fool me twice shame on me." First West Virginia sold its extensive lumber resources, and suffered erosion and flooding from the denuded mountains. Then West Virginia sold its coal rights to absentee landlords, and the mountain tops are being removed. And now Donald Trump is trying to sell control of West Virginia's natural gas to China, a foreign country. What comes after fool me thrice? Voluntary adoption by states of the ORSANCO control standards?

Thank you for your past work. Now I ask you to make sure that everyone, including future generations, is able to go outside, see the Ohio and find, "He restores my soul."

1. Without uniform implementation of pollution control standards there will be protection gaps and inconsistencies. A 2015 survey conducted by ORSANCO comparing state water quality standards to ORSANCO's pollution control standards found a total of 440 pollutants where there are no state water quality standards or ORSANCO's standards are more protective than the states.
2. A state-by-state approach to setting water quality standards raises concerns related to interstate conflict. Without uniform standards for the Ohio River, an upriver state could develop weak water quality standards that would lead to pollution related issues for downriver states.
